On State Constitution

Tuesday's The Day To Vote

Next Tuesday, November 4, Texans will have the opportunity to vote on a complete revision of the state's Constitution for the first time in 100 years.

As will be noted in a Sample Ballot in this week's News, there are eight separate propositions on the ballot. Each proposal will be voted on separately, and each will be either approved or defeated by a majority of the voters without affecting the approval or rejection of the others.

There is a multitude of arguments both for and against most of the amendments, and for and against a total revision or a partial revision of the Constitution.

State Rep. W.S. (Bill) Healy of the 101st District feels that the proposed Constitution is wrong for Texas and in a news release this week, is urging all Texans to vote against it in its entirety as is a group of local citizens who have studied the issues carefully. Governor Dolph Briscoe also has expressed his opposition to the revision. Senator Ray Farabee of District 30 is urging all citizens who expect to be away from their homes for any reason on November 4 to vote absentee prior to November 1. Farabee said, "Although I personally favor adoption of the proposed Constitution, I hope each voter in the 30th District will take an opportunity to study the document and make up his or her own mind on each article. Then vote for or against it November 4—but vote."

Voters locally will vote in only one box, precinct 7, at the Community Center located at South Third and Avenue B where Evelyn Shelton will serve as election judge.

Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., an hour longer than in previous years and other voting precincts, locations, and election judges are as follows: Prec. 1, Benjamin, Courthouse, Billie Benson; Prec. 2, Truscott, Community Center, J.G. Adcock; Prec. 3, Gilliland, School, Paul Home; Prec. 4, Vera, Methodist Church, Paul Weiss; Prec. 5, Goree, Community Center, S.C. Roberts; Prec. 6, Munday, Community Center, James Smith; and Prec. 8, Sunset, Gillespie Church, Harold Partridge.

Group Asks Defeat Of Constitutional Revision

AUSTIN--The chairman of Citizens to Preserve the Texas Constitution says the campaign to defeat constitutional revision in the November 4 election is gaining ground rapidly with the help of Governor Dolph Briscoe.

State Senator Peyton McKnight of Tyler said the Governor's decision to oppose all eight propositions on the ballot "came after his own careful analysis which convinced him the present Constitution is far better than the revised version written by the Legislature."

Citing reports of voter apathy, McKnight called upon Texans to familiarize themselves with the issues and vote next Tuesday.

"I believe that most people who study the proposed new constitution will vote against it," he said. "But if a voter hasn't had time to examine every controversial provision, then I think he or she should play it safe and keep our present Constitution by voting no."

In expressing his opposition to the new charter, Governor Briscoe pointed out that Texas has a low per capita tax burden and is the only industrial state without an income tax. He said that annual sessions of the Legislature, as proposed in Proposition One on the ballot, "would make it more difficult to hold the line on new taxes and would lead us down the road to a state income tax."

Briscoe added: "I do not believe that we should move even a small step in the direction of patterning our state government after the federal government, where Congress is in session the year round, accomplishes very little, where accomplishments are slow to come by and where spending is completely out of control."

Proposition Two, revising the judiciary article, has drawn fire from many lawyers because it would put both criminal and civil case ap-

peals in the Supreme Court and would give the Legislature broad new authority to change the election process for judges. Presiding Judge John F. Onion, Jr., of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals says the overall effect of the revision will be to "intensify the traffic jams in our courts, instead of alleviating them."

Other provisions in the new constitution automatically restore voting rights (and the right to hold office) to ex-felons without any administrative or judicial proceeding, abolish the \$80 million annual ceiling on welfare, restore the ad valorem tax for the state building program which the voters recently decided to end, and allow cities and counties to incur greater public debt without voter approval (which McKnight calls "the little New York" provision).

The Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association and numerous other organizations are opposing the new constitution. The Texas Association of School Boards is against the finance article (Proposition Five), which State Comptroller Bob Bullock describes as "a spook which will haunt us many years." The Texas Association of School Administrators opposes both the finance article and the education article (Proposition Four).

McKnight declared: "The document we will vote on November 4 was written by the Legislature and it increases the Legislature's own

power at the expense of the people's presently solid constitutional guarantees. It overturns voter decisions including those in recent years rejecting annual sessions and letting the Legislature set its own pay. It invites costly, lengthy lawsuits in a new overhauled court system to determine what the new laws mean. It changes our basic governmental concept to rule by the Legislature, and can lead only to more government, more spending and higher taxes.

"I don't think the people want to give future Legislatures a blank check, which is what these eight propositions do."

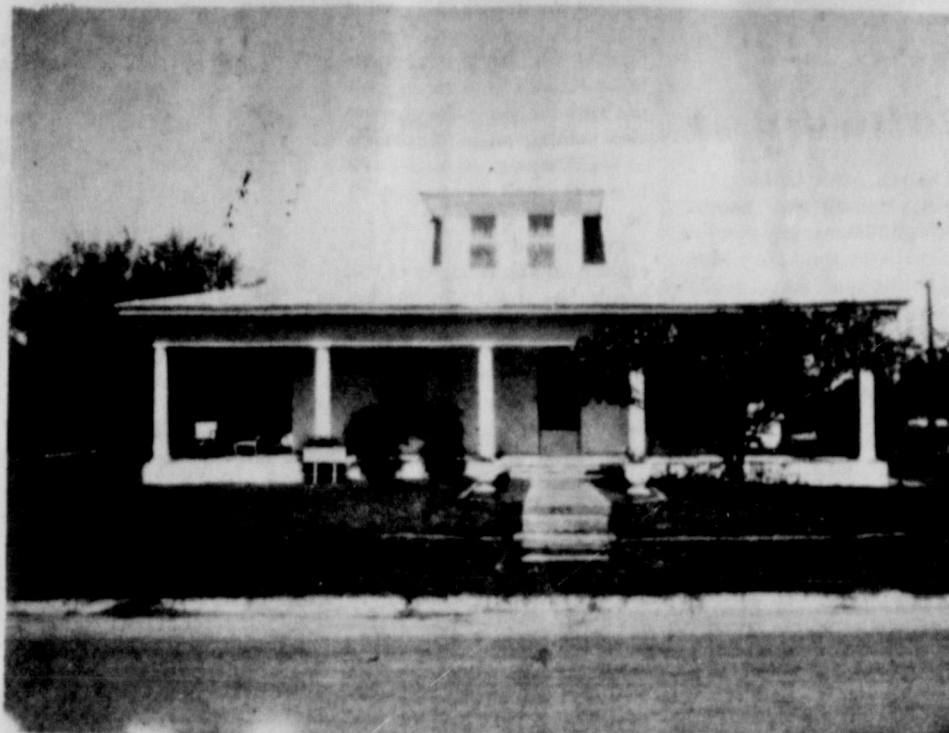

It's been several years since one of these famous cookbooks was last compiled. They are favorites among new and experienced cooks alike because the recipes are down-to-earth and tried and true.

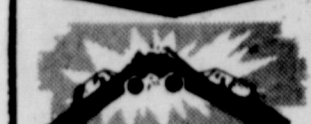

Government in the Nation now, in my opinion. I do not think we could improve it by changing the Constitution to remove the ceiling on Welfare spending, to remove the ceiling on taxes required to finance the debts of Local Government, to remove the ceiling on the State's contributions to state employee and teacher retirement funds--and, most of all, to remove the right of the people to set the ceiling on the salaries of Legislators."

"If we really do need to do some of the things this new Constitution would authorize, such as relaxing the present prohibition against lotteries, let's do them one at a time--not in one fell swoop."

"I don't think the people of Texas are ready to turn over to the Legislature the power to call itself into Session and set the salaries of its own members and at the same time give it almost unlimited

authority to regulate health care, environmental projects, land reclamation, navigation, recycling of wastes, energy resources, gambling, and state employee and teacher retirement funds."

"This is why I agree with Governor Briscoe that all eight propositions on the November fourth ballot should be defeated," said Mr. Heatly.

A reception followed the ceremony with Misses Peggy Guterrez, Rosa Rocha, and Olga Rojas as assistants.

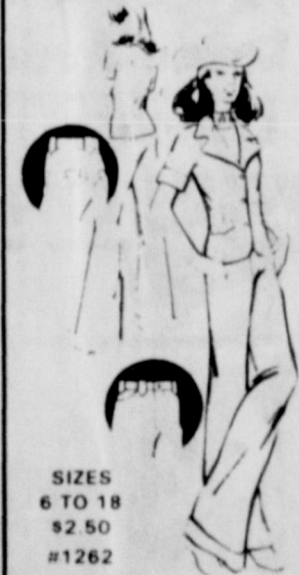
