These metal signs are available at the county FB office at a nominal cost. Reward decals for your vehicles are provided free of charge. Farm Bureau will pay a reward of \$200 to the person furnishing information leading to the arrest and conviction of person(s) committing trespass, felony theft, arson, or malicious mischief on posted property owned or rented by a member of the County Farm Bureau.

These membership service programs are included in your membership dues. Other economic services are available to Farm Bureau members: Fire, crop hail, auto, liability and life insurance, and Blue Cross/Blue Shield medical benefits, and Safemark tires and batteries.


