Next the district applied to the State for assistance in setting up a Coordinated Vocational Academic Education Pre-employment laboratory. The local district used the school's own Ford Building to house the Program. Next the district applied for a two unit Vocational for the Handicapped Program to be shared by the ten schools in the Haskell-Knox Consortium and to be housed in facilities belonging to the Carney School District and located in O'Brien.

At this time the Texas Rehabilitation Commission began offering direct assistance in the form of travel monies and later a full time case worker for the area. In addition, the Haskell-Knox Consortium provided the services of a Vocational Adjustment Coordinator.

The Useful Homemaking program was redirected to a Combination Cooperative and Homemaking which again permits students to use local businesses and agencies as training stations as part of the regular school day.

The Knox County School Counselor began to place greater emphasis on career education and all teachers are now being encouraged to incorporate into the regular class work activities that will teach dignity in work and provide for job sampling even before the secondary level in school.

The new programs to be offered this year will be two new Pre-Employment Laboratory Training Programs. The new programs are General Agriculture Mechanics and Horticulture. The school has been approved for an additional teacher. The local board has let contracts for the construction of a greenhouse and the remodeling of the existing Agriculture shop. When the construction and remodeling work is complete the school Vocational facilities and equipment will meet all existing State Minimum Requirements and will provide needed additional classroom space.

Treatment Plant Now In Operation

Knox City's new Wastewater Treatment Plant is now in operation and our town is one of the few of its size in Texas with such a modern up-to-date system.

Early in 1970, the city was advised by the Texas Water Quality Board that a new wastewater treatment plant had to be constructed. Knox City was among the first to apply for federal and state grants, and engaged Ernest L. Andrews, consulting engineer of Wichita Falls to evaluate the existing plant and to present plans for a new plant. His proposal was to construct a new aeration ditch and to convert the existing Imhoff tank into a final clarifier. Cost estimate was \$30,800.00.

The council then submitted an application through the Texas Water Quality Board to the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration for a 30 percent federal grant or \$10,194.00 plus a three percent grant or \$924.00 for are planning by West Central Texas Council of Governments.

Services Held For KC Woman's Brother

Funeral services for J.H. Hackfield of Lubbock, brother of Mrs. Howard Word, were held Tuesday at 2 p.m. in Hodges Chapel of First Christian Church with Dr. Dudley Strain, pastor, officiating.

Graveside military rites were conducted by Veterans of Foreign Wars at Resthaven Memorial Park in Lubbock.

Mr. Hackfield, 85, died Monday at 5:40 a.m. in Lubbock Osteopathic Hospital after a lengthy illness.

He married Pearl Garner on Oct. 26, 1926 in Lubbock, he was one of the first dealers in the farm-machinery and implement business in Lubbock and operated the J.H. Hackfield Farm Machinery Co.

He retired in 1947 but remained active in the rental and farming business.

Mr. Hackfield was a life member of the Knights of Pythias, a life charter member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 2466, a member of the American Legion and a charter and life member of the Museum at Texas Tech. He was a member of the First Christian Church.

A U.S. Army veteran of World War I, he received several decorations for service. Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Frances Cagle, a son H.S. "Buddy" Hackfield both of Lubbock, two sisters, Mrs. Word of Knox City and Mrs. Nora Broach of Munday; and four grandchildren.

Those attending the services in Lubbock were Mr. and Mrs. Word and Mr. and Mrs. Doc Montandon, all of Knox City, Mr. and Mrs. Andy Wilfong of Weinert, Mrs. Lily Krause of Damon, and Mrs. Harvy Hackfield of Industry.

A constitutional amendment passed by the state legislature in April, 1971, allowed the city to get the grant increased to \$1,540.00 for area planning.

Twenty-five percent was provided by the Brazos River Authority in the form of a loan to be repaid by the city from sewer funds possibly within a year.

The city then advised the Texas Water Quality Board that the final cost analysis of \$44,000 would require that federal grant funds be revised and increased from \$16,940 to \$24,000.

Bids were opened in September, 1972, and awarded to W.B.

Abbott and Co. of Lubbock as low bidder with a bid of \$35,376.10.

Last November, the city learned that under the provisions of the new Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, the project might be eligible for a grant increase to 75 percent. Application was submitted immediately for the grant increase and received approval for \$33,000.

The new system is state-approved and will provide complete treatment facilities. It is designed for a population of 2,000.

1973-74 School Faculty Chosen

Teachers for the coming year include Mrs. Joanna Delgado, Early Childhood Education; Mrs. Margie Clonts, Kindergarten; Mrs. Jan Lankford will be the teacher's aide with Early Childhood and Kindergarten; Mrs. Louise Kemletz will be the teacher for the first grade; Mrs. Hazel Long for the second grade; Mrs. Judy Allen and Mrs. Earlene Austin will share the third and fourth grades. Mrs. Mary Frances Shannon will be the teacher for the fifth grade. The sixth grade, seventh grade, and eighth grade will be departmentalized with Franky Don Mullins, Mrs. Mary Jo Lankford, and Mrs. Wynette Mullins as teachers. Mrs. Frances King will instruct the primary resource students.

Mrs. Idella Escobar will be the teacher's aide for Mrs. King's room. Mrs. Frankie Baker and Charles Zachry will provide modified academic classes for vocational and secondary stu-

dents. Mrs. Leona Burkhart will serve as aide for these classes.

The program for the migrant children will be merged as much as possible into the mainstream educational plan with Mrs. Florence Morgan as teacher of the program.

High School teachers will include Mrs. Renella Watson and Mrs. Judy Burnett, English; Ronald Adams, mathematics; B.R. Winchester, science; Mrs. Dottie Lowrey, business; Leon Burkhart and Ronald Hilliard will be Vocational Agriculture teachers; Mrs. Vera Newton will teach Vocational Homemaking, and Leonard Morgan will again teach the C.V.A.E. classes.

Franky Don Mullins, Jimmy Rogers, Jerry Lowrey, and Samuel Nichols will share the coaching duties. P.E. classes, Health classes, Drivers' Education, and history classes. Kelly Glaze will direct the band program from the 5th through 12th grades.

Students will register Tuesday, August 14, and classes will begin August 21 for a full school day from 8:30 until 3:50 p.m.

High School students will have the following schedule for registration: Seniors—9:00 until 10:30 a.m. Sophomores—10:30 until 12:00 a.m. Juniors—1:00 until 2:30 p.m. Freshmen—2:30 until 4:00 p.m.

Elementary teachers will be in their respective rooms during registration if there are those who wish to pick up lists of needed supplies.

The programs are expected to continue operations until new changes might be indicated.

It is now determined that the students of the local district are receiving Vocational Training and Services costing an estimated \$92,000 in State Funds compared to an estimated \$23,000 five years ago. It is hoped that the above Vocational Programs in addition to the regular academic and other special programs will cause all of the district students to reach their maximum potential whether it be doctor, lawyer, craftsman, nurse, farmer, teacher, businessman, homemaker, or any of the many choices in our world of productive work.

MEN OF YEAR IN TEXAS AGRICULTURE

Six outstanding agricultural leaders have been named "Men of the Year in Texas Agriculture" for 1973 by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. They are H.L. (Hub) King of Brownfield, Charles E. Ball of Amarillo (formerly of Dallas), Gerald C. (Jerry) Puckett of Fort Stockton, Ross Wilson of Gorman, Lynn M. Griffin of Austin, and Joseph B. Finley of Laredo. The honorees will receive a special plaque during the agents association state meeting Aug. 5-7 at the Villa Capri Hotel in Austin.

ODESSA TO HOST STATE 4-H HORSE SHOW AUG. 1-4 COLLEGE STATION--Top 4-H horsemen of the state are scheduled to compete for championship honors during the State 4-H Horse Show, August 1-4 in Odessa's Ector County Coliseum.

Twenty contestants from each of the 13 districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are eligible to compete in the state show, reminds B.F. Yeates Extension horse specialist, the boys and girls earned their right to enter the state activity by placing high in district competition this month or last.

The extension Service and Odessa Chamber of Commerce are sponsoring the 4-H Horse Show.

Eligible to compete in the qualifying events of the state show are the district champions in halter, showmanship, western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing contests, and others selected on a point basis. Brett Boone from Knox City was District 3 Pole Bending Champion and will be competing at Odessa.

Yeates added that events in roping, the cutting horse contest, English and drill team competition will comprise the open invitational classes for the show. Joey Swain will enter roping events and Lisa Boone the Cutting horse contest. They are both from Knox City.

The State 4-H Horse Show is the year's most significant highlight for 4-H members with horse projects. "The boys and girls have worked and practiced with their horses all year with the goal of qualifying for the state activity and claiming some horsemanship honors," Yeates explained.

A featured attraction this year will be a new handcraft show. Participating 4-H members of the horse show will be eligible to enter some of the handwork they have designed for their horse project work. Training equipment and related materials and riding apparel may be entered. Awards will be given to the outstanding handcraft entries.

Seven outstanding county agents of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have been named recipients of the highest award given by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents--the Distinguished Service Award for 1973. They are Charles R. Beedy of Claude, retired Hutchinson County agent; Lawrence R. Winkler of Albany, Shackelford County; Robert J. Moody of Clarksville, Red River County; Rex A. Jones of San Angelo, Tom Green County; George W. Rice of Nacogdoches, Nacogdoches County; J.R. Carroll of Anahuac, Chambers County; and Thurman J. Kennedy of San Antonio, Bexar County.

Chemicals used as pesticides are toxic and care must be exercised to avoid accidental poisoning.

Minimizing exposure to the chemical is an essential element of safe use.

In one western state almost 80 percent of the occupational poisoning cases by industrial and agricultural chemicals resulted from absorption through the skin.

Those mixing and loading pesticides are potentially subject to relatively high levels of exposure to the skin as well as those applying fine sprays and dusts.

Of course, indoor spraying can be hazardous if proper precautions are not taken.

Other activities that can result in exposure of the skin to pesticides include the maintenance and repair of contamina-

ted equipment and contact with treated surfaces. Hand harvesting, thinning, cultivating, irrigation and insect scouting can result in significant exposure if fields are entered too soon following pesticide application. Persons with skin conditions are cautioned to avoid exposure to pesticides unless extra care to minimize exposure to those areas. Some "safe use" suggestions to minimize exposure to pesticides are:

1. Observe recommended protective measures specifically mentioned on the label.
2. Cover up before exposure. Not after. Covering contaminated skin with a thin plastic wrap has caused a fourfold increase in absorption of one insecticide.
3. Use clean clothing daily and bathe or shower at least daily.
4. A wide-brimmed hat, preferably waterproof, offers protection from downward drift for face and neck areas. Contaminated hatbands can present a problem, so use an inexpensive hat that can be discarded after minimal use or use one with a replaceable hatband.
5. Wear unlined, natural rubber, gauntlet gloves for best protection. Prevent contamination of the inside of the gloves.
6. A long-sleeved, light colored, washable cloth jacket, preferably water repellent, is desirable except in cases of heavy wetting.
7. A waterproof apron is essential if exposure to the lower trunk and legs is anticipated such as may occur in mixing and loading of pesticides.
8. Use waterproof shoes or boots. Leather shoes crack after a few wettings and are easily penetrated. Canvas shoes also become wet and can be a constant source of skin exposure.
9. Shield the eyes to avoid contamination, particularly if splashing may occur. Plastic shields or masks generally are tolerated better by agricultural workers than are goggles.

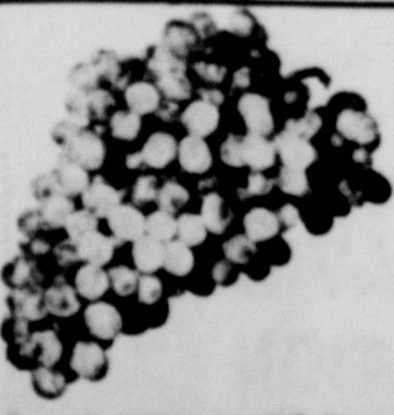
