Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday, January 8, in Benjamin Baptist Church for Carl Curtis Lovelady, 59, of Truscott, who died in Parkland Hospital in Dallas at 6 a.m. Saturday. The Rev. K. E. Woolley, pastor, officiated. Burial was in the Benjamin Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home of Knox City.

Mr. Lovelady was employed as a pumper with the Ard Drilling Co. He was severely burned while working on a lease west of Truscott, December 11 and had been a patient in the Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls for two weeks before being transferred to Dallas.

Born in Clifton, Texas, on May 12, 1907, he had lived in Knox and King Counties the past 12 years. He married Dessie Lee Hyten of Lovington, N. M., May 17, 1933. He was a veteran of World War II.

Knox County Livestock Show Sat. At Airport; Sale Will Follow Judging; Awards Banquet Here Mon. 7:30 P.M.

Leon Burkham, vocational agriculture teacher and advisor to the Knox City FFA Chapter said that approximately 250 entries are anticipated in the Knox County Livestock Show to be held Saturday, January 14, at the airport of Knox City.

John Crownover is general chairman of the show this year, and the men would encourage everyone to attend the show and also the sale which will follow immediately.

Mr. Bob Jacobs, Associate County Agent of Vernon, will be judging the show and all entries must be in place by 9 a.m. The judging will begin at 10:30 a.m. and will follow in this order: Chester White Boars, Duroc Boars, Hampshire Boars, Yorkshire Boars, Breeding Gilts, Chester White Gilts, Duroc Gilts, Hampshire Gilts, Yorkshire Gilts, Breeding Sheep, Fat Lambs, Fat Steers, and Breeding Beef Cattle.

Only the top 5 lambs, the top 3 barrows, and the top 4 fat steers will sell. The buyers will be informed before the animals enter the ring if the exhibitors wish to sell or keep their animals. If any individual wishes to purchase an animal and does not wish to keep it, show officials will dispose of the animal for the buyer. If a buyer purchases an animal that the exhibitor wishes to keep and

show in other competition, all the buyer will be out, is the difference between the floor price (market) and the selling price. This is an added incentive to the boys and girls in their FFA work and 4-H Club work.

There will be a concession stand open during the show and sale. All prize money will be presented at the Awards Banquet, which will be held in Knox City at the School Lunchroom at 7:30 p.m., Monday night, January 16.

Registration Of Voters Up Jan. 1; Deadline Jan. 31

Records in the office of Knox County Tax Assessor Collector John A. Smith indicate that more people have taken advantage of the first complete year of voter registration in Texas than last year at this time.

As of January 1, 1966, 522 voters had registered. As of January 1, 1967, 686 people had signed up, making a total of 164 more registered voters thus far.

Deadline for the free registration is the same as it was under the poll tax—January 31. Every person of voting age (21 and over) who expects to cast a ballot, must register, except those who were 60 years old or older on Jan. 1, 1967.

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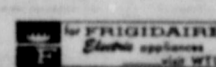

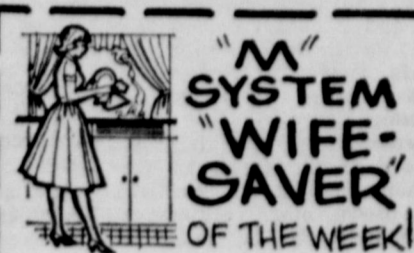

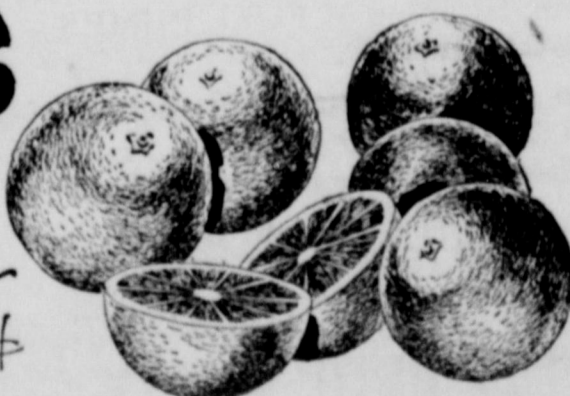

Resolution Is Passed By Historical Surv.

AT JANUARY 3 MEET

At a meeting of the Knox County Historical Survey Committee on January 3, the following resolution was passed:

RESOLVED, that John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, member of the Ector County Historical Survey Committee, has served as a member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee for the past six years and as its President for the past four years and during this period of time he has also served as President for three years and as Secretary-Treasurer for one year, of the Texas Historical Foundation, a private affiliate of the State Survey Committee and of the 254 County Historical Survey Committees; and WHEREAS, during his service with these organizations great progress has been made in the field of historical preservation and marking and he has received national recognition because of the aggressive, comprehensive program; and

1. Chairman of the Committee that prepared and worked for the passage of the Texas Historical Preservation Laws recognized as being the most effective and comprehensive in the nation;

2. Chairman of the Reorganization Committee responsible for the increase of organized County Committees from 52 to 254;

3. Originator of the widely acclaimed program of Recordation Appreciation, Marking, Preservation and Survey of Texas History, known as "RAMPS";

4. Spearheaded the observance of the Civil War Centennial in Texas being a dignified and executed program of marking, commemorations and observances together with the accumulation and compilation of invaluable archival materials which will enable future scholars to more accurately determine and portray Texas' roll in this vital conflict;

5. Instituted a program of official state awards to recognize those who have made authentic restorations and who have done outstanding and significant things in the field of historical preservation; and

WHEREAS, these programs have resulted in the following accomplishments during his presiding and stand as a monument to his devotion to duty and purpose and selfless efforts:

1. Initiated the Official Texas Historical Marker Program that

is now underway (the first in Texas since 1936) and over the state, whereas in the past 2 1/2 years over 4,200 markers have been erected in a partnership effort by the state, local governmental subdivisions, organizations and individuals;

2. Over 950 historical structures have been saved or restored;

3. The counties having fire proof archival storage have increased from 73 to 189;

4. 219 counties now have historical pamphlets or maps available to the traveling public;

5. 221 cities have "Historical Markers in City" medals on approaches to alert the traveler;

6. Historical museums have increased from 84 to 243, with 64 more in the active planning stage;

7. Over 7,000 historical tours, pilgrimages, commemorative and dedicatory programs have been held, attended by over 3,500,000 people, many from out of state.

8. Over 1,000,000 copies of regional and statewide historical directories, guide lists and maps have been published. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that John Ben Shepperd be commended for his splendid work and for his leadership and that we express our appreciation to him for being willing to take the time to do this job for our posterity.

TIPS COUNT AS SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS

Persons who get a substantial part of their income in the form of tips may now expect to receive higher social security monthly benefits when they retire, according to Edwin Draughon, social security manager in Vernon.

As a result of 1965 amendments to the social security law, cash tips received by employees can count toward social security benefits if the tips amount to at least \$20 a month with one employer.

Under the law as stood before, only the wages of these employees were credited to their social security record. Now, since Jan. 1, 1966, all of their job income both tips and wages, can be credited to their social security records.

Knox City Study Club Hears Wichita Couple On 'Israel' At Jan. 5 Meeting

The Knox City Study Club held open house at the Woman's Club on Thursday, January 5 at its regular meeting at the afternoon hour of 3:30 o'clock to present Mr. and Mrs. Kruger of Wichita Falls. The Krugers, who had made a recent trip to Israel spoke and showed slides in a depiction of the development of modernity in that country and shaping of the culture of its people as the result of the long conflict in the Middle East and the mass return of the Jewish people during the past eighteen years since the resolution was made creating a state of Israel and the recognition of Israel by the United Nations. It was in 1917 that the nation of Israel first began its efforts to reclaim its birthright, actually enacted in 1947 with the ingathering of the exiles. Since that time the Jewish heritage has been restored and thousands of Jews have returned from hundreds of countries throughout the world. These have been accepted back into Israel as first class citizens after having fled their homeland through the years as various governments occupied Israel.

Mr. Kruger said that when the great ingathering of the Jewish refugees and exiles began there were ponderous situations and among these was the astounding lack of communication due to the language differences. Language barriers posed a great problem with the Jewish people having adopted the speech of whatever country of his residence during years of displacement. The Country in recognition of its sacred place in religious history adopted the ancient Hebrew language. Accelerated schools were set up to teach the people a common language.

Kruger said that when the Jewish people came back many were flown in by plane and that the people interpreted this as the "Return of the Jews on the Wings of Israel" as taken from the Bible. "In this land the religious atmosphere is permeating and the austerity of the people gives you the feeling that they are truly 'People of the Book,'" said Mr. Kruger. The three major faiths of the world, Christianity, Mohammedanism and Judaism, are intermingled in the Middle Eastern countries.

One thousand libraries have been established in Israel and the Bible has been adopted as the official history reference book. The land that was once barren and then furthered in waste of marauding armies has been made fertile and rich. The last conquering rule lasted 400 years. Since the State of union has been restored 100 million trees have been planted and the program calls for 6 million new plantings yearly. The cities are now ultra-modern with factories, industries, schools and cultural settings.

"The youth of Israel are given a Bible in one hand and a rifle in the other," said Kruger, noting that all, including women are required to serve a period of military duty. The women serve two years and the men serve two and one-half years and are in the reserves until age 45.

At the close of the Krugers' talk an informal session was held for discussion and the visiting speakers passed around snapshots of their son's marriage in Israel. This was done upon request of the audience. The Krugers' son is in science research work in Israel and is married to a native of that country.

The program drew an appreciative audience including club members and visitors.

The Krugers were introduced by club president, Mrs. E. Hob Smith.

A delightful program of music was presented by Karen White at the piano and Jodie and Connie McKinney, in a vocal duet of "Edelweiss" from The Sound of Music and "Today."

Hostesses, Mrs. Joe Roy Smith, Mrs. Russell Boyd and Mrs. C. C. Hoge invited guests upon arrival to the refreshment table where party delicacies of sandwiches, cakes, coffee and tea were served.
