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GREYHOUNDS BOW TO RULE; TO MEET STEERS FRIDAY NITE

The Rule Bobcats, with 22 lettermen on the squad, had too much experience for the Knox City Greyhounds Friday night but barely squeezed out an 8-6 victory over the inexperienced but game 'Hounds.

It was Knox City's first conference loss, and the second of the season, and the Greyhounds stand third in District 10-B behind Rule and Rochester, both of whom are undefeated in conference play.

Tomorrow (Friday) night, the Greyhounds will meet the Rochester Steers at Rochester, in a game that promises to be a thriller. A win by the 'Hounds over Rochester and Woodson, and an upset victory over the Bobcats by the Steers next week, would put the district in a three way tie.

Gate Receipts at Knox City-Rule Game Set Record

Gate receipts at the Knox City-Rule football game Friday night were \$1,001.50, probably the largest in the school's history, Supt. E. A. Youngblood said this week.

After officials were paid and the balance split with Rule, Knox City's net from the game was \$443.50. Officials were paid \$100 plus \$14.50 travel expenses.

The crowd may have been as large at a Nov. 11 afternoon game with Rochester three years ago, the superintendent said, but receipts were less because the admission charge was lower.

Knox City's net from other Greyhound games this season was: Trent \$118.85; Hermleigh \$149; Chillicothe \$208.55; Lockett \$200.70; Munday \$236.15; Throckmorton \$220.25; and Aspermont \$239.50.

School officials and coaches expressed their appreciation to fans who have aided the athletic program by their attendance at the games. They especially thanked the men who have directed the traffic and helped park cars on the field.

All Greyhound football fans were invited by the Pep Squad to attend the bonfire and pep rally tonight (Thursday) at 7 on the Little League baseball field east of the high school building.

Doris Bales and Brenda Swanner will be recognized as Misses Firefighters and will light the fire. Their escorts will be Greyhound tri-captains, Jim Anderson, Donald Johnson, and Monte White.

The bonfire is held each year before the Rochester-Knox City game.

Coach Ted Darland said the 'Hounds will probably be without the services of big Don Johnson, who has been stalwart on both offense and defense all season. A few other boys have been limping in practice this week, but Darland says the team rebounded well from last week's defeat and will be ready, mentally, for tomorrow night's game.

Both scores in Friday night's game came in the final quarter. The game went back and forth across the field the first three periods, with neither team penetrating to the 20-yard line until late in the fourth.

Rule's tally came on an eight-yard end sweep by Jack Holcomb, rugged Rule fullback who was outstanding on both offense and defense all during the game. Holcomb also went over for the extra points.

Joe Ed Glover returned the kickoff to his own 35, and the Knox City scoring drive was under way. After attempting a pass that failed, quarterback Montie White kept for a first down, then passed to end Don Johnson for another on the 40.

White, who took plenty of punishment all night, had to leave the game for a time, and Glover filled the quarterback spot.

Fullback Larry White made five and Glover another four. Then, with four minutes to play, Glover passed to halfback Jimmy Phillips for a first on the 21.

White re-entered the game and after trying a pass that failed, hit Johnson in the end zone for the score. On the extra point try White lacked only inches of tying the score.

The Bobcats gained 101 yards rushing to the 'Hounds 98, while the 'Hounds gained 95 yards passing to Rule's 78.

Johnson, because of an injured ankle, did not have his usual effectiveness Friday night, but Jim Anderson, M. C. Vincent and Glover, among others, did bang-up jobs on defense.

Knox Voters Against Seven Amendments

Republican candidates found slim pickings in Knox County Tuesday when 730-odd voters turned out for the off year general election.

The vote in the governor's race was Price Daniel 714, Edwin S. Mayer 16, and senate race totals were Ralph Yarborough 658, Roy Whittenburg 39.

In Knox City, where 211 voted, Daniel received 129 in the

south box to Mayer's one; and Yarborough got 115 to Whittenburg's five. In the north box the vote was Daniel 66, Mayer 3 and Yarborough 66, Whittenburg 3.

The voters in Knox City as well as over the county turned thumbs down on all but two of the nine proposed amendments, giving the biggest licking to annual sessions and salary hikes for the legislature.

7. State advertising—Knox City 66 for, 97 against; county 233 for, 345 against.
8. Medical Care—Knox City 81 for, 89 against; county 287 for, 322 against.
9. Hospital Districts—Knox City 71 for, 95 against; county 243 for, 334 against.

New Mail Service Proving Efficient

D. E. Reagan, Postoffice Department mobile unit manager, was in Knox City Saturday to check on the efficiency of the new star route mail service.

Reagan said the service is apparently working out well, and that any trouble that may develop will be corrected.

He reminded local patrons that under the new schedules, mail dispatched by 2:15 p. m. will receive next-day delivery in any major city in Texas and adjoining states. Air mail should reach any major city in the United States the day after being mailed here.

Postmaster Jeff Graham also said he believes the changes are going to mean better mail service, and asked patrons to notify him of any delay of incoming mail. He also pointed out that there is a 2:15 and 5:30 southbound dispatch each week day, but on Sunday there is only one southbound dispatch, at 4 p. m.

The new schedules should allow all Herald subscribers in the area, including Munday, to receive the Herald no later than Friday.

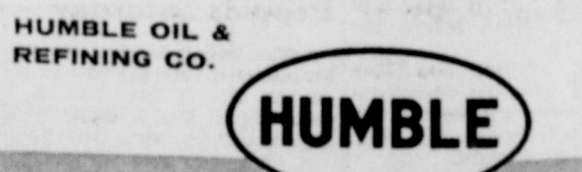

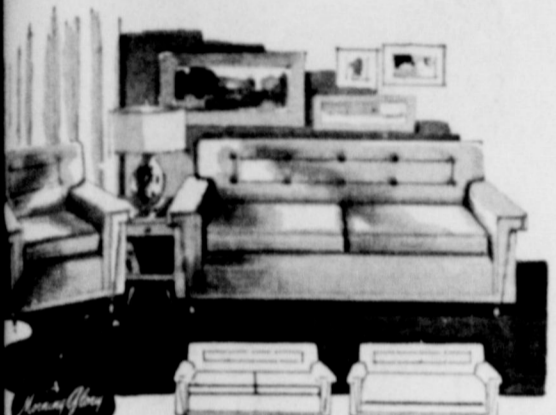
