Residents Asked To Fly Flags Saturday

Knox City residents and area citizens are reminded that Flag Day, June 14, is coming up Saturday. Lions Club members will again see that flags are flown by all participating merchants in the Lions project.

Mrs. Doris Crownover, Chamber secretary-manager is also asking readers to display flags at their places of residence.

Two hundred years ago, American minutemen raised their muskets at the Old North Bridge. What Ralph Waldo Emerson called "the shot heard around the world" rang out. The American Revolution had begun. Two years later while the outcome of the Revolutionary War remained in doubt, the Continental Congress met in Philadelphia on June 14, 1777, and approved the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

That short and unadorned declaration gave birth to our flag. With the addition of thirty-seven stars, and after two centuries of history, the flag chosen in Philadelphia is our flag today, symbolizing our commitment as a people to freedom, equality, and independence.

To commemorate the adoption of our flag, the Congress, by a joint resolution of August 3, 1949, designated June 14 of each year as Flag Day and requested the President to issue annually a proclamation calling for its observance. The Congress also requested the President, by joint resolution of June 9, 1966, to issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week and to call upon all citizens of the United States

Storms Cause Some Damage

"Whether it's cold or whether it's hot, we're gonna have weather, whether or not!" The old saying certainly holds true in describing weather here the past week.

On Saturday night, with the approach of turbulent clouds, the area received rain, some hail, and high winds, and the storm warning was sounded about 9:00 p.m. A large tree in the front yard of the Lloyd Waldrips was uprooted and several trees at Vernon Buckley's home north of town were uprooted, also at the Buckley home, electric lines were down, the barn had tin ripped off, and the TV tower was toppled. The Buckleys were in Lubbock for the weekend and didn't discover the damage until they arrived home Monday morning.

On Sunday afternoon, winds coming off of clouds south of Knox City were responsible for the loss of some young cotton as the burning sand cut swaths across some area fields.

Monday night, a cloud which hit the town about 10:30 o'clock produced some rain and the warning was again given for residents, which incidentally for newcomers is two blasts on the fire siren.

Local Residents On WTC Traveling Seminar

Mrs. Annette Hester, Temi Baker and Cindy Stone, students at Western Texas College in Snyder, and Mrs. Lillian Logan left Wednesday morning for a sponsored tour taking them through several Southern states on a three week seminar.

A series of appointments and tours in Washington, D.C., promises to highlight a visit to the nation's capital for students on the Traveling Seminar in American Studies being sponsored by WTC and Navarro College June 11-30.

Representative Barbara Jordan has confirmed an appointment with the group for 9 a.m. on June 17, according to Richard Lancaster who is directing WTC's arrangements for the Seminar. Senator John Tower plans to meet with the group at a date to be confirmed shortly. Sen. Tower has requested a meeting for the group with President Gerald Ford and notified James A. Chapman III at Navarro College that the appointment has been approved on a tentative basis. If President Ford cannot keep the appointment, the Senator will arrange meetings with either the vice president or one of

the secretaries associated with the Administration, Chapman said. This might be the Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, or another cabinet officer.

Senator Tower is also planning to arrange brief meetings with other members of the Senate, and is arranging tours of the White House, the House and Senate, Kennedy Center, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the State Department with a policy briefing by a member of the foreign staff.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen has been contacted, Lancaster said, and prospects are good that he will respond with like kinds of meetings with the Democratic Senate caucus.

The Seminar students are to be in Washington from June 17-20. They are to visit points of historic and cultural interest in eight Southeastern and Southern states, traveling by chartered bus. Other points of interest may be added as time allows, Lancaster said.

This is the first year that WTC has offered a program of this kind and it has attracted students just finishing high school, college students, and adults who wish to expand their personal knowledge of American heritage.

4-H Horse Show Is Set June 13-14

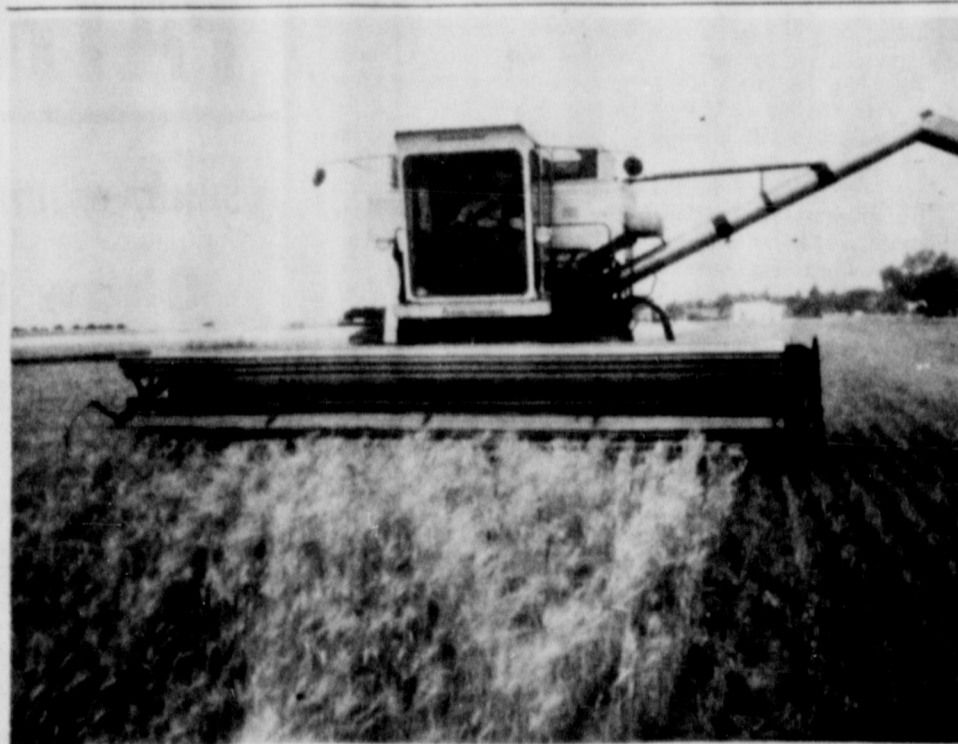

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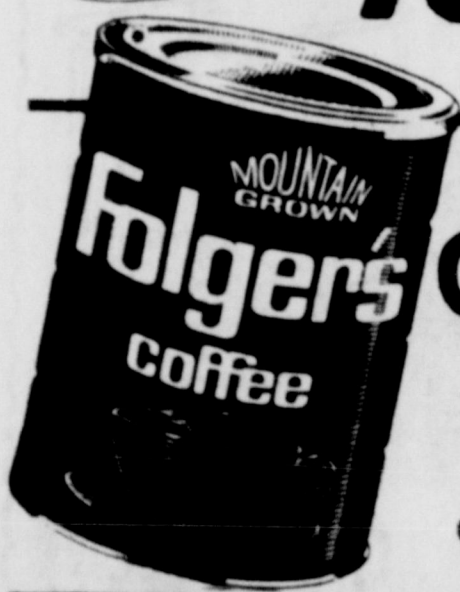
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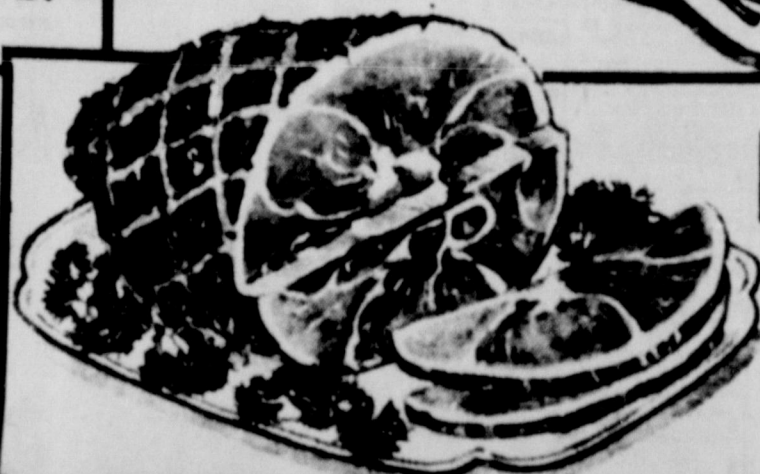


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
