For Knox County Voters

Polling Places Listed

With the approach of the Democratic Primary, many Knox County voters are in a quandry as to where to vote since redistricting was done last year.

In compliance with the United States Supreme Court ruling based on the one man, one vote basis, commissioner precinct lines were redrawn in February, 1973, with the precincts being divided into four equal parts, based on population, amount of roads to be maintained, and equal revenue for each precinct. Each commissioner's precinct now has approximately 1,385 population.

Most Texas counties have completed their redistricting. However, Knox County's was not done until several Knox County residents requested it. In the event the commissioners court had not complied with the Federal ruling, the county would have been subject to redistricting by a Federal judge at the request of only one citizen.

Rhineland and Sunset voting boxes were dropped this year due to the legislature's setting a minimum of 100 voters per precinct, while the old figure was 50.

Rhineland will vote in Precinct #6N in Munday, and Sunset will vote in Knox City in Precinct #7S. It must be remembered that voting precincts cannot cross commissioners' precinct lines. A

The "Distinguished Student" ranking is limited to 10 per cent of Texas A&M University's undergraduate enrollment.

Each child should have a slip distributed through the school to present at the time of registration, according to Glen Rumley, president of Little League. The parent's signature will also be required. Not only will this indicate a parent's willingness to let the child play, but it will also serve as an official release of liability to the Little League should the child be injured.

At the registration, the child must have his birth certificate with him. This is a Little League requirement, and parents are reminded to be sure he brings it.

Saturday will be the only day for registration. Because of the work that will need to be done after the teams have organized, only one day to sign up can be allowed.

All coaches and LL officers are urged to attend this registration.

NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement of F.M. Road 143, extending from the junction of State Highway 283 and State Highway 222. West and Northwest to F.M. Road 143. The proposed project will pass through a portion of the City of Knox City, in Knox County.

Since the Administration of the Highway Department has approved the route and design proposed for development of this project, work will begin on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project.

The proposed construction consists of concrete curb and gutter, grading, structures, and base and surfacing of the route relocation which will provide a more direct route for the continuity of State Highway 222 and F.M. Road 143. A 64-foot curb and gutter municipal section is proposed in the City of Knox City, from Main Street to the Santa Fe Railroad crossing, where it will transition into a 20-foot paved surface rural section.

A minimum of 90 feet of right of way will be required for the three-block section from Main Street (S.H. 283) to the railroad, and a minimum of 100 feet will be required from the railroad west to the tie-in with the existing F.M. 143. New right of way will be required for the realignment; however, there will be no displaced persons or businesses, or relocations, on the project.

March is Nutrition Month and this means becoming more aware of the information on food packages.

Food shoppers know that package labels contain much information that can help them buy the best for the money. Federal law requires that packages of at least one pound and less than four pounds must give contents in terms of total ounces with a statement of pounds and ounces following.

Nutrient labeling is becoming increasingly popular among homemakers. Nutrient information is required for enriched or fortified foods or foods for which a nutrient claim is made.

The Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act has provided a standard format and requirements for manufacturers who use nutrient labels to follow.

Information that can be found on nutrient labels in a total number of servings in the container, a serving size, the number of calories, and weight (in grams) for protein, carbohydrate, and fat. The percentages of U.S. Recommended Daily Allowances for protein, vitamins A and C, thiamin, niacin, riboflavin, calcium, and iron are also given.

Plastic Pipe Carries Water To Livestock

Plenty of fresh drinking water is a necessity in any livestock operation, but according to Calvin Christian of Vera, it is especially important in a steer operation. Christian operates a 691-acre stock farm in the Vera community.

According to Pete Elliston of the Soil Conservation Service, soil type was not favorable for earthen livestock ponds on the Christian place. The conclusion was reached that the most feasible means of providing fresh water to the livestock was with underground plastic pipe, run from a water well on the north end of the farm. Before the system was completed, the

cattle were having to walk in excess of one and one-half miles to water.

According to Christian, cattle were overgrazing range grasses near the water source and undergrazing grasses farther from the water. It is estimated by the stockman that the additional gains in steer weights will pay for the system in less than three years.

Elliston stated that the project was designed by the local Soil Conservation Service office with cost share assistance provided by the Great Plains Conservation Program. Anyone interested in this type of assistance

should contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Knox City.

SSI Meeting Well Attended

Approximately forty-five persons from Knox City, Munday, Benjamin, and Truscott attended the Supplemental Security Income meeting held here Monday afternoon in the Community Center.

Those attending were informed that many persons in Knox County may be eligible to receive gold colored Supplemental Security income checks, according to Mrs. Barbara Rafter, area director of the national search effort known as Project SSI Alert. Persons who now are receiving these checks are already on the rolls and persons who have already applied for a check to determine their eligibility should disregard this notice, she said.

"To be eligible to apply for a check of eligibility," explained Mrs. Rafter, "a person must be a United States Citizen or lawfully admitted alien, and must be either blind, disabled, or over 65 years old and in each instance, subject to the following income limitations. A single person, if working, must have an income not exceeding \$365 per month. If not working, the income must not exceed \$160 per month.

"A spouse of the applicant who is also eligible, must conform to respect to citizenship, blindness, disability, or age. Notice that blindness and disability may aid in qualifying one at any age. If the spouse is working, the combined income of the applicant and spouse must not exceed \$505 per month. If the spouse is not working, the combined income must not

exceed \$230 per month.

"Within certain limits of value, an applicant may be eligible while owning a home, automobile, personal possessions, and specified resources such as money, bonds, etc."

Persons who believe they may be eligible to receive supplemental security income are invited to call Annette Hester at the Welfare Office or Sequoyah Reynolds. Persons will be asked certain questions including his Social Security Number. Additional information will be required and questions will be answered after the completion of the second contact with volunteer personnel assigned to help. If one needs assistance in filling out the forms, he can contact
