In compliance with the United States Supreme Court ruling based on the one man. one vote basis, commissioner precinct lines were redrawn in February, 1973, with the precincts' being divided into four equal parts, based on population, amount of roads to be maintained, and equal revenue for each precinct. Each commissioner's precinct now has approximately 1,385 population.

Most Texas counties have completed their redistricting. However, Knox County's was not done until several Knox County residents requested it. In the event the commissioners court had not complied with the Federal ruling. the county would have been subject to redistricting by a Federal judge at the request of only one citizen.
