Munday, Sunset School Districts Are Consolidated

The question of consolidating the Munday and Sunset school districts, voted on last Saturday, carried in both districts—at Sunset by a bare seven-vote majority and at Munday by a 316 to 9 landslide.

In the Sunset district, the count was 77 against consolidation, and 84 for consolidation.

This week the county judge officially canvassed the votes and issued an order consolidating the two districts.

Petitions to annex 16,000 acres, or approximately 42 percent of the original Sunset district to the Knox City school district were filed with the County School Board today.

The lands are adjacent to the Knox City district.

At the request of the Munday school board, the county board delayed its decision on the matter until next week.

wit: J. B. Erbank, Jr., County Judge; O. L. Knight, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; L. A. Parker, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; C. A. Bullion, Commissioner Precinct No. 3; Geo. Nix, Commissioner Precinct No. 4; M. T. Chamberlain, County Clerk; and the following absent: None, constituting a quorum and among other proceedings passed the following order:

WHEREAS, this Court has investigated the submission to the resident property taxpaying qualified voters the question of submitting to said voters the proposition of voting additional ad valorem tax as provided by House Bill No. 107, Acts of the 51st Legislature, Regular Session, 1949, and this Court after said investigation is of the opinion that it would be beneficial to this county to call said election.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF KNOX COUNTY, TEXAS:
 That an election be held in said County on the 14th day of July, 1951, which date is sufficient to allow the posting and publishing of notices of said election as herein provided at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said county for their action thereon:

PROPOSITION
 To determine whether or not said county shall be authorized to levy, assess, and collect ad valorem taxes upon all property within said county, except the five \$1,000.00 valuation of residential homesteads, not to exceed 20 cents on each \$100.00 valuation in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of the State of Texas, provided the revenue therefrom shall be used for the construction and maintenance of Farm-to-Market and lateral roads, or for flood control, either or both, as the Commissioners' Court of said

County may determine as provided in House Bill No. 107, Acts, 51st Legislature, Regular Session, 1949.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:
 "For the Tax of Not Exceeding 20 Cents on Each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) Valuation"

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote. The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the General Election Laws of the State, except as modified by the provisions of House Bill No. 107, Acts, 51st Legislature, Regular Session, 1949, and none but resident property taxpaying qualified voters of said County who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote at said election.
 Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order on the same day in each of two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in said county, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen full days prior to the date set for said election. In addition thereto, a copy of this

order shall be posted in each voting precinct in said County not less than fourteen full days next before said election.
 The County Judge is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice to be published and posted as hereinabove directed and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officials and

 State of Texas voted in favor of
 a Constitutional Amendment

that would permit the counties
 after a local election to levy a
 30 cent ad valorem tax instead

 Knox County has called a
 special election for Saturday,
 July 14, for this purpose.

If approved by the voters, the
 tax will provide a 30 cent levy
 on each \$100 valuation over
 \$3,000. Regular homestead ex-
 emptions of \$3,000 will continue
 as it has been under the present
 state law.

This will NOT increase your

 stead of the State of Texas, as

Q. Will my present taxes be
 increased?

A. NO. The tax will be paid
 to Knox County instead of the
 State of Texas.

Q. Will my homestead be
 exempt?

A. YES, up to a value of
 \$3,000.00.

Q. What amount is exempt for
 homesteads now?

A. The State at present al-
 lows \$3,000 homestead exemp-
 tion.

Q. What will the money be
 used for?

A. To construct and maintain
 lateral farm roads.

Q. Will the value of my prop-
 erty be raised?

A. NO. This election will not
 change the values.

Q. Who can vote in this elec-
 tion?

A. Any qualified voter who
 renders property (real or per-
 sonal) for taxes.

Q. What is a qualified voter?

A. A person who paid his or
 her poll tax in January, 1951,
 or is entitled to a voting ex-
 emption. To vote in this elec-
 tion, the person must also have
 rendered either personal or real
 property or both for valuation
 in 1950.

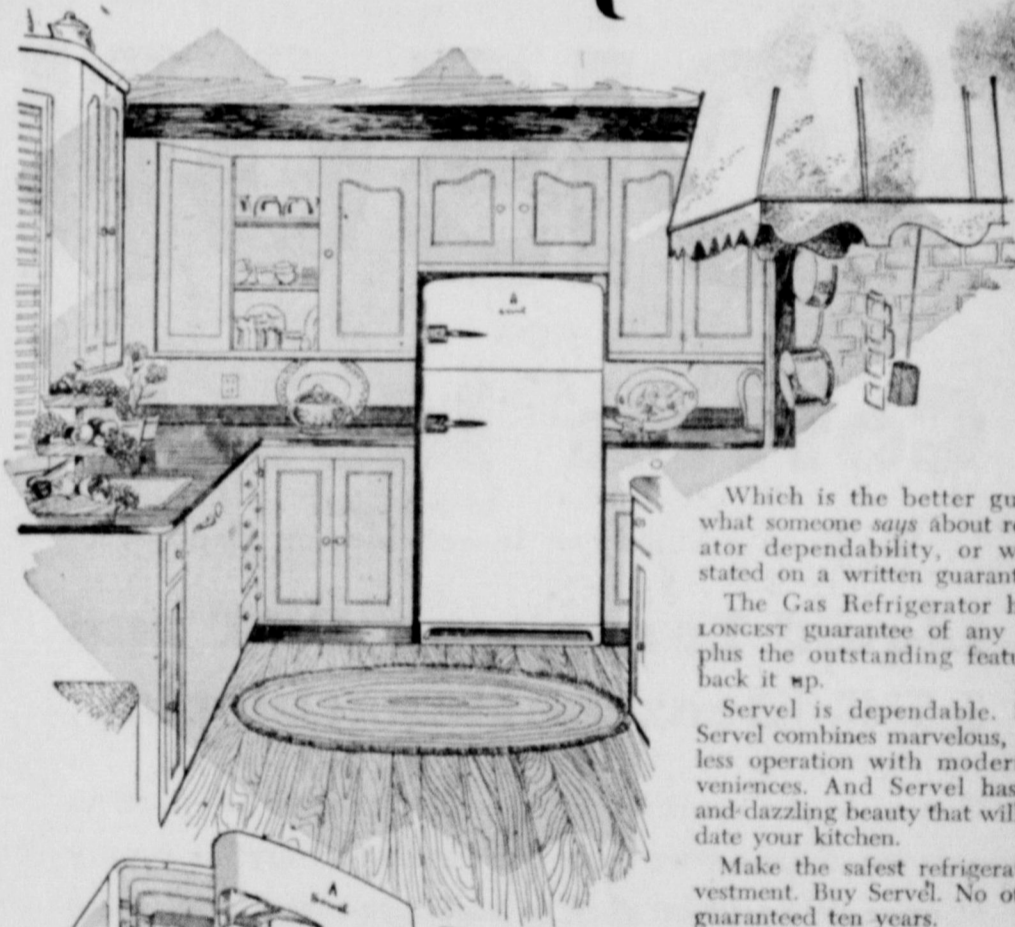

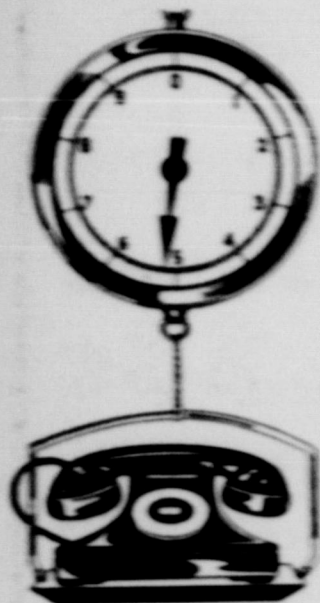
