CATTLE AND CREAM SHIPMENTS FROM HERE, SHOW GOOD PROFIT

This week has witnessed some lively scenes around the Orient Depot here. Hugh Rogers loaded out 129 steer yearlings which he had sold to Bean Robinson at Strawn, Texas. These yearlings are from very fine cows and sired by the imported purebred bulls of which we made mention some time ago. The yearlings brought \$65.00 per head, F.O. B. Knox City.

March 23rd to 30th was record cream week for Knox City shipments. During this time 410 gallons were billed out at the depot. Cream means money in the till of the producer each day of the year and goes a long way toward stapleizing the money circulation of any community.

James M. Craft, manager Burnett ranch, finished shipping out the last of his special fed baby beeves this week. Some time ago Mr. Craft shipped out 32 head, fed 90 days with an average weight of 820 pounds and on which, after deducting all expenses and feed accounts he made \$20.00 profit per head. This week he shipped 26 head, started at a lighter weight than the first but fed 120 days with an average weight of 749 pounds. The profit on these have not been computed yet as they were started to Ft. Worth Tuesday. With this shipment went 65 Red Duroc hogs which had run in the feed lots and averaged 277 lbs. The entire business will show a nice profit after all expenses are met.

WILL YOU HELP TO SAVE THE WILD FLOWERS?

A movement with which teachers and pupils in all the public schools of the country should be in sympathy is that for the protection and conservation of our wild flowers—a movement which has culminated in a National Wild Flower Day which will be observed in the schools each year on April 24th.

This movement which originated in California, so rich in beautiful flowers, is rapidly spreading through the United States. The wild flowers of the country, which a generation ago everywhere carpeted the woodlands, are in danger of extermination in every section which has been encroached upon by civilization. Unless this movement succeeds, the exquisite heritage of delicate and beautiful flowers of wood and field will be denied the children of the future.

What grown person of sensitive soul does not recall the perfect happiness of a day in the woods April or May and the discovery of the hosts of frail and lovely blossoms that peeped from the rich leafy mould beneath the lace gowned trees of Spring? Such days are to be counted among the most blessed in childhood, and memories of them are lasting. If the future generations are to know the same happiness, immediate measures must be taken in their behalf, for with the growth of communities, the drainage of marshes, the grazing of herds, the forest fires, the cultivation of former wooded tracts and worst of all, the ruthless destruction of wild flowers caused by "flower lovers" themselves, we are in danger of being stripped of one of our greatest assets of natural beauty.

The late Gene Stratton-Porter who did so much to save our wild flowers, wrote the following:

"I remember very distinctly that as a child the fence corners bordering the road I walked to school were filled in the spring with blue bells, sweet williams, and bloodroot. The woods were carpeted with the lovely pale flowers of early spring; and I lived to see the day of barren roads and straight wire fences which permit cultivation to come very close on the inside and the road keeper's scythes to shear to the limit on the outside. California talks a great deal about Eschscholtzia, but in four years, a part of the time being spent in field work, I have seen but one real bed of poppies. The yucca is also being exterminated and it is the glory of the mountains.

"Sincerely hope that every effort of any nature that you may make for the protection and preservation of the wild flowers will be successful. Whenever we deprive our land of music of the birds and the beauty of the flowers, we have made a place so barren and uninteresting that I for one would not care longer to live in it."

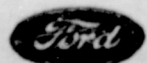

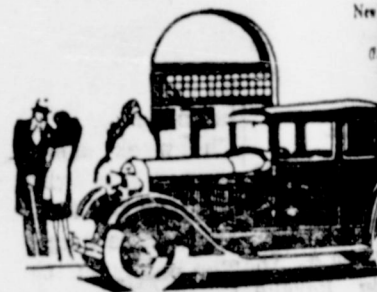

RED CROSS CHAPTERS STRENGTHEN FORCES FOR DISASTER RELIEF

Launch National Campaign to Perfect Preparedness Plans in Every Community.

A nation-wide campaign to strengthen plans for preparedness against disaster and for emergency relief has been launched by the American Red Cross through its Chapters. The program is intended to perfect disaster preparedness committees in the ten thousand communities reached by Red Cross Chapters and their branches. When carried out, through committees of men and women in the communities, it will insure that should a disaster come, an organization for emergency relief, including every modern method science has perfected—such as the radio, the airplane, the motor car and watercraft—can be mobilized to bring assistance, with the promptitude applied by the Red Cross in recent major disasters, such as the West Indies hurricane and the Mississippi Valley flood. These enlarged and strengthened plans for disaster relief are set forth in the revised Red Cross manual, "When Disaster Strikes," which has been placed in the hands of every Red Cross chairman throughout the nation. The plan to encourage adoption of these added disaster preparedness methods was begun at this time because Red Cross records—covering 48 years of disaster relief—show that the period of the greatest number of disasters, large and small, ranges from the early Spring through the early Fall.

The Record of 48 Years
A historical summary of Red Cross disaster relief since 1882, shows that the society was active in giving relief in 938 domestic disasters and its expenditures in those relief operations were \$49,594,000. The three groups of calamities appearing most frequently were: cyclones, tornadoes, hurricanes and other storms, 231; fires, 131; floods, 123.

During this period, the Red Cross also has given assistance to distressed peoples of other countries in 153 disasters. Total expenditures for relief at home and throughout the world, in 48 years, amount to \$77,354,000. In the four most recent major disasters, among the greatest which have ever visited the American continent, Red Cross expenditures for relief totalled \$29,158,908. Only in the event of large disasters such as the Florida hurricane of 1926, the Mississippi Valley flood of 1927, the New England flood of the same fall, and the West Indies hurricane of 1928, does the Red Cross seek contributions from the general public for relief work; and frequently these are not ample, as in the four disasters listed, the Red Cross donated \$1,338,291 from its own treasury to aid in the work. In the event of smaller disasters, the cost of the relief is met largely from Red Cross resources.

No Community Immune
No community is immune to great disasters of one type or another, the manual shows. One preparedness measure that can be adopted is a survey of the surrounding country, with the assistance of engineers and other experts to determine the type of disaster to which the section is subject. Hazards resulting from the presence of rivers and lakes, subject to overflow, of mines, munition factories, and other industries wherein dangers from explosion and fire may exist,

Extension of existing disaster organizations in communities, and organization of men and women, trained in public health and community service, will result in the saving of lives and the prevention of extensive suffering, through privation, epidemic and other misfortune, should emergency arise through disaster. These organization plans, outlined in the manual, are similar to those now existing in most Red Cross Chapters, only strengthened in some particulars. They contemplate disaster preparedness and relief committees, under which function sub-committees on food, clothing, shelter, medical aid, registration of disaster sufferers and information service, transportation and communication and finance. Co-ordination of all of the societies, organized groups and institutions in the locality is urged, so that all effort by emergency relief will be directed without conflict. Trained in advance, these committees can swing into action, and provide an orderly and systematic relief organization.

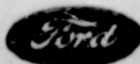

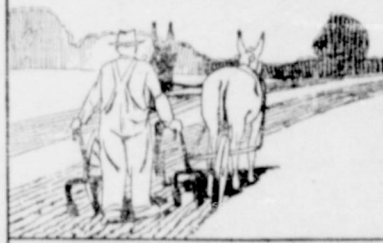
sister of the bridegroom, and Mr. James Wilkerson also of Dallas.

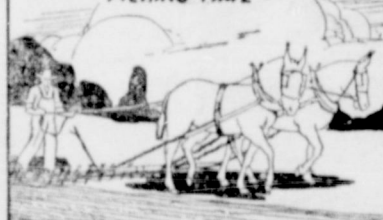

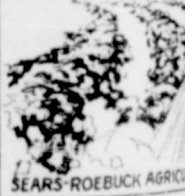
