## LOCAL CHURCHES PRODUCE FEW PREACHERS

In his closing service of the Revival meeting in the First Christian Church Sunday night, Reverend T. R. Gathright brought home a question that strikes at the heart of each church. He asked "what has your church done to furnish preachers and special workers for the promulgation of the word of God? Is your church supplying its rightful share of ministerial leaders, or is your church standing by while other churches of the country supply these needs?"

**What Knox City Churches Have Done**  
A study of output of the various churches of Knox City reveal the fact that few preachers have been called from among their memberships, likewise, a few special workers.

The First Christian Church was organized in 1909. In 1910 the present church building was erected. During these 26 years the church has not produced a minister; however, it is interesting to note that 75 percent of the preachers serving this church have been student preachers. In using student preachers, the membership states, "we have had a part in helping these student preachers stay in school or continue their studies."

### The Methodist Speak

A check over activities of the Methodist church show that it likewise has never produced a preacher. This church has had several persons volunteer for special work; but none of the volunteers ever fulfilled their order.

Although the Methodist church has never produced a preacher it has produced one young lady who became the wife of a preacher. While the two are not synonymous, the life of a preacher's wife is equally as important and useful as that of the preacher. Christmas, 1935, Miss Elsie Graham became the wife of Bedford Smith, preacher of the First Christian Church.

### Church of Christ Reports

The Church of Christ in Knox City has not yet produced a preacher, however, this week one of its young ladies became the wife of a minister of the church, Miss Beulah Dearing. This church has also produced a song leader, George Montandon.

### The Baptist Shows Better Work

The Baptist Church of Knox City makes a little better showing than other churches of the town. At present time one of Knox City's own Baptist boys, Oliver King, is studying for the ministry. Oliver has not been ordained but he has been licensed to preach and has preached in the local church.

The Baptist Church also had a hand in sending Miss Floy Hawkins Missionary, to China. Miss Hawkins was an O'Brien girl but churches throughout the district assisted in sending her.

### Preachers Come From Rural Churches

Men called from Knox and Haskell counties into the ministry seem to come from the Rural churches. Claude Stovall came from Gillespie, Bob Shepard and Shade Stevenson both came from rural churches. Miss Hawkins from the O'Brien church, and doubtless others, not mentioned here.

## BOY SCOUTS TO SEE THE CENTENNIAL

The Wichita Area Council, of which this county is a part, is planning on a Boy Scout Special to Dallas and Fort Worth Centennials. It is planned for an all expense trip of three days costing each boy \$8.00, for which the boys will receive:

- Transportation to Dallas and back to Wichita Falls
- Two nights lodging at Tent City in Dallas
- Six meals at Dallas
- Two admissions to Texas Centennial
- One admission to Texas Calvacade

### VALUE OF ADS TO STORES TOLD

The following article appeared in the daily papers last week:

Newspaper advertising is found more important than anything in leading women to choose the store at which to buy their dresses says a research study made public.

In Boston, the study found, 43 per cent of the women bought their dresses at the store whose advertising they liked best. To attract patronage says the report it is more important for a store to have the best liked advertising than it is to have a reputation for the best styles, best quality or the lowest prices.

The study was made by Charles C. Stech, research specialist and adviser on better selling, of New York City. More than 3,000 women were interviewed in Boston in the survey. Six leading Boston department stores were used as a basis for comparison. The advertising value of each Boston newspaper was studied.

"For selling of women's dresses" the report stated, "advertising is 16 percent more important than low prices; 27 per cent more important than style, and 24 per cent more important than quality."

The figures change in case of misses dresses. Their advertising is 21 per cent less important than low prices. But it is 21 per cent more important than style and 35 per cent more important than quality."

### ADVERTISING URGED AS MODERN METHOD TO HELP CHURCHES

Paid newspaper advertising and other modern mediums of controlling public opinion should be used by the churches, Lester Jordan, professor of journalism at Trinity University, Waxahachie, said Sunday in conducting religious services at the Lakow Presbyterian Church of Dallas. "Modern Methods for a Modern Message" was the subject of his talk.

"Regardless of the size of the budget of a church it should contain an appropriation for advertising," the college professor told his listeners. "Christ's message is just as modern today as it was 2,000 years ago, but the church must use modern methods to make that message known to the large number that are showing little or no interest in the work of the church."

"Before advertising, the church like any other institution should analyze itself and its product to see if it is ready for a public appearance. If there is no difference between the church member and the non-member, then the church has little to offer and advertising would be a waste, but if the church makes for a happier, more useful, more consecrated life, then it should proclaim its message to the world by every means of publicity known to man."

The speaker pointed out that the church, after appraising itself and remedying its weaknesses, should see that all factors in controlling public opinion—the family, the schools and colleges, books, magazines and newspapers, picture shows, radios, etc.—should become allies in making the United States a truly Christian Nation.

## The Public Debt Is the People's Burden

America, according to latest statistics, is now staggering under a collection of governmental debts—federal, state and local—which reach an all-time high of over Fifty-three Billion Dollars.

This total is called the Public Debt. But a clearer name might be the People's Debt, or better still, the People's Burden. For whether they realize it or not, it's the people who must pay—not only the workers and earners of the present generation, but those of generations to come.

And it's a heavy bill that the politicians are running up for you and your descendants. It means that no matter how carefully you've conserved your affairs, no matter how you and your family have sacrificed to make ends meet, you're in debt to the amount of \$415. That, say the statisticians, is the per capita share.

It means, further, that if you head a family of say five members, your family's share of the debt runs over \$2,000. If the family is larger, so is its ultimate burden.

Just who plunged us all so deeply into the red?

The statisticians have analyzed that, too. They point out that Thirty-four Billion Dollars of the debt—approximately \$264 per capita—was piled up by the Federal Government, while more than Nineteen Billions—approximately \$151 per capita—was loaded on the people by state and local governments; or, to be more accurate, by the officeholders who hold the reins of government.

It must be pleasant for office-holding politicians to feel that they've been so generous. It's always pleasant to be generous with other people's money. That's a bright side of the picture.

But there's a dark side, too! It's reserved for the public—for the workers and housewives of America—who now pay and will continue to pay for the politicians' generosity, not only in higher taxes, but in increased costs for virtually everything they buy.

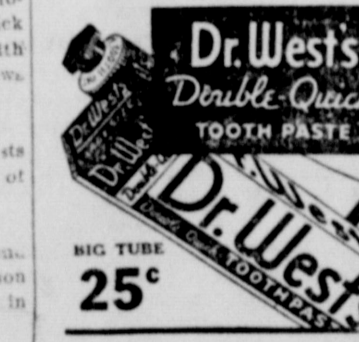

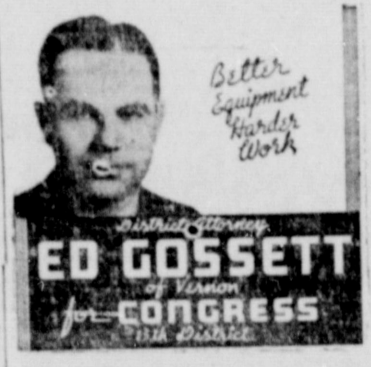

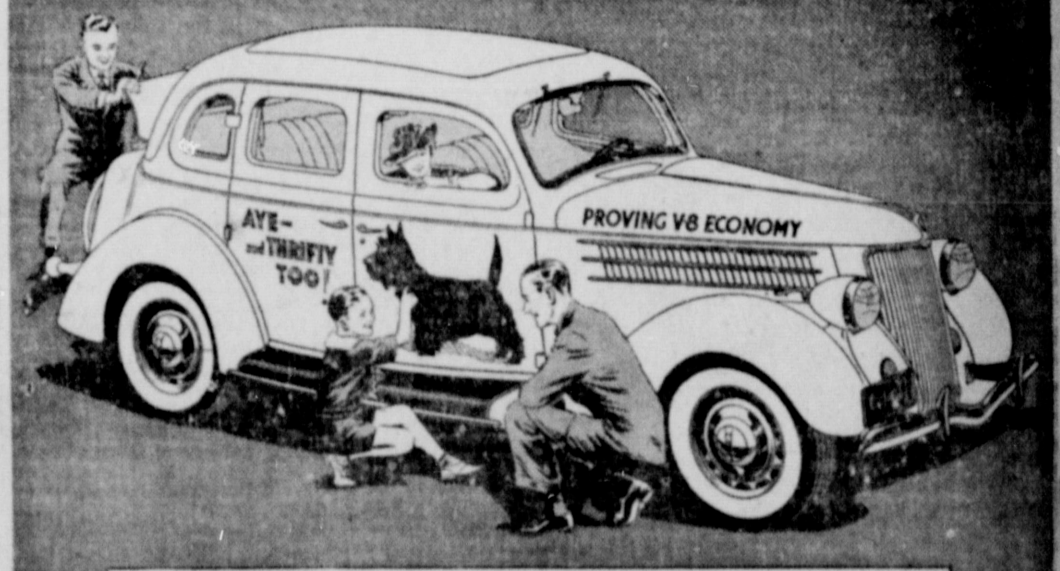
