## 'Hounds to Play In Regional Tilt In Lubbock Friday

For the second time in as many years, the Knox City Greyhounds will represent District 12-B in the Region 1-B basketball tournaments, which will begin tomorrow (Friday) in the Tech gym at Lubbock.

The 'Hounds were scheduled to leave for Lubbock this afternoon, and will meet Jayton, champion of District 8-B, Friday morning at 10:00 o'clock.

Should the 'Hounds win over Jayton, they will play Sudan, one of the top-rated teams in the tournament, Friday afternoon at 4:45.

Last year the local lads were soundly beaten by Gruver in their first game in the regional meet. Gruver went on to become State Class B. Champion, but this year was eliminated by Stratford in the District 1-B finals.

The Greyhounds won their trip to Regional, and the District 12-B crown, by defeating the O'Brien Bulldogs twice last week in the district play-off.

First game of the "two out of three" play-off was won by the Greyhounds on their home court Tuesday night of last week, Thursday night at O'Brien, the 'Hounds got off to a good start and had the heavy end of a 27-22 lead at half-time, but by the end of the game the Bulldogs had narrowed the lead to two points, 45-43. At the end of the game O'Brien had two free throws which would have tied the game, had they been made.

Before the play-off, O'Brien had won the double round-robin in the district, suffering only one conference defeat during the season, and Knox City was runner-up with two defeats—both at the hands of O'Brien.

The local volleyball girls also won over the O'Brien girls, champions of the district, last Thursday night.

Whether they win or lose at the Regional meet, local fans are well pleased with the record the Greyhounds have made this season. Fair play and good sportsmanship have been evident throughout the season, and the boys as well as their coaches, David Slaughter and Henry L. White, are to be commended.

All boys on the basketball team were also members of the Greyhound football team, which won the regional championship in six-man football last season.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Verhalen, in the North Knox City Palo Pinto lime pool, on completion tests last week flowed 124 barrels of oil and four barrels of water daily through 13-64-inch choke and casing perforations from 4-248 to 4-258 feet.

Stanolind No. 1 Mabel Wilson, tested the Mississippi lime at 5851-5900 feet, recovered 60 feet of mud, 150 feet of mud and salt water. Flow pressure was 0 to 100, bottom hole pressure, shut-in, 2400 lbs. in 15 minutes. Ellenberger was topped at 6130, and Wednesday afternoon tests were underway at 6226.

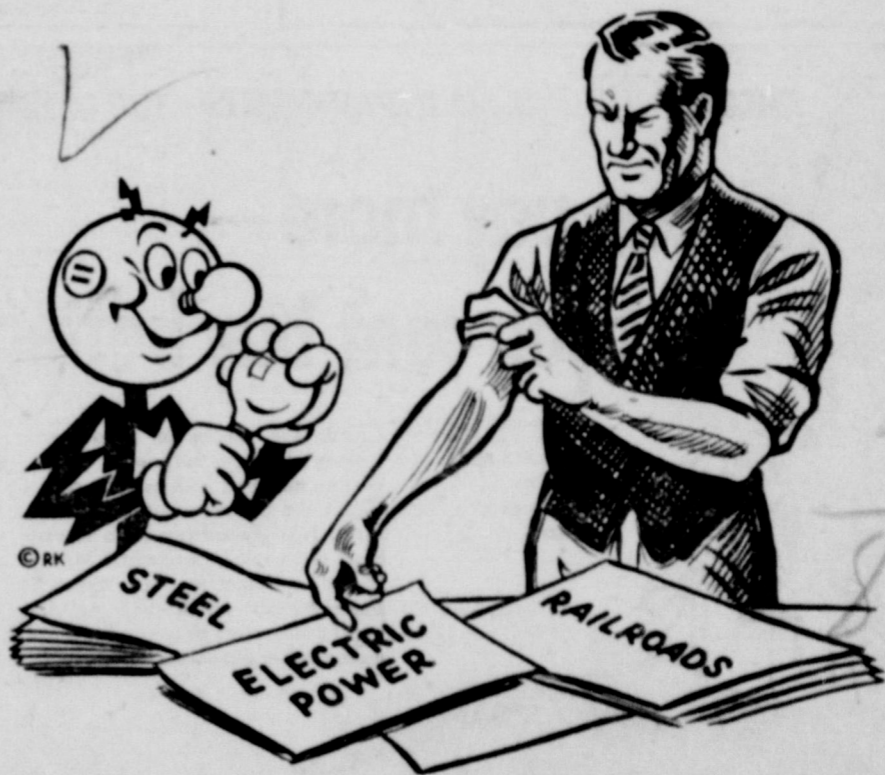

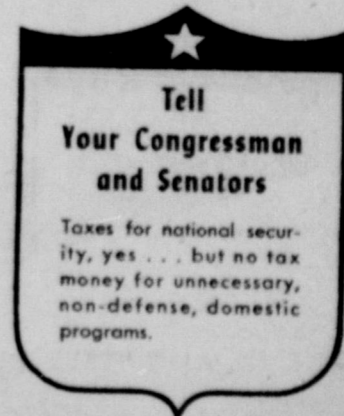

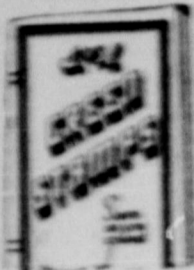

### GRASS CLIPPING COMPLETED BY CONSERVATIONIST

Grass clipping work has recently been completed by Marlton Everhart, Range Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, to show the difference between grasses in the amount of forage they will produce on an acre of range land. This is the third year this work has been going on in the Wichita-Beasom Soil Conservation District. The past three years have been a-bove average years for the production of grass, but on a comparative basis the study reflects a true comparison of the grasses involved.

An area of grassland is used in which all of the grasses are growing. The following grasses were used for the study: Buffalo grass, blue grama and side oats grama. The following figures were obtained this year for an acre of range: Buffalo grass 2317 pounds, blue grama 2022 pounds, and side oats grama 5444 pounds. It can be seen from this study that blue grama and side oats grama out-produced Buffalo by 126 per cent and 257 per cent respectively. Properly managed pastures in the district are composed of approximately the following percentages: Side oats grama 13 per cent, blue grama 91 per cent, and Buffalo grass 10 per cent. This means that an acre of this range this year produced 2000 pounds of forage.

About 45 per cent of the upland range in the district have been overgrazed for many years and are now composed of either 100 per cent Buffalo grass or have been invaded to a large extent by Tobacco grass. Tobacco grass is not eaten by livestock during the growing season except a small amount in early spring. A complete cover of

Buffalo grass that would represent a loss of 1781 pounds of grass per acre. According to the grazing of livestock on the range they prefer side oats grama first, blue grama second and Buffalo grass last.

The best way to right this condition, Soil Conservation Service technicians say, is to defer the grazing of these abused ranges during the seed producing season of side oats grama and blue grama. Also seeding of these grasses should be done in pastures where no grasses exist. The season of deferment is May 1 to August 1 for this area.

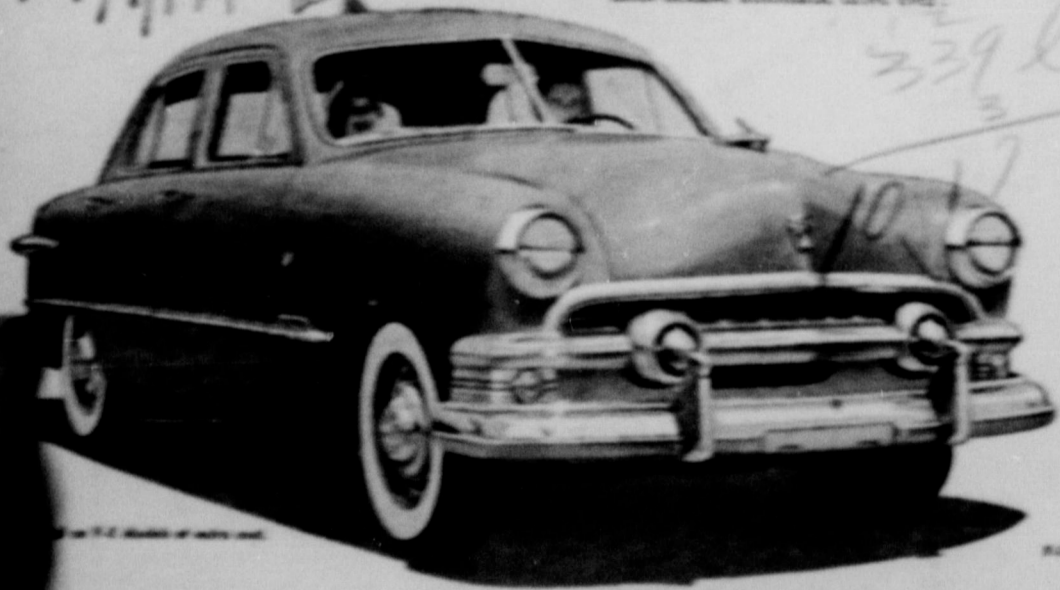
