

DRIFTING MEN MEAN DRIFTING SOIL, FSA TELLS LAND OWNERS

"Drifting men mean drifting soil," said Howard M. Williamson, Knox County Farm Security Administration supervisor, of the county to consider using the "flexible farm lease," a deat his office.

"This lease provides a method and an incentive," Mr. W1. liamson stated, "whereby tenants will remain on their land owners' farms for a longer period instead of moving every

"Men who own the soil are the ones most vitally concerned in this county. in bringing about improvements encouraging tenants to remain and to take care of the land as if it were their own," he said in appealing to landlords to consider the flexible lease and pounds. other current proposals to 1141prove tenancy conditions.

"The foundations of agriculture in this state are threatened by difficulties with the cotton industry," Mr. Williamson continued, "and it is imperative that we develop a system depending largely upon livestock and other diversified farm products. This cannot be done with farmers who stay on a place for only one or two dcorated with welcome signs build up their herds, develop for the 4-H boys. pastures and build barns and fences."

"It is not the purpose of the flexible lease," he explained, to benefit either land owner or tenant at the expense of the other. But it would stimulate mutual benefits, such as we already find in this very county, where some tenants have remained for a number of years and have planted orchards, built terraces and new buildings and improved old ones. Tenants of this type would be multiplied many times if assured that they will remain on ed the benefits of their labor and expense, or that they will be fairly repaid for these improvements should they be required to move through no fault of their own."

RAINEY ADDRESSES STATE LEGISLATURE

Austin, Feb. 14.-Free pubthe land until they have receiv- lic education is Democracy's chief bulwark, Dr. Homer P. Rainey, president-elect of the University of Texas, told Texas solons in joint legislative session last week.

In Austin for his first visit since his election last month as president of the State's largest educational institution, Rainey delivered the first college president's address to a State legis-

cited "training for citizenship and increasing the wealth of the people" as the immediate results of higher education. He later cited five general goals toward which he would work as University president after taking over the office early this summer.

He postponed his return trip to Washington in order to accept the legislature's invitation to speak. His address preceded by one day the first committoe hearing on University appropriations, for which has been requested a budget of \$2,-006,000 per year for the next two years.

After stressing the value of higher education to any state, Dr. Rainey set as "special op-portunities" for the University: Development of fact finding research institutes, provisions for an outstanding graduate school and ("most puzzling and acute problem") provision of a medium for "educating practically all of our youth who ask


