



Last year over twelve hundred persons met death in this manner and from the figures compiled so far for 1934 the number of deaths will be even greater.

Most of the automobile accidents occur on weekends or holidays. This s a surprising fact since fewer pedestrains are abroad and traffic congestion in towns and cities is less on Sunday than on other days of the week. This paradox may be explained ed drivers on the road, together with ther failure to observe traffic rules.

Some of the most frequent violatof traffic rules are: exceeding the speed lmit, driving on the wrong side of the road, faiulre to give right of way, and running without lights. The observance of rules and regulations is not enough to prevent accidents. The car itself must be in good shape, especially the brakes and steering connections. The common sense must be used in all situations.

The consequences of an automobile accident are so disastrous that no one can afford to stand on their legal rights in a situation of impending danger. Only if you have conceded such rights and have made every pos sible effort to avoid an accident, can you consider yourself blameless in case of accident.

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
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
