Three hundred and seventy-five agriculture loan officers of banks and county 55,000 Mexican National agents in West Texas were asked: "If a good, workable, new bracero program could be worked out between Mexico and the United States, how

many braceros do you esti-

mate would be needed in our county?" A tabulation of the replies from 112 of the 132 West Texas counties indicates a need for 55, 854 bracero agri-

culture workers. In a letter to President Gerald R. Ford dated October 3, J. Fike Godfrey, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce stated that "over a year ago on August 1, 1973, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce formally called for a reinstatement of the bracero program and, at that time, urged the West Texas members of Congress and the two Texas senators to work for the establishment of a workable

The 132 West Texas counties produce approximately 55% of Texas agriculture income and using this percentage as a projection for the state, it would seem to indicate that Texas agriculture might be able to use as many

as 100,000 bracero agriculture

The survey was made as a direct result of a newspaper wire service story on August 7 from Mexico City quoting the American Embassy's reply to the Mexican Government's request for reinstatement of a bracero-type program. The American position was outlined in a press statement issued by the embassy in reply to the Mexican proposal for an agreement on June 19. The American press statement noted, "very limited numbers of imported workers are needed by the United States....There exists a serious unemployment situation among farm workers in the United States...
