## Henry Jean Jones Frank Glove Rites Held Saturday

Another empty saddle we hung up in the shed last we another vacant spot in the cir-cle of old-time cowhands group-ed around a bright campfire, marked by the passing of Frank Glover, pioneer Knox County ranchman.

Mr. Glover, 74, died in the Knox County Hospital at Knox City last Friday, after a long illness. Funeral services were held in the District court room at Benjamin Saturday, March 30, at 3 p. m., with Rev. J. T. McKissick and Bobby Fail of Benjamin conducting the last rites. Burial was made at Ben-jamin where Mr. Glover had lived for years.

Theron Frank Glover was born in Grayson County, Texas, November 27, 1871. His parents moved to Bentonville, Ark., fo few years, but came back Graham when Mr. Glover of seven years old. He lived to until the age of 17, or when he moved to Knox ty while it was get a wis ranching count






