United Methodists To **Convene In Abilene**

United Methodists will ponder the current layout of their districts when the 68th session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference meets May 31 through June 2 in Abilene.

A committee headed by Dr. Charles Lutrick will make recommendations to ministers and delegates at the upcoming gathering in Abilene's St. Paul United Methodist Church.

Dr. Lutrick, pastor of First UMC of Midland, and his group have given intensive study to the boundaries of the current Abilene, Amarillo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Pampa, Plainview and Seymour districts. A reduction in number is possible.

Conference preacher for the 68th session is Dr. Claus Rohlfs, a member of the faculty of Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University since 1968.

Dr. Rohlfs has been frequent speaker in the Northwest Texas Conference. He delivered the 1971 Willson Lecture series at McMurry College and in 1975 led a Discipleship Conference at McMurry.

Rohlfs was born at Innien in Schleswig-Holstein in Germany in 1921 and came to the U.S. with his family is 1931. He grew up in New Jersey. After Army service in the Pacific in World War 11, he entered the Methodist ministry.

He earned his bachelor's from Philadelphia's Temple University and his graduate divinity degree from SMU's Perkins. McMurry honored him with a doctor of divinity degree this spring.

week for the scheduled mo-Sales Tax Checks Reflect Increase

AUSTIN -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday his office has mailed monthly city sales tax rebate checks totaling \$22 million to 867 Texas cities and towns that assess the one percent tax.

The May checks bring to \$235.3 million the total rebates for the eight months of the current fiscal year, a \$44 million increase over the same perion for fiscal 1976, Bullock said.

But he cautioned that the 23 percent increase is somewhat misleading.

"The May rebate check actually covers collections for a five week period instead of the usual four weeks, so the June checks obviously will be smaller." he said.

Bullock said that procedural changes have resulted in a substantial increase in early filings by sales tax permit holders, also inflating the year-to-date total.

The pecan nut casebearer is the major pest of Texas pecans. In early spring, the larvae of the overwintered generation feed first in buds and then in developing shoots causing them to wilt and die. Larvae of succeeding generations feed on nuts during late spring and summer. Severe infestations may destroy the entire pecan crop if some control measures are not taken. The adult is a light gray moth about 1/2 inch long. The wings are gray, and the forewings have a ridge of dark scales across them about a third the distance from the base. The moths fly at night and are concealed during the day.

Young larvae and first white to pink in color, but later become olive green and attain a length of about 1/2 inch

This insect overwinters as a partially grown larva in a tiny silken cocoon called a hibernaculum, which is usually attached to the base of a bud. In spring, larvae feed for a short time on buds, but soon begin tunneling in developing shoots until reaching maturity. Moths from these overwintered generations emerge in late April or May.


Two or three days after adult females emerge, they deposit from 50 to 150 eggs on the tips of nuts. Eggs, just visible to the naked eye, are greenish white when deposited, but later become reddish. After larvae hatch, the egg shell is opaque white and remains in place

Chemical control for the pecan nut casebearer should be applied in Knox County from May 26 - 28. The appearance of eggs on the tips of the pecans indicates that control measures should be applied within the next few days. The first application should be applied to coincide with the first casebearer entry into a small pecan. A second application five to seven days

It's "inventory time" for proper home canning equipment -- an absolute "must" for safe, high quality home-

canned foods. Below are some recommended guides for proper

home canning equipment: Lids -- A two-piece self-seal lid is the most commonly used and reliable lid. Other new lids are appearing on the market so follow manufacturer's instructions to make

sure lids seal properly and hold the seal during handling and storage.

Water bath canner -- Use any large kettle with straight sides, a tight-fitting lid and a rack to keep jars off the bottom of the kettle. Kettles should be deep enough to hold jars upright and permit the water to boil gently one to two inches over the jar tops.

The boiling water bath is recommended for canning fruits, fruit juices, tomatoes, rhubarb, and pickled vege-



Take off removable petcock and safety valves, wash and dry thoroughly. Soak in vinegar to remove any corrosion.

Use a toothpick or pipe cleaner to clean openings in lid of canner.

Use fine steel wool and soap to wash bottom part of pressure canner.


To remove any odors and stains, combine juice of one lemon - or two tablespoons vinegar - with two quarts of water. Process at five pounds pressure for five minutes.

Grease (using vegetable oil) the closing surfaces of metal-to-metal-sealing pressure canners if lid is difficult to remove or steam escapes.

Replace gasket if rubber has hardened.

Check dial gauge on pressure canner. Clean weighted gauge thoroughly.
