Welcome To Knox City, Air Tour Guests!

'Hounds And Wildcats Tie' Showdown At Munday Friday

The Knox City Greyhounds and the Archer City Wildcats knotted a 14-14 tie before a large crowd here Friday night leaving both teams undefeated in District II-A football action and setting the stage for the top game of the season when the 'Hounds play at Mogul Stadium in Munday Friday night.

Archer City started the scoring early in the first quarter when quarterback Casey Rogers ran 52 yards on a keeper and Wildcat David McDaniel kicked the conversion for a score of 7-0 which stood pat for the remaining 8:32 of the quarter and up through half time.

The Greyhounds stormed back early in the third period and scored on a 45 yard run by fullback Charlie Lieb. The PAT kick by Ivan Logsdon sailed wide of its mark and with 8:15 left in the third quarter the score read 7-6.

The Wildcats cranked up a 55 yard drive in 15 plays for a lead of 13-6 and McDaniel's kick added another point.

The hustling 'Hounds were not to be denied and set out on a 72 yard drive which ended on fourth down when Lieb cracked

ed over from the one yard line. Quarterback Mike Newton passed to end Rogers Lankford to knot the final score, 14-14.

According to KC's Coach Charles Hibbitts, Archer City plays a tough defense but both teams had opportunities to win. He added that his team realizes that it has much at stake in this week's game with Munday. The Moguls finished the '68 season with a 4-5-1 record and boast 12 lettermen and 10 starters. Average backfield speed figures 10.3 and all-district end Wayne Bufkin has maintained a good record this far in the season. According to earlier speculation, Knox City could easily replace Munday or one of the other top four teams picked to win in District II-A play. Victory has been tasted and the pieces are about

to fall into place.

A tremendous crowd is expected to turn out for the game since Friday night is open date for many area teams. Game time is 8 p.m. at Mogul Stadium in Munday.

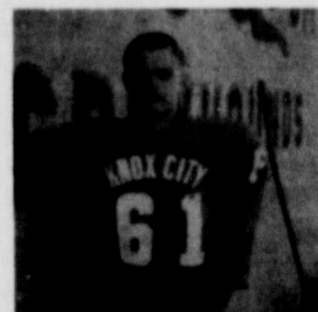
KC Country Club To Host Golf Tournament Sunday

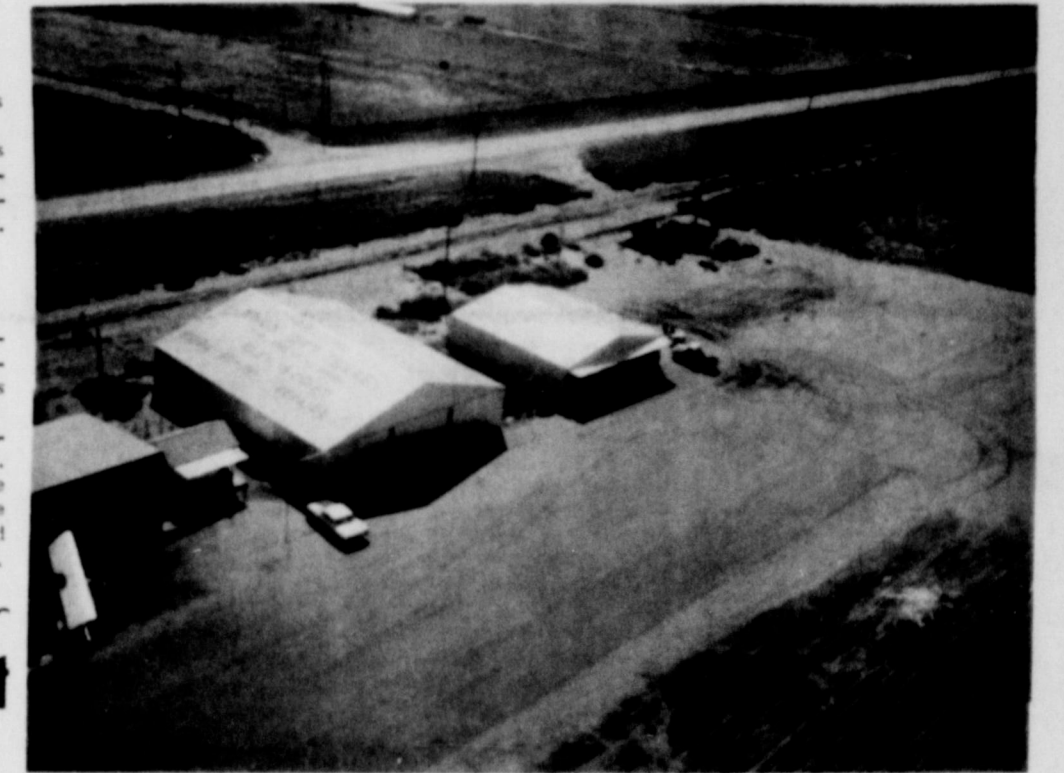
Fans are asked to take note of these two changes and attend the games.

Cotton Classing

The weather has slowed harvesting, just as it was gaining momentum. Grades of samples were improving too, says B. B. Manly, Jr., in Charge of the U. S. D. A.'s Cotton Classing Office, Abilene, Texas. Grades were beginning to improve, indicating that cotton had been killed and stripped before rain. Earlier some cotton had been killed and received several rains before it could be harvested. Reports indicate a lot of cotton has been defoliated this week and weather permitting, the harvest should get underway next week.

A breakdown of grade, staple, and mike for last week is as follows: GRADES - 31, 6 per cent; 40, 1 per cent; 41, 15 per cent; 51, 10 per cent; 61, 2 per cent; 32, 5 per cent; 42, 41 per cent; 52, 15 per cent; 33, 1 per cent; 43, 3 per cent; and 3 per cent of the samples classes were bark bales, STAPLE - 28, 6 per cent; 29, 49 per cent; 30, 34 per cent; 31, 6 per cent; 32, 2 per cent; 33, 1 per cent; 34, 1 per cent; and 35, 1 per cent. MIKE - 3, 3-3.4, 2 per cent; 3.5-4.9, 95 per cent; and 5.0-5.2, 3 per cent.

The Consumer and Marketing Service had no prices to report this week as most producers are busy harvesting and have not had time to sell their cotton.

Farm and Ranch News

CROP REPORTS NEEDED FROM FARMERS

During the last half of October some 35,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop questionnaire from Cary Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U. S. D. A., to provide a program of county estimates for Texas.

There are 254 counties in Texas and each farmer in each county is an important part of the State's agriculture. Reports are needed from farmers receiving questionnaires to provide accurate estimates for

Texas crops.

We urge each farmer to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly to the self-addressed envelope to the Agricultural Statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the State.

LEGUME FADING OUT

The legume "fading out" problem is probably due to two reasons - inadequate fertilization and thick grass sod.

Legumes have poor root systems while grasses "eat at the first table" leaving the legumes to get the remaining food. Legumes should be fertilized in the fall and phosphorous and potassium should be included since they make for

strong seedlings.

Fertilizing grasses during the spring and summer encourages the development of strong root systems and intensifies the problem of establishing legumes in the grass sod.

As an aid to getting legume seed germination and plant establishment, it is suggested that grasses be grazed closely or cut short for hay in the fall. And further that a soil test be made to determine whether or not lime is needed and also the kinds and amount of fertilizer required. Lime should be applied as early as possible.

A cool season grass, such as rye, is suggested as a companion for the legumes to increase forage production and reduce the bloat hazard in cattle.

SAFETY IN THE HOME

Shoe polish, oven cleaner, hair waving lotion, wax - they don't sound harmful but

these commonly used household items can be. Add to the list kerosene, bleach, toilet cleaner, medicine, turpentine, lighter fluid, deodorant, dry-cleaning fluid and plant spray and you have a formidable list of potential dangers in your home.

Why? Because each product contains some hazardous substance that could cause illness or death if taken internally. Of course, it would be inconvenient, if not impossible to stop using these items in the home. But you can do the next best thing - protect the family, especially the young children, from accidental contact with these and other products.

Know what you are buying. Examine the labels - read the small print. Look for these words - cautions or warning indicates the material is a hazardous substance. "Danger" refers to products defined as highly toxic.

Some of the labels will carry the skull and crossbones of a legally recognized poison. Or there may be the statement, "Keep out of reach of children."

Labels give an indication of the principal hazard in such words as "flammable", "vapor harmful", "causes burns", "absorbed through the skin."

Information on container labels is there for the protection of the user but it does little good if it is not read and followed.

TWIG GIRDLER

In late summer of early fall the female twig girdler, a long-horned beetle, lays its eggs in twigs of mimosa, hickory, oak, pecan, persimmon, apple, pear, peach, elm, poplar and dogwood trees and then girdles these twigs. Twigs from one-fourth to one and one-half inches in diameter may be girdled. The girdled twigs soon fall to

the ground and many twigs may be found on the ground under a severely infested tree.

The eggs hatch into small larvae which begin to feed in the twigs and here the winter is passed. The following spring the larvae develop rapidly and after pupation, the adults emerge in late August or early September.

Removing girdled branches and burning them will reduce damage from the twig girdler the following year.

For further information concerning this or other insects attacking fruit or ornamental trees, contact your county Extension agent.

Fall Grazing Opens On Diverted Acres

Acresage diverted under the 1969 feed grain and wheat programs may now be used for livestock grazing. A. J. Navratil Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, has announced. Grazing could have begun as early as Oct. 15, 1969.

We reminded farmers that under normal circumstances no grazing is permitted on acreage still under contract in long-term land retirement programs such as the Conservation Reserve and the Cropland Adjustment Program. In counties designated for emergency assistance because of natural disaster, county ASC committees may permit haying and grazing on these lands.

Today's announcement affects only livestock grazing on land diverted under annual commodity program. No diverted acreage may be harvested, again with the exception of those counties designated for the emergency program, where both grazing and haying may be permitted by county committees.

Diverted acreage is land set aside from crop production by farmers participating in vol-

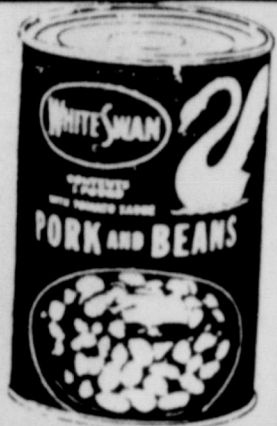

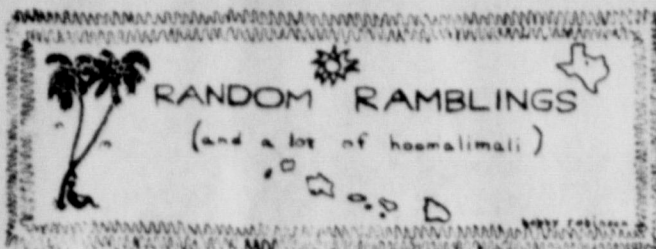

The Sergeant listed some factors why driving is more hazardous at night than during the day. (1) Reduced visibility prevents drivers from seeing hazards. (2) It has been longer since most drivers have slept and the resulting fatigue increases perception reaction time. (3) It is easier for drivers to become confused and panic. (4) More drinking drivers will be on the road.

These factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed cause accidents that would not occur in daytime.

On Sunday, the seventh of September, a friend of mine and his wife came by for me to go on a tour of the island of Oahu. It's really amazing that there is as much difference between the leeward side of the island and the windward side as there is between a desert and a garden.

From here at Barbers Point to Honolulu was a routine trip, with very little beautiful scenery to look at, unless it's your first visit to this state. But after we slipped through the northwest outskirts of Honolulu, it didn't take long to get into the lush green mountains north of the city. Trees - tall, green, and stately - stood almost everywhere, alongside the road, in gullies, on mountainsides, and atop the mountains. Sometimes the trees and vines got so thick the sun was blotted out, and the clouds were so low over the mountains that the tops were covered.

Our first stop after winding along the tree-lined highways was at the Nuanu Pali, or the Pali Lookout, which is a steep cliff overlooking the northeast shores of Oahu and the towns of Kailua and Kaneohe, where is located the Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station. Here a person can see for miles and miles over jagged mountain peaks, a plush golf course, rolling verdant hills, and the blue Pacific Ocean. Here is supposedly the windiest spot on the island, where winds sometimes reach up to near 80 miles per hour or more. The cool breezes up here in the mountains make for a very comfortable temperature.

Small Business Development Center To Get \$36,700 Grant

Governor Preston Smith announced Monday of his approval of a Community Action grant for \$36,700 in new federal funds to the Small Business Development Center of Aspermont, Texas.

This grant, under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, also authorized use of carryover funds in the amount of \$689, making a total of \$37,390 assigned for a 12 month period beginning October 1, 1969, to this agency's economic development program.

Established in 1965 and serving 17 rural counties in West Texas, the SBDC strives to assist and direct those persons from low income and minority groups by the screening and processing of applications to the Small Business Administration for Title IV loans to initiate or expand small businesses, as well as arranging for other sources of credit for the needy. The SBDC also provides management training and counseling for loan recipients and for potential applicants for loans.

In carrying out the overall program, the center has been enlisting services from each community served. Groups who have assisted include pro-

fer, Donley County; Loy Landes, Fisher County; Glen Goodwin, Foard County; Carl H. Wood, Hall County; Simon Phifer, Hardeman Co.; Clyde Grice, Haskell Co.; Johnnie Cedilla, Jones Co.; A. B. Coppedge, King County; Ray Escobar, Knox County; Robert C. Clem, Motley County; Butler Lewis, Wilbarger County.

The program of the SBDC provides one to one counseling, screening, assistance in preparation of applications, and financial assistance, which the Small Business Administration is unable to provide because of limited staff.

In the four years of operation, the SBDC has processed approximately 245 loans, with a total approved in the amount of \$1,761,200.

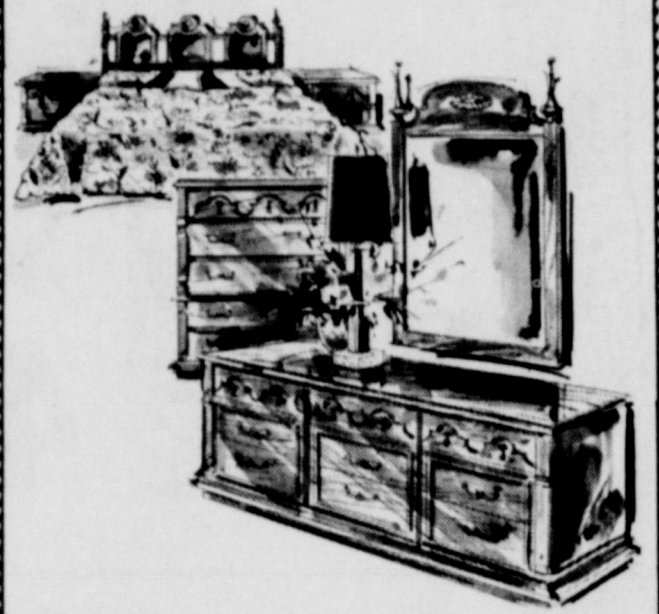
