## Fall Range Conference Held At Plant Materials Center

Knox City - Range conservationists from Texas and Oklahoma gathered at the James E. 'Bud' Smith Plant Materials Center located four and one half miles northwest of Knox City for the fall range conference September 25 and 26.

According to Jake Garrison, PMC manager, the purpose of the meeting was to observe seed production blocks and promising plant materials being grown there. The range conservationists are charged with plant collections of various species on eroded or denuded rangeland in Oklahoma and Texas.

The collections are then numbered and planted for observation here at the Knox City center. The most promising plants are then moved into larger plantings for further evaluation and 'selection' in order to reduce numbers. Where commercial varieties are available for a species, they are used as a standard.

Plants are rated on seed production, foliage and leaf production, winter injury, resistance to disease and insect damage, and regrowth after clipping.

Approximately 500 rows were evaluated that had gone through one or two winters and 225 new accessions that were planted in May of this year. Holding the range conference at the center keeps the range conservationists informed on center production, enabling them to key the seed placement into climatic and soil characteristics to best fit the natural range of adaptation. This also makes for a sound range reseeding program in the states served by the center.

W. Miller, Regional Plant Material Specialist for the Northwest, Portland, Oregon; Don Merkel, Plant Material Specialist for New Mexico and Colorado; Arnold Davis, Plant Material Specialist for Texas; and Leaford Windle, SCS representative at the Los Lunas, New Mexico Plant Materials Center.

## KC 'Hounds Drop VV Warriors 40-0 In Friday's Contest

The Knox City Greyhounds defeated the Valley View Warriors here Friday night by a score of 40-0.

Scoring began early in the second quarter with a 5-yard run by fullback Charlie Lieb. The PAT was kicked by Ivan Logsdon. Lieb added another touchdown in that quarter with a 22-yard gallop and the PAT was wide making the score 13-0.

With 2:45 left in the first half of the game, Lieb again scored with a 3-yard run and the point after was made with a pass from quarterback Mike Newton to end Rogers Lankford, bringing the score to 21-0 at halftime.

The third quarter was a defensive stand-off and scoring started early in the fourth quarter when speedy defensive guard Joe Barnard intercepted a Warrior pass and raced into the end zone for a TD. The run by Barnard for the PAT failed and the next Greyhound score came on a 35-yard pass by quarterback Mike Newton to end Rogers Lankford. Logsdon's kick for the extra point failed.

making the score 33-0. The final score came with 5:05 left in the contest, when tailback Alan Orr scampered 14 yards around right end and a point after kicked by Logsdon tallied 40-0.

The Greyhounds defense was even more outstanding and the Warriors were held to only two first downs.

Coach Hibbitts remarked that the 'Hounds have yet to be scored on by rushing play this season and they have had a punt return, a kick-off return, and a field goal scored on them for a total of 17 points while their scoring totals 67 points.

The KC Greyhounds will meet the Crowell Wildcats here this Friday night at 8:00 o'clock for the first District 11-A game of the season. It has been awhile since the 'Hounds have won a district game but good fortune is sure to come with the boys who make up this year's team. It would be especially rewarding to begin with Crowell and reverse last year's score of 36-6.
