## YOUTH DROWNS FRIDAY IN SWIMMING ACCIDENT

A swimming party celebrating the closing of school ended in tragedy Friday when Kenneth Posey, drowned in a stock and irrigation tank 6½ miles northeast of Knox City.

Kenneth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman L. Posey, who live on another Clonts farm, was swimming with Doyle Gene Wilson, 15, Glen Dale LeMont, 13, and Earl Barfield, 13.

According to the other boys Kenneth swam to a partly-submerged barrel, and when the barrel went under he could not swim out. He was pulled from the water by Wilson, and artificial respiration was tried by the boys and by Hollis Gideon, oilfield worker who arrived on the scene.

Investigating the accident were Sheriff H. T. Melton, Deputy H. C. Stone, Justice of the Peace W. E. Lovelace, County Attorney Tom Bullington and Dr. C. G. Markward. Lovelace returned a coroner's verdict of accidental death by drowning.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church at 4 p. m. Saturday with Rev. Billy Frazier, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home.

Survivors besides the parents are a brother, Bobby, and two sisters, Charlene and Kathy.

# Ceremony Tuesday to Open Little League Season

Little League baseball—summer recreation program launched by the Knox City Lions Club and now sponsored by the Little League Association and various interested individuals—will get under way Tuesday night on the new baseball field east of the Knox City High School.

A short ceremony dedicating the field will be held, with Mayor Otis Harbert making the dedicatory address. The season will officially start when J. G. Robin, for whom the field will be named, tosses out a ball to the starting pitcher.

The dedication ceremony will start at 6:05.

Everyone in the area was urged to attend, and help get the season off to a good start. No admission will be charged, but the hat will be passed to pay for electricity and other expenses.

The four teams in the league are the R. A.'s, managed by Gary White; the Cards, managed by Eddie Shaver and coached by Bud Carver; the Braves, managed by R. P. Barnard and coached by Buster Hodges; and the Tigers, managed by Charles Reese and coached by Fuller Shannon. The Braves are composed principally of O'Brien boys.

Boys left in the minor league may be assigned to other teams for practice, and may later make the majors, Sammy White, president of the Little League Assn., said.

Each team will play every other team six times during the season, with the winner of the first half meeting the winner of the second half in a play-off series for the league championship. Games will be on Tuesday and Thursday nights, with two games each night. The twilight game will begin at 6:15 and the night game at 8.

The opening games pit the R. A.'s against the Cards in the twilight game and the Tigers vs. the Braves in the night game. The same teams will meet again on Thursday night, with the times reversed.

White said each game will be started on time. An inning of the twilight game cannot be started after 7:45.

Wesley Garrison will be head scorekeeper, and Joe Murray Clonts is chairman of the umpire committee. A committee of mothers will operate the concession stand at the games with Mrs. C. E. Williams as chairman.

## Two Honored for Soil Conservation

Lester Brooks, head of the Wichita Valley Experiment Station at Iowa Park, was guest speaker at the Wednesday noon meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

Brooks, a former district governor of Lions International, was introduced by Jack Idol, supervisor of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District.

Speaking on "Our Changing Agriculture," Brooks pointed out some of the changes that have occurred in agriculture in the past 20 years. He remarked that in 75 percent of the crops planted in 1954, seed varieties used were not even in existence in 1935. Other changes include an increased average milk production of 32 percent per cow, and hens lay an average of 50 percent more eggs.

Still more efficient production is the goal of agricultural research for the future, he continued, since 40 percent more food and fiber must be produced by 1975 to properly feed and clothe the increasing population.

Mr. Brooks also listed some of the highlights of research conducted by the Texas A & M College System in recent years.

B. B. Campbell, Knox City banker, presented a plaque to Henry Smith of Weiner, a supervisor of the soil conservation district. The "outstanding supervisor" plaque was furnished by Texas Bank & Trust Co. of Dallas.

Ray Blackwell, SCS work unit supervisor, introduced A. L. Ressel, Sunset community farmer, who was recognized by the board of supervisors for his outstanding overall soil and water conservation program. Blackwell listed some of the practices being followed by Ressel, and those interested in conservation were invited to visit his farm.



## H-D Notes . . .

Miss S. C. Kinsey, County Home Demonstration Agent

Mrs. H. P. Gillespie, Truscott, has early tomatoes to be proud of. They were set early and covered with hot caps for two or three weeks. They were blooming when most of us were setting out tomatoes. She hopes to have ripe tomatoes soon. In a day or two, the first early squash will be ready to gather.

Vegetables and young summer flowers are making rapid growth, but it will pay to keep a close check on insect damage. It is easier to keep insects in check if control measures are used while they are young. A good plan is to use regular applications of an all purpose garden insecticide dust every seven to 10 days. These all-purpose garden insecticides contain a

At this season of the year, thrip may be found on gladiolus. If present, they cause leaves and flower buds to be streaked with

gray, and after the buds turn brown they become dry and ten fail to open. Thrip on gladiolus can be controlled by applications of DDT, lindane, toxaphene dusts or sprays according to the manufacturer's directions.
