

The Rev. Mike McKinney of Houston officiated. Burial was in Cross Cut Cemetery six miles south of Cross Plains.



## Animal Bites, Rab'ies, The Beginning of Serious Problems In County

**COUNTY-It seems lately** that we have a preponderance of bites inflicted by domestic animal pets and this cannot be regarded at this point as accidental injuries, and precursors of infectious processes. But it is being considered now as a whole disease entity and public health problem to our County.

Most people don't realize that there is another complication of animal bite which is the phychological trauma suffered by victims and their families.

In our County there were 2 episodes of Rabies bites which wherein one dog was confirmed by a test done at Austin, and the other had signs and symptoms manifesting rabies infection, although no appropriate test could be done on account of tissue lack.

The rool of skunks in the transmission of Rabies to unimmunized domestic and wild animals has been related to the following: 1. High level and long period of rabies viral secretion in the saliva, 2. A long incubation period in some cases 3. The carnivorous nature of skunks, 4. A general distribution of skunks through out Texas, 5. A natural tendency for dogs to come in contact with skunks.

I am going to outline

the most important part of the aspect of the prevention of rabies in humans. It is worthy to follow these specific guidelines established by the Texas Department of Health. 1. Emphasis is needed to increase public awareness of the potential threat of Rabies infection and of the ways to avoid possible Exposure. The avoidance of contact with animals exhibiting unusual behavior, is especially important. 2. Pet dogs and cats should be given Rabies vaccinations, although most of the rabies infections occur in wild life, human rabies exposures most often result from domestic animals, of these dogs account for most human exposures. 3. Stray and unwanted dogs and cats should be controlled. 4. Animals which bite or otherwise possible expose a person should be properly marked. (a) Healthy owned dogs and cats which have possibly exposed a person to rabies infection should be confined and observed under the supervision of a Vetenarian for 10 days, if signs suggestive of rabies develop, the animal must be humanely killed and the head submitted for Laboratory examination. (b) The Stray or unwanted dogs or cats that may have exposed a person should be killed immediately, and the head submitted for examination.

(c) Wild animals that may have exposed a person should be killed immediately, without damage to the head, and the head submitted for examination.

At the time of the bite it is imperative then that the person bitten must be brought to Medical attention. Your family doctor will be able to give you guidelines to follow which will help you prevent secondary infection or prevent rabies infection by itself. Your family physician will be able to assess whether you will have prophylactic treatment which is a preventative way of treating secondary infections.

It is very important not to let the biting or attacking animal get away. That animal has the only key with which to correctly answer the question, should antirabies treatment be given?

With these facts presented by me, I wish the cooperation of all physicians, veterinarians, animal control workers, and especially the Local Government Officials are needed for a successful outcome of these programs. We have a lot of stray dogs and we don't have any ordinances to protect people from the spread of the disease. If we can follow these guidelines we will be able to prevent secondary infections and it would be the best for our Community and the whole County.

#### **Abernathy Gets** Recognition Certificate


