### Box Rent To Increase July 1

Post office box rent is scheduled to increase starting July 1, according to Postmaster Jeff Graham.

The United States Postal Service is raising rates in all perfect, neither is man, but U.S. Post Offices as part of an effort to get the system out of the red. Box rent rates are set according to the size of each

There are nine different categories of post offices ranging from a Rural Contract Station (which handles mail but is not an official post office) to a Class 1A office as would be found in Fort Worth or Dallas.

The Knox City post office ranks somewhere in the middle. Fees will be charged on a semi-annual basis instead of the old quarterly system.

Rent for a No. 1 box is rising from \$4.40 to \$5.00 a year; No. 2 from \$5.40 to \$6.00; No. 3 from \$7.20 to \$8.00; and No. 4 from \$10.00 to \$12.00.

According to Kenneth Myers, Postal Service Clerk, all of the 509 boxes are rented at the present time.

### Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of May, 1975, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1975 shows a total of 27 accidents resulting in no persons killed and eight persons

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1975, shows a total of 524 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 310 persons injured as compared to May. 1974, with 406 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 118 more accidents, eight less killed, and 92 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of May, 1975, occurred in the following counties: one each in Baylor, Parker, Terry, Yoakum, Moore, Swisher: two each in Clay and Armstrong; three in Potter; and four in Wilbarger.








#### ALTERNATIVE CROPS PLANTED AFTER COTTON LOST

In spite of replanting, sand fighting and all practices available to use, Knox County cotton producers lost thousands of acres of cotton from excessive rains, some hail and day after day of blowing sand.

Many acres intended for cotton production were planted to guar or grain sorghum after June 15 when producers decided it was getting too late to replant cotton.

The 1975 Knox County cotton acreage may be as low as 40% of the 1974 crop.

#### OVERWINTERED COTTON BOLL WEEVIL

Overwintered cotton boll weevil have been active for several weeks searching for cotton squares. Two Leggett traps in Knox County have caught from a low of 16 to a high of 248 boll weevil weekly for the last seven weeks with the heaviest catches three to six weeks ago.

Producers with cotton starting to square may want to use an early season boll weevil control application as the plants reach the 1/3 grown square stage. These weevil still surviving will definitely be looking for these early squares to reproduce in.

#### BLOOM DROP IN TOMATOES EXPLAINED

Certain environmental conditions will cause tomato blooms to shed, resulting in a poor fruit set. Partial failure of flowers to develop into fruit will result in abnormal fruits which may be misshapen or

Blossom drop is most common in tomatoes which bloom late. The usual cause for poor fruit set is high temperatureseither at night or day. Nighttime temperatures above 72 degrees F. along with daytime temperatures above 90 degrees F. often result in heavy blossom drop. On the other hand, unseasonally cool weather also causes blossoms to drop in addition to causing abnomalities in fruits.

Other factors causing lack of fruit set or abnormal fruit include unbalanced nutrition, extended periods of warm, windy weather with low humidity, extended periods of showery, cool, overcast wea-

Poor fruit set is most common in the large slicing types of tomatoes. However, such varieties as Early Giant, Spring Giant, Spring Set and Improved Summertime have the ability to set fruit during somewhat higher tempera-

Smaller sized tomatoes that normally do not have the fruit set problem include such varieties as Small Fry. Red Cherry, Roma and the new Texas Agricultural Experiment Station variety. Sala-

In areas where blossom drop seems to be a common problem year after year, gardeners may try planting some of the smaller-type tomatoes or those varieties that tend to be more tolerant to higher

#### CROP REPORTS FROM FARMERS NEEDED

In early July, about 24,700 Texas farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Austin, Texas.

Information from this sur-

vey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and will be used only for state and county totals.

This survey is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agricul-

#### CONTROLLING CATTAILS

With the summer season fast approaching, the time is at hand to control cattails and other emergent aquatic vegetation.

If cattails were a problem last year, they will be again this year.

Small patches of cattails can be pulled by hand but care is needed to get all the roots, including the rhizomes from which new plants

Larger patches of cattails can be controlled with dalapon at 71/2 pounds per 55 gallons of water. Best control is achieved when a surfactant is added. One cup of household detergent will suffice for the 55 gallons of spray mix-

One application of dalapon may not completely eradicate the cattails, so a second or third application at 21-day intervals may be required.

Before beginning a spray program, be sure to properly identify the plants involved. I suggest a copy of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Bulletin B-1018 to aid in identifying aquatic vegetation and in determining apropriate chemical control be studied. The bulletin is available at the county Extension office

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

## Water Study Begins In Mrs. Tibbets Buried Mon. Knox, Haskell Counties


