Bears Fall to Mountaineers Take on Cross Plains Friday

BAIRD- The Santa Anna Mountaineers intercepted three Baird passes and got two of their fumbles to finally beat the Bears 24-13.

Coach Edmiston was very pleased with their first drive down the field. It was an 80 yard drive and was well executed. He felt the defense made some mental mistakes, but still played well.

The Bears scored first, when quarterback Darryl Harris ran eight yards for a touchdown. Alan Bohannon kicked the extra point and it was good.

Baird's next touchdown didn't come until the fourth quarter. Greg Austin scored on a 23 yard run. A try for 2 extra points failed, but Baird was leading 13-8.

Santa Anna first scored in the second quarter. Warnock ran for a 6 yard touch-

down and then also ran for the 2 extra points.

After Baird scored in the fourth quarter Santa Anna didn't like it and scored two more times for a 24-13 victory over Baird.

Baird had 17 first downs, 168 yards rushing and 115 yards passing to Santa Anna's 12 first downs, 199 yards rushing and no passing yardage.

Baird completed 8 out of 14 passes and had 6 penalties for 50 yards. They lost 2 fumbles.

Santa Anna didn't complete any passes out of 7 attempts.

The Bears are now preparing to play Cross Plains Friday, September 21 there at 8 p.m.

No one scored in the first quarter, but Wylie took control in the second. Their first touchdown came on a 4 yard run by Kregg Conder.

Their next touchdown was most impressive. Gordon Asbury ran for 15 yards and then Billy Joe Schulle gained 34 yards to the 1 yard line. Asbury drove it in for scoring.

Wylie struck the third time five seconds into the fourth quarter. Conder called his own number and scored from the 8 yard

line. Two point conversions were good after each touchdown.

Most of Clyde's offense came from Tommy Ramos, who gained 91 yards on 10 carries.

The closest the Clyde Bulldogs came to scoring was a pass at the end of the first half which eluded David Abernathy and a fourth quarter drive that ended on downs at Wylie's 11 when Jerry Gordon couldn't hold onto a pass from Larry Young.

The win gave Wylie a 2-0 season record while Clyde fell to 1-1.

Coleman Co. Fair Features Horse Show

COLEMAN - The Coleman County Fair known as the "Fiesta de la Paloma" will feature a horse show again this year, on Sat. Sept. 29. This years show will be different from the others, however, and is a new concept in Horse Shows for this area. This show is for fun, says Roger Blackmon, Coleman County Extension Agent. This years show will feature, as the main award in each age division, a super Horse Award. There will be three super horses selected and their owners will receive a leather show halter with silver, and lead shank. There will be three age divisions for competitors in performance events. Jr. Youth, 14 and under; Sr. Youth 14-18, and adult or open 19 and over. All

exhibitors will compete together in the halter show. Trophies will be presented through third place in each class. A grand champion Mare and Gelding will not be selected; neither will an all-around or Performance be selected. Rather, the 6 point system will be used to select a Super Horse in each age division.

Exhibitors may show their super horse at halter and in three selected performance events. The points from these will be totaled to select the Super Horse. Exhibitors may enter other horses in other classes if they wish. The entry fee is \$4.00 per class. Halter classes will include: Yearling and under Fillies and Colts; Grade Mares; Reg. Mares under five and Reg. 5. Performance events

will include: Showmanship, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship, Reining, Barrels and Poles.

Programs and entries are available from the County Extension office in Coleman. Entries may be made on show morning, Sept. 29 prior to 8:30 a.m. at the Rodeo grounds in Coleman where the show will be held. Jo Ann Snodgrass, of San Angelo will be the Horse Show Judge. A walk-trot western pleasure class will be featured for youngsters under 9 years of age.

County Extension Agent, Roger Blackmon, emphasizes that this show is for fun and enjoyment. The adult division is new and it is hoped a lot of people will participate.

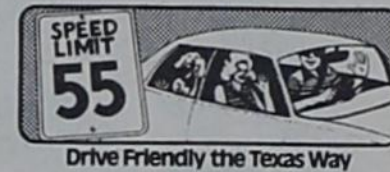

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.

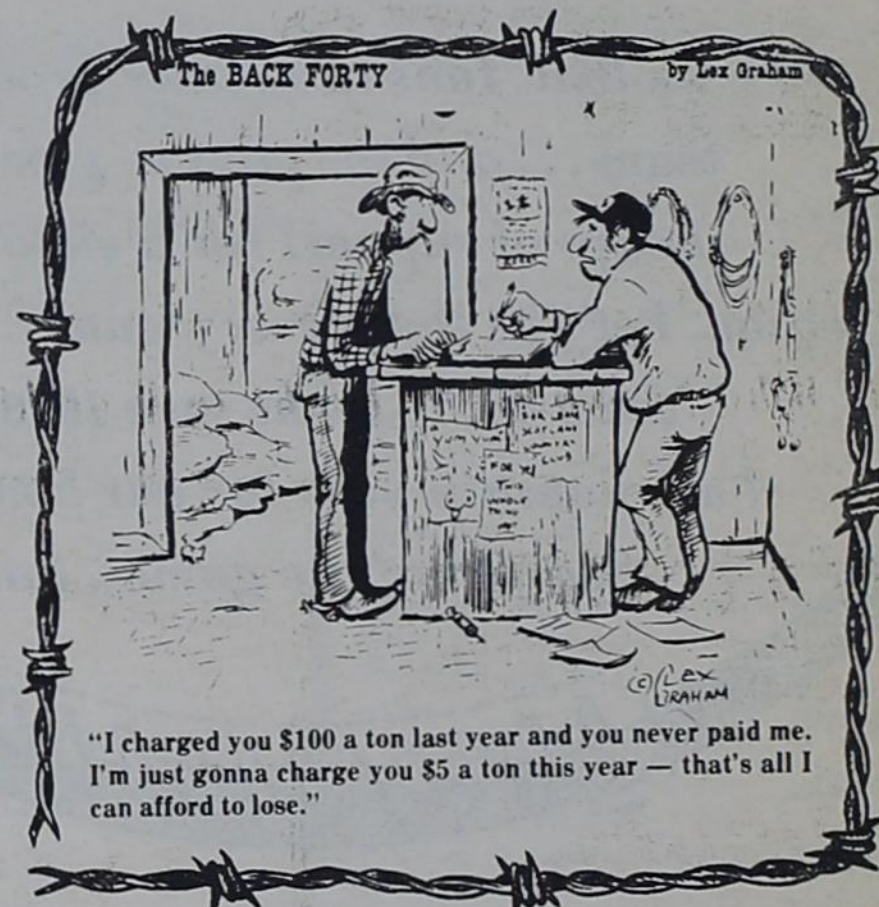

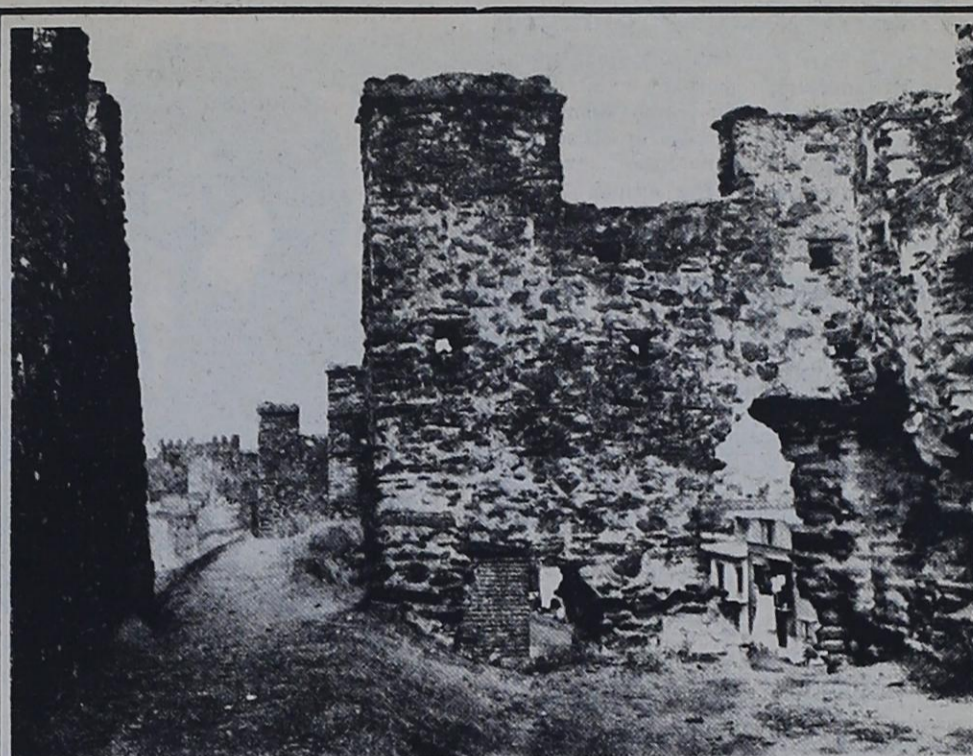

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

(H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

(H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

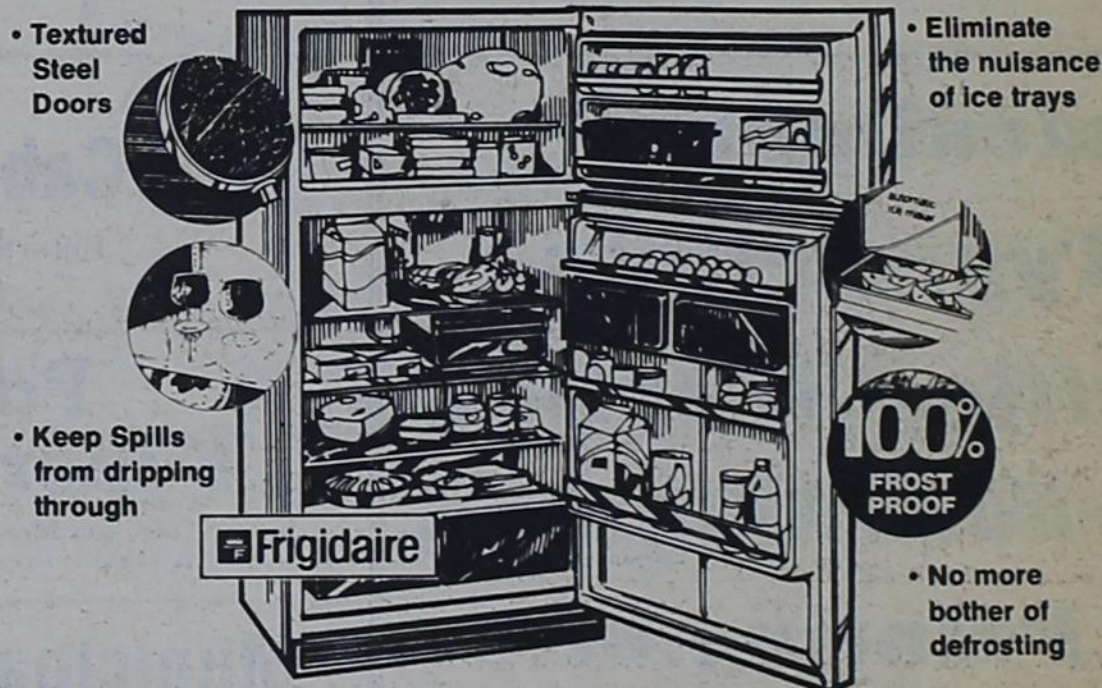

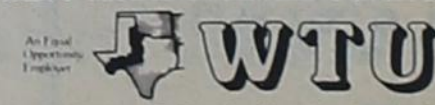

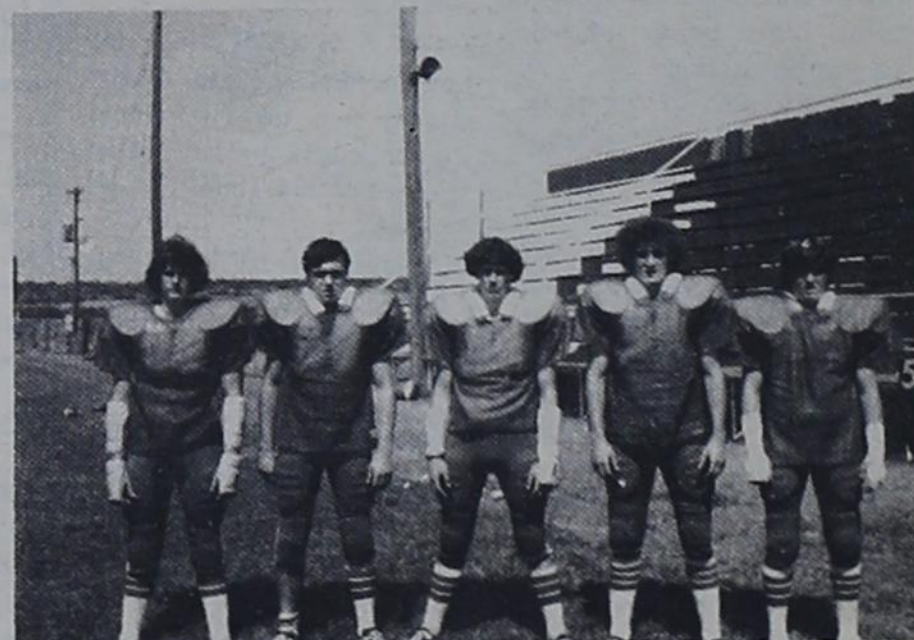
