Work on some phases of Knox City's paving and drainage project will begin as soon as engineers set stakes, according to Jim Witt and Bill Ross of the Pecos Valley Construction Co., Carlsbad, N. M., who arrived in Knox City this week.

Witt is a partner in the construction firm, and Ross is company engineer in charge of the Knox City project.

The firm will open an office in the building formerly occupied by Louise's Beauty Shop, next door to Hamm's Service Station, and will begin signing up property owners for their share of the paving costs as soon as contract forms are received from a Ft. Worth printing firm.

Equipment was being moved in this week, and work on the drainage system was expected to begin on Waco Street within the next few days. With the exception of a few key men, the contractors plan to use all local labor.

Individuals interested in the paving were asked to call at the company's office and sign the contract forms. Cost to property owners on a 30-foot residential street will be \$2.31 per front foot, which may be paid over a period of three years.

Each property owner is to pay one-third of the cost of paving, curbing and gutter in front of his property, with the city paying a third. However, the city will pay all costs of paving at intersections and alleys, which amounts, Witt said, to the city paying more than 50 percent of the costs of the paving program.

Most-Susceptible Age Groups To Have Priority on Salk Vaccine

First and second graders from the Knox City and Benjamin schools were given their first shots of Salk polio vaccine at the Knox City Clinic Monday.

Children from other communities in the county received their vaccinations at Munday.

At the local clinic a total of 138 children were vaccinated, including 21 colored children.

According to Dr. D. C. Ellard, county health officer, the children will receive their second shots within a few weeks, in accordance with the recommendations of the National Foundation for Infant Paralysis. Whether the series will consist of two or more shots, so depends on the foundation's recommendations.

Dr. Ellard also announced that county physicians and druggists have been discussing the fair way to dispense the limited amount of vaccine available to individuals other than first and second graders.

"After much discussion," the health officer said, "we have unanimously agreed that no vaccine will be sold or given until sufficient amount has been stockpiled to give to a particular age group. What age group this will be depends on the recommendation of the National Foundation, based on their statistics of the most susceptible age group, including pregnant mothers.

"To ascertain the number of children in the county in each age group, we will supply postcards addressed to the county superintendent of schools, who have agreed to separate them for use of doctors and druggists."

The cards will give the information concerning the parents who wish their children to have the vaccine as soon as it is available and the age of the children.

"With this system," Dr. Ellard said, "if the National Foundation says four-year-olds should be the next group to receive the vaccine it will be possible to know immediately just how many four-year-olds there are in the county whose parents wish them to have the vaccine. Then, when the amount of vaccine is available in the stockpile, each doctor will be allocated sufficient doses to vaccinate those who have listed him as their regular physician.

It is fervently hoped by the doctors and druggists that this program will meet the approval of the people who might be trying to get on reservation lists. We feel this is the only fair way it can be done."

The postcards will be available in all postoffices in the county requiring only that they be filled out and stamped.

As soon as vaccine is available one age group after the other will be offered the vaccine, according to the recommendation of the National Foundation.

Hinduism can be admired for its high regard for life. Budhaism condemns such sins as killing, stealing, and lying. Likewise Catholics and Protestants teach many vital truths of the Bible. Tragically, however, on almost every hand doctrines are taught that are mixtures of truth and error. These doctrines are perverted gospels. They cannot save. "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32). "The gospel is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth" (Romans 1:16). Water is God's power to quench the thirst of man. When that water has a small amount of salt added it loses its force to do what God intended. Likewise the truth is God's power to set men free from their sins. When it is corrupted with a percentage of human doctrine it becomes a perverted gospel with no power to save. There is as much difference between the Lord's true church and denominations as there is between truth and error. Different and contradictory doctrines cannot all be right. Be certain that you have believed and obeyed only the pure gospel of Christ.
