

13,211 TEXANS TO BE RE-EXAMINED FOR DRAFT
AUSTIN, Jan. 9. — Texas draft boards have a total of

13,211 men classified 4-F who must be re-examined by the armed forces, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said here today.
The men to be re-examined are those who have failed the armed forces mental test. These men have been acceptable to the armed forces on physical and moral grounds. Amendments to the draft law in 1951 require that these men be re-examined because of armed forces lowered mental stan-

dards.
National draft headquarters on December 13 called for re-examination of class 4-F registrants who have been found unacceptable by armed forces examining stations solely for mental reasons.
Since that time, state draft headquarters directed all local boards to report the number of men in this category. The survey as a result of this showed the state total of 13,211.
State headquarters already has called on the draft boards to furnish 2,391 of these 4-F registrants for re-examination in January. No calls for future months have been received.
According to survey results, only about 15 per cent of the men classified 4-F in Texas are so classified for failing the armed forces mental test alone.
Wakefield also announced that orders had been mailed calling for February pre-induction examination of 4,328 men of draft age, and for induction of 2,144 men in February, none to be below the age of 20.
For the first time since Selective Service was re-established in 1948, local boards are being asked to have no men examined who are below their 21st birthday.

Gen. Wakefield said that state headquarters has just completed a survey among the 137 state draft boards and finds that Texas boards have a total of 8,125 1-A men above 21 who have not been examined.
February orders for pre-induction examination will bring the number ordered and reordered for this purpose in Texas since the beginning of the fight in Korea to 87,769 men.

VETERANS ELIGIBLE TO TAKE NEW CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination, open only to persons entitled to veteran preference, for filling substitute postal transportation clerk positions throughout the United States.

To qualify, applicants will be required to pass a written test. There are no experience requirements and no age limits. Because of the arduous duties involved, only male eligibles will be appointed.

Veterans residing in Texas must file their applications with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., not later than February 5, 1952. Full information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's central office in Washington, D. C.

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MRS. EARL SAMS NAMED FARM WOMAN OF MONTH

(The following article is reprinted from a recent edition of the Wichita Falls Record-News.)

BENJAMIN, Jan. 12.—This city got its name from her great uncle and much of its character from Frances Elizabeth Sams.

This cultured and gracious woman, who operates two farms, has spent all of her 65 years here. And virtually every one in the area has been a beneficiary.

Mrs. Sams has been selected the Times' Farm Woman of the Month for January. She was the choice of the farm women who know her best—members of the Benjamin Home Demonstration Club.

To know Mrs. Sams is to know the history of Benjamin and much of Knox County. Her

grandfather, "Uncle Hilory" Bedford, was one of a small group of men who established the town in 1885. And the town was named for Benjamin Bedford, Uncle Hilory's brother.

Many of the area's citizens will remember Mrs. Sams' parents as owners and operators of Benjamin's Hinton Hotel. Her husband, who died in December, worked for the county about 16 years.

Since her husband's death, Mrs. Sams has taken on the man-sized job of running two farms.

She is in direct charge of 290 acres of cultivated land and approximately 250 acres of pasture. Right now she has 104 acres in wheat and 60 in oats. Her 120 head of livestock graze the deep grasses on her farms.

Mrs. Sams has been a member of the Benjamin Home Demonstration Club for 20 years. She

has served the club as president and currently is vice president. During her membership she has carried out many worthwhile projects, sewing, cooking and home and grounds beautification.

She was spark plug in a drive to clean up the cemetery here. The women of the HD group pitched in and cleaned the park of scrub mesquite and cedar, chopped weeds and built a fence. The entire city is proud of the accomplishment of these ambitious farm women.

The moral fiber of this community is stronger as a result of Mrs. Sams' work. She has been a member of the Christian Church since she was 12 years old. She played the piano in church all her adult life and has taught Sunday school.

Mrs. Sams is also known here for her good work in the Sorosis Club. She is a real civic and rural leader.

She is also a respected mother.

Mrs. Sams has reared three children, two boys and one girl. All are now married and filling responsible positions in society. Her six grandchildren are her pride and joy.

Maleta Henson, Knox County home demonstration agent, says Mrs. Sams is "one of the most highly regarded women in the community. She is completely dependable for any job, and one of the truly great leaders of this section. She is quite popular with 4-H girls."

There are five home demonstration clubs in this county. Besides the one here, they are established in Truscott, Gilliland and Sunset.

Mrs. L. A. Parker is president at Truscott; Mrs. W. O. Solomon at Truscott; Mrs. Richard Winstead at Gilliland; Mrs. Jerry Nix at Sunset, and Mrs. Johnny Peyson at Munday.

Mrs. R. M. Almanrode of Munday is president of the Texas Home Demonstration Association, covering the entire state.

OPS INVESTIGATING

SALE OF JUNK BATTERIES

FORT WORTH. — Reports of illegal sales of junk batteries, from which vital lead is extracted, are being investigated by the Fort Worth District Office of Price Stabilization.

Ellis H. Boyd, OPS district director, refused to state if any of the reports have been made from Knox County, but added that the alleged sales have taken place in several counties of the 50-county Ft. Worth district, which includes Knox County.

"We have had several complaints from junk dealers that numerous sellers of used batteries are demanding above the ceiling price for these batteries," Boyd said. He explained that under the Defense Production

Act both seller and purchaser can be prosecuted for such an illegal transaction.

The ceiling price for junk passenger car batteries is \$2.80 per battery on an as is basis. The ceiling does not apply to the trade-in allowance a retail-

er may grant the purchaser of a new battery.

The demand for junk batteries has increased because the batteries are a source of lead, a critical item in the defense program, Boyd said.

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STANDARD OF AUTHORITY IN RELIGION

To avoid confusion and chaos in all the pursuits of life we must have recognized standards of authority. If I ask a dry goods clerk for a yard of cloth, I expect her to use a standard measurement. When I buy a pound of sugar I make sure that it is according to the standard. If the clothing merchant or the grocer would defy the accepted standards of weights and measures and ask their clerks to "go by their feelings (that is, "guess") in cutting the cloth and sacking the sugar the public would not stand for it long.

We can all see the wisdom in standards to direct our physical life. Examples would be multiplied. But when it comes to the most important matter, the spiritual phase of man's being, many will argue that "our feelings should guide us." As to salvation from sin they say, "we cannot all see it alike. Just so we are sincere and feel we are saved—that is all that matters." Suppose the merchant adopted that rule: "Just so the clerks feel they are measuring and weighing properly." We might reply, "The clerk may be sincere, and yet not be right in guessing at a yard or a pound."

Beloved, if you have been depending on "feelings" or some other standard rather than the Word of God we beg of you to take the time to consider WHAT GOD says about THE STANDARD OF AUTHORITY IN MATTERS OF TRUE RELIGION: "Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father who is in heaven." Matthew 7:21.

HERE IS THE TRUE STANDARD: "Every scripture inspired of God is also profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be complete, furnished completely unto every good work." 2 Timothy 3:16-17. The scriptures are the safe standard.
