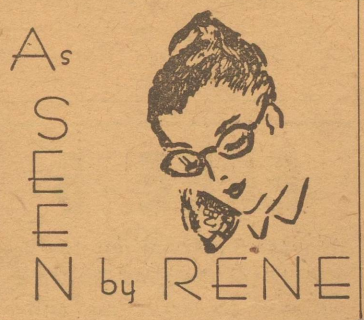

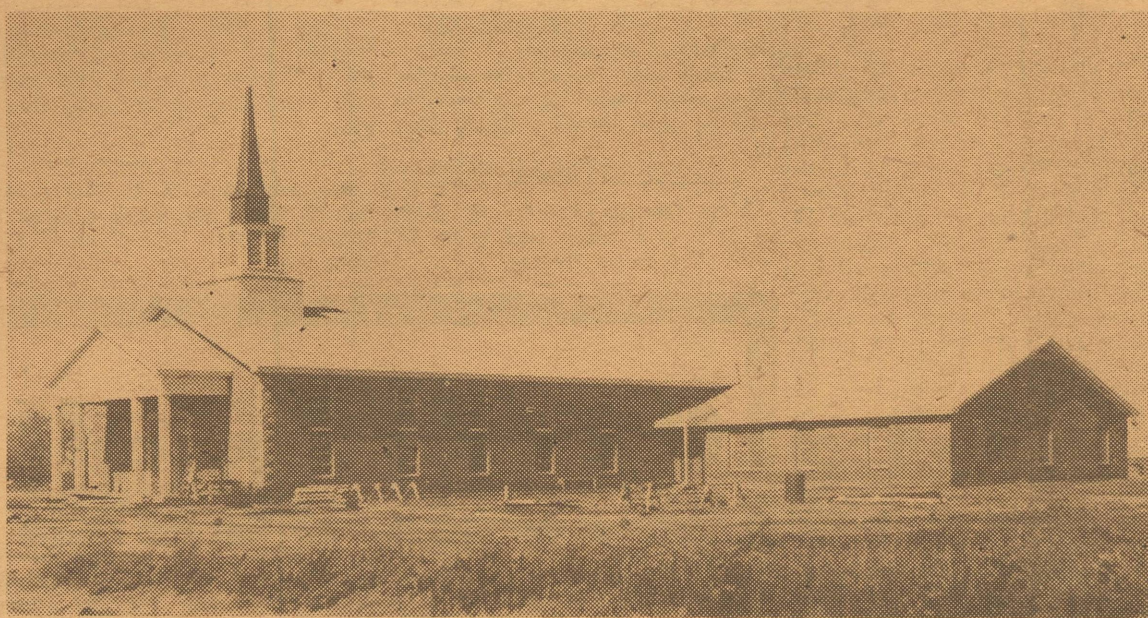

The new building of the O'Brien Baptist Church will be used for the first time tonight (Thursday) and a series of dedication services will begin Sunday. The \$80,000 edifice is located on a three-acre tract just south of the D. S. Gothard Service Station in O'Brien.

Dedication Services Slated In New O'Brien Church

Members of the O'Brien Baptist Church will begin using their new \$80,000 church building tonight (Thursday) and a series of dedication services will begin Sunday.

Completion of the new edifice was delayed by rains, but the yard was cleaned up Wednesday in preparation for the opening. The structure, with a floor space of 8,500 square feet, is located just south of the Dwight Gothard service station, and there is ample parking space on

the three-acre church grounds. The building is of Roman brick and tile construction. The auditorium has a seating capacity of 375, and there are educational rooms, kitchen and study.

The dedication services will be launched Sunday by Rev. C. A. Powell, a former pastor of the church. Rev. Mickey Johnston will conduct the services May 13-15, and Rev. Leo Rudd will be in charge May 16-19.

Johnston, a native of O'Brien, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. S. Johnston. Rudd, from Tyler, is associational missionary for Smith County.

Services will begin each evening at 8:00 o'clock.

Teachers and officers will meet in the new building tonight (Thursday) to familiarize themselves with the new structure, Rev. Mart Hardin, pastor said.

Members of the church started a building fund more than 3 years ago, and construction was started in November of last year. S. N. Reed, who was chairman of the building fund committee, said many contributions were received from persons who are not members of the congregation, and those donors, as well as everyone else in the area, were extended special invitations to attend the dedication services.

The old church building will be used as a Mexican mission, Rev. Hardin said.

Contractor on the new structure was Charles Fletcher of Ft. Worth.

1946 Study Club to Make Survey for Walking Blood Bank

A house-to-house survey will be made Friday morning to obtain names of persons over 16 years of age who are willing to be listed as a blood donor in the "walking blood bank" for this area.

Members of the 1946 Study Club will make the survey. According to Dr. D. C. Eiland, county health officer, only those persons who are willing to give blood will be typed. He also said those who are already typed should not give their names. When the survey is finished doctors will announce dates for typing the blood. This will be done free at the Knox City Clinic.

This project is being undertaken on the recommendation of the Civil Defense organization, and will be carried on in other parts of the county by home demonstration clubs.

Council Employs New City Marshal

The city council, at a special meeting Monday night, employed J. T. Hamby of Henrietta as city marshal of Knox City, it was announced this week.

Hamby, who met with the council, is scheduled to assume his duties May 15.

The new marshal is very highly recommended, according to Mayor Otis Harbert. He was formerly an inspector with the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, and has served on the police forces at Seymour and Graham. More recently he has been managing a ranch for J. H. Bridwell in the Scotland community, near Henrietta.

Lewis Floyd, who has served as city marshal the past several months, has not announced his future plans.

OIL NOTES

Drilling rig moved in Wednesday for the Bobby Burns No. 2 Joe S. Smith, northwest of town. The test will be an offset to the No. 1 Smith, which is producing from the Tannehill sand. In the same area, the Burns No. 3 Byron Lee was recently completed as a flowing well in the Tannehill.

Among new locations in the area is the Gasoline Production Co. No. 1 R. V. and John R. White, three miles north of Knox City. Location is 330 feet from west and 990 feet from south lines of block 11, D. G. Burnett subdivision No. 5 A-25. Contract depth is 2500 feet.

Dublin-Kiel No. 1 Juanita B. Atterbury was staked 7 miles west of Knox City as a 2600 foot test. Location is 10,700 feet west and 2172 north of northeast corner of E. Boren Survey 51, but an E. Boren Survey 53.

Wyndoll Stephens Injured in Fall From Television Tower

Wyndoll Stephens of O'Brien is recuperating from injuries received last Friday when he fell from a television antenna erection tower.

Stephens, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Stephens of Knox City, miraculously escaped more serious injury in the 70-foot fall. His left foot hit the edge of a porch roof, breaking the roof and slightly slowing his fall. Spectators say had he fallen in any other spot he would have hit iron pipe or the trailer on which the erection tower was mounted.

The accident occurred while Wyndoll was working on an antenna on the Wes Hayes farm west of O'Brien.

Stephens suffered a broken finger and thumb, a sprained foot and bruised ribs. There also was some internal injury which was not believed to be serious, his mother said Tuesday.

Miss Beverly James of Knox City, district Legion Sweetheart, gave a reading, "If Jesus Came to Your House," during the memorial service.

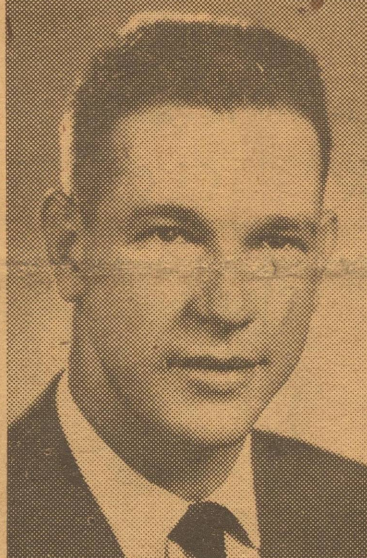
The Teague-Carpenter post was one of 11 posts presented with citations for having exceeded their 1957 membership quotas.

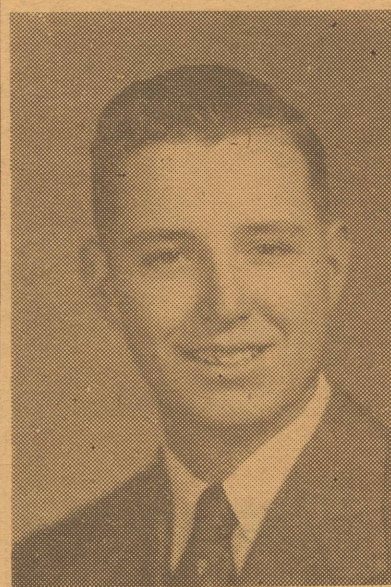
C of C to Sponsor Clean-Up Drive

Details Received About Fatal Illinois Accident

More complete details of the tragic automobile accident near Martinsville, Ill., April 26 that took the life of Judy Ann West were received by the Herald this week from two Illinois newspapers, the Martinsville Planet and the Casey Daily Reporter.

Judy Ann, 9, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian West of Ft. Worth, formerly of Benjamin, died April 30 in a Terre Haute, Ind., hospital of burns received in the five-car smashup. Funeral services were held at Ft. Worth and Benjamin Friday while her parents and her sister, Patsy Sue, 10, remained in Union Hospital at Terre Haute. Patsy Sue was in critical condition from burns she received. Her father had third degree burns, mostly about the face and hands, and the mother suffered lacerations, bruises and severe shock.

According to the Illinois newspapers, Lawrence Spittler, 22, of Martinsville was traveling east on Route 40 at a high rate of speed when he crashed into the rear of another car, also going east driven by Mr. and Mrs. Walter King. The King car burst into flames and was vaulted over the path of the west-bound West car, which was also set afire. Another eastbound vehicle slammed into Spittler's car, driving it onto the west-bound lane, and another west-bound car, swerving to avoid hitting the Spittler car, side-swiped the flaming wreckage of the West and King cars.

Spittler, whose hot-rod Ford was equipped with an Oldsmobile engine, was saved from serious injury by a safety belt. He pleaded guilty to driving too fast for existing conditions.

Mrs. King and one of the couple's four children were in critical condition. Others were reported in fair condition.

West was burned as he fought the flame and heat to rescue his daughters from the back seat of his car.

Mr. West is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom West of Benjamin, and Mrs. West is the former Geneva Jackson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Jackson of Knox City.

The West family was enroute home after he had worked temporarily in Illinois. He is employed by Consolidated Aircraft in Ft. Worth.

Soil Conservation Technicians Advise Pasture Deferment

Now is the time to start thinking about pasture deferment for a growing season so that the vigor of existing grasses might be improved, and so that seed production can be obtained to better range conditions, officials of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District said this week.

Resting pastures during the growing season will give the best results. Two or three months' rest in the spring will increase plant vigor and permit grasses to spread and make better cover.

A three-months fall deferment will allow for a seed crop as well as for storing food in the roots.

The first growth a grass plant makes in the spring comes from food that was stored in the roots the fall before, soil conservation technicians said. After the plant has used the food from its root reserve it depends upon its leaves for its food. Since the plant is dependent upon its leaves for food, enough leaves must remain to manufacture food all during the growing season.

By practicing range deferment it will help to give the necessary treatment that is so badly needed on many of our ranges in the district that have undergone periods of continued use and prolonged drought, the technicians said.

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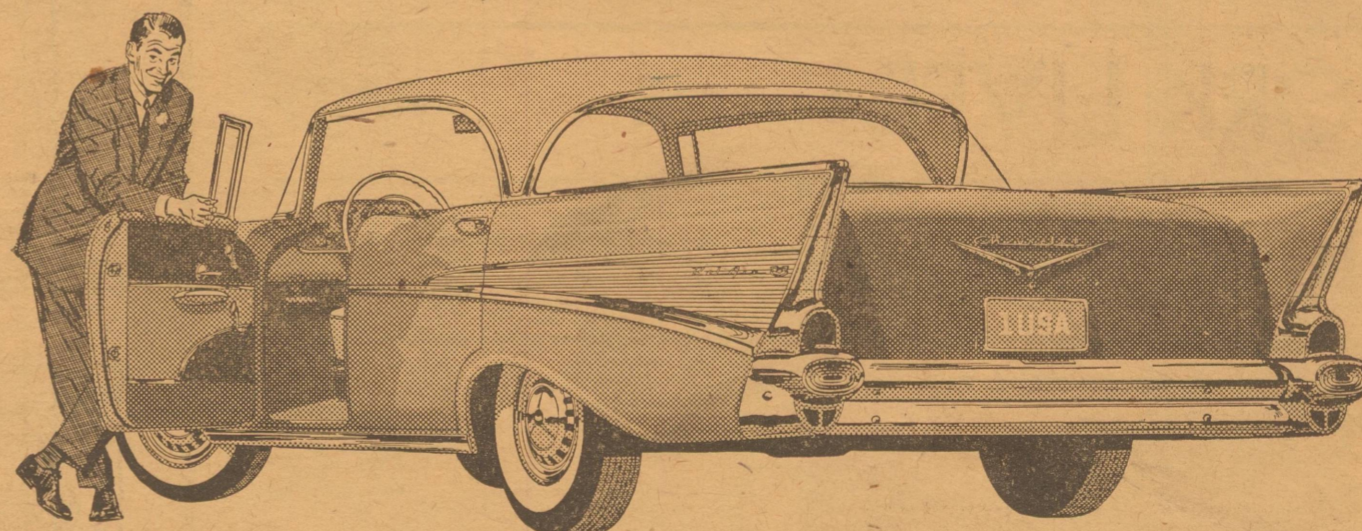
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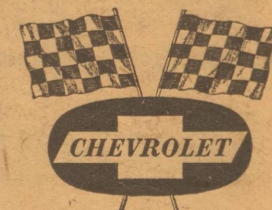
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
