## No Entrance Tests Required of Pupils, School Supt. Says

"Signed report cards will be accepted for grade placement in the Knox City Schools this year," Harold Barnett, superintendent, said this week in announcing the opening dates of the schools.

"No admission tests will be given students and pupils coming in from other schools," he stressed.

The school will open Monday, September 4. Due to the fact that a portion of the old Sunset district was recently annexed to the Knox City district, the state will allow three additional teachers in the school, making a total of 23 including the two teachers in the colored school.

A number of applicants to fill vacancies created by the resignations of Mrs. Charley Cape, Miss Virginia Derr, Miss Williford, Mrs. T. E. Holcomb and Mrs. Carl Morgan are being considered by the school board.

Barney Arnold, president of the board, said Wednesday that the board will meet Tuesday night, August 7, to discuss and study qualifications of the applicants. The vacancies will probably be filled at that time, he added.

## State Commissioner Of Agriculture to Speak at O'Brien

John C. White, state commissioner of agriculture, has accepted an invitation to speak at the annual Northern Star Seed Farms Field Day in O'Brien September 6. It was announced this week.

Final plans for the Field Day were completed last week.

White will talk on "What Quality Cotton Means to Texas." His address will be one of a five-unit program set up by officials of the farms at O'Brien and Waco.

Sam N. Reed, sales manager for the O'Brien farms, will be master of ceremonies for the program which will begin at 9:30 a. m. with a tour of the breeding farms. W. R. Woodward, general manager, of Waco will make the welcome address, and D. R. Brown of Rochester will make the response.

"West Texas Agriculture" will be the topic discussed by George Logan, agricultural director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Abilene.

"The Production of Quality Cotton" will be discussed by J. S. Mogford, breeder-in-charge, Northern Star Seed Farms. Otto Goedecke, president of the Goedecke Cotton Co. of Hallettsville, Texas, will discuss "The Spinning Quality of Cotton."

The program will begin at 10:45 a. m. at the school auditorium, following the tour of the breeding block and a ginning demonstration.

Entertainment during the day will include gospel singing by the Stamps Ozark Quartet of Wichita Falls, a baseball game and, as usual, a big barbecue dinner.

Tom Reeder, pioneer son of the "Knox Prairie", died at his home in Vernon Wednesday morning, August 1, about 4:00 o'clock. Mr. Reeder had been in ill health for the past three and a half years.

He was born in Knox City in 1888, the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Reeder. He moved to Crowell about 1918, and owned and operated a drug store there for 30 years. He and his wife moved to Vernon about four years ago.

Survivors are the widow; two sons, Dr. T. P. Reeder of Newport Beach, Calif., and Lt. Glendon Reeder, Brooks Field, San Antonio; three grandchildren; two brothers, Bill and Joe, of Knox City; and two sisters, Mrs. R. G. Vaughan of Knox City and Mrs. J. M. Sawyers of Ryan, Okla.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete this morning.

## Hoyle Appointed Field Representative For Farm Bureau

O. K. Hoyle of Seymour has been named field representative of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and will serve 38 counties in this area, it has been announced by Ancil Wal-



drip, president of the Knox County Farm Bureau. Knox County will be included in Hoyle's district.

In announcing the fieldman's assignment to this area Waldrup said he would be able to give Knox county needed assistance in organization work and program and planning activities throughout the year, which will expedite the Farm Bureau program in this county and area. Hoyle assumed duties July 1 and will meet with the boards of directors in the 38 counties of his area during the month.

Marvin Carter, director of organization for Texas Farm Bureau Federation, in assigning Hoyle to this area, stated that the organization was adding four additional fieldmen to its staff this month. The state will be divided into seven areas. Hoyle's territory has 29 organized counties, with a membership last year of 8,641 members.

## Farm Labor to Be Discussed at Series of Area Meetings

Knox, King and Haskell County farmers have been asked to attend a series of meetings August 28-31, in which farm labor problems will be discussed. Theme of the meetings will be "Harvesting West Texas' Largest, Most Valuable Cotton Crop."

The meetings, sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Texas Cotton Ginner's Association, and the Farm Bureau, will be held in Wichita Falls August 28, Big Spring August 30, and Lubbock August 31.

The programs are expected to feature experts on each major problem faced by cotton farmers in this area in harvesting their crops this year.

W. B. McFarland, Dallas, will represent the U. S. Employment Service. He will give valuable information on the "Use of Mexican Nationals." A member of the Mexican consular service will outline the responsibilities of the communities where the Nationals are used.

A representative of a marketing group with successful experience in the field will talk on how to keep the Mexican Nationals happy and get the cotton harvested. Mrs. Matt McCall of Lamesa, Chamber of Commerce manager, will tell how a blacklisted county prepared for the Nationals and received the help and cooperation of the Mexican government.

"Rulings on Wages and Employment of Children of School Age" will be discussed by P. D. Riley of Ft. Worth, Wage and Hour Division, Department of Labor.

The state commissioner of agriculture, John C. White, is scheduled to make a talk at each meeting.

On migratory farm labor, a crew leader will give his opinion on what he looks for on a farm for his crew, and a farmer will discuss what he expects of a cotton-harvesting crew on his farm.

Members of the sponsoring associations and officials of the agencies on the program will form a panel for a discussion of cotton harvesting problems, the concluding part of the program.
