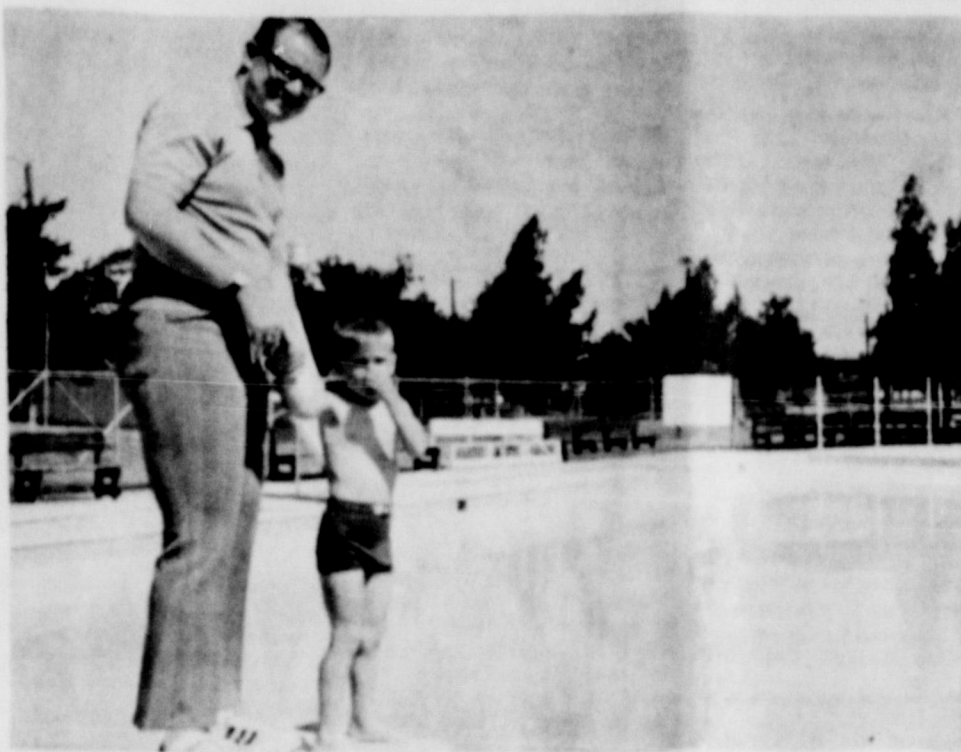

Funeral services were held here Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock for C.J. Reese at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Roger Butler, pastor, officiating.

Interment was in the Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home. Mr. Reese died Saturday night at 9:50 o'clock in the Knox County Hospital where he had been a patient since Tuesday, after suffering a stroke at his home.

Born February 13, 1905 in Knox City, he married Ima Marguerite Bowden on March 8, 1924, in Munday. She died in 1968.

Mr. Reese was a member of the Knox City Lions Club, the American Legion, and the First Baptist Church where he served as chairman of the building committee when the sanctuary was constructed in 1961. He was a

former member of the board of directors of the Knox County Hospital District and was currently serving as secretary of the board of owners of the Brazos Valley Care Home. He was also land appraiser for the Veterans Administration Land Loans and was one of the organizers of the Knox City Country Club. A World War II veteran, Mr. Reese served in the U.S. Army Air Corps. He was a retired farmer.

## Saturday Is Election Day

Voters will be returning to the polls Saturday for the June 3 Democratic second primary.

Appearing on the ballot for area voters will be Ralph Yarborough and Barefoot Sanders for U.S. Senator, Dolph Briscoe and Mrs. Frances (Sissy) Farenthold for Governor, Bill Hobby and Wayne Connally for Lt. Governor, Robert S. Calvert and James (Jim) Wilson for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

Of greater interest to voters locally will be the District Judge's race for the 50th Judicial District in which incumbent Joe Feeder Jr., will face R.J. Judson Balch of Seymour in the run-off.

Knox City voters will again vote in two boxes, Precinct 9 at the American Legion Hall and Precinct 9-A at the City Hall. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Precinct

chairman Abe Watson and 9-A chairman Doyle Graham reported that they were extremely hopeful that Knox City would have a good turnout of voters.

In a check with County Clerk Zena Waldron Tuesday afternoon 27 absentee votes had been cast in the office and three out of 13 ballots mailed out had been returned.

## Cyclists Asked To Learn And Obey Safety Rules

With the summer holidays ahead, bicycling is fast becoming a popular activity here as many riders of all ages enjoy the sport.

The City of Knox City is listing rules in a display at this week that have been set forth by the Texas Department of Public Safety in hopes that all riders will learn and obey the rules.

Officials pointed out that this in no way implies that bicycling should be curtailed, only that it will provide more safety for the riders as well as drivers.

Many riders have been out on the streets after dark without reflectors, making it very dangerous for all concerned. Others riding in large groups make it dangerous for cars to pass them.

In addition to the rules listed elsewhere in this week's News, smart bicyclists also walk their bikes across busy corners, are courteous to ot-

hers at all time, use their bell or horn to warn others, never to frighten them, and always use the proper hand signals.

Law officers expect all riders to observe these rules and to make bicycling safer and more enjoyable. Those who do not abide by the rules set forth by the Department of Public Safety will be subject to fine, officials said.

## "Plain English"

Gerald had the idea and Fred had the money. Over a midnight cup of coffee, they agreed to start manufacturing a new kind of toy. As for profits, they agreed on what they assumed would be a simple formula: a "fifty-fifty" split.



Things went well. Nevertheless, for personal reasons, they decided after a year to bring the venture to an end.

Dividing the profits should have been merely a matter of arithmetic. But Gerald insisted he was entitled to an extra share as wages, on the ground that he alone had put in regular working hours at the company office.

Fred finally won the argument but only after a costly trip to court. Two years of bitter litigation was the price the partners had to pay for failing to make clear, right at the start, what they meant by the expression "fifty-fifty."

The case illustrates the danger of assuming that "plain English" is always plain. When money or legal rights are at stake, people have an astonishing capacity for putting different interpretations on what might at first have seemed perfectly clear.

Consider the following words: "freedom," "cash on hand," "furniture," "unmarried," "immediately," "children." Plain English? But...

Does "freedom" mean that the article positively can't burn? Does "cash on hand" include money in the bank? Does "furniture" include silverware and china? Does "unmarried" include someone who was married, then divorced? Does "immediately" allow for a reasonable delay? Do "children" include step-children?

Each of these questions has led to litigation. Furthermore, in each instance, courts have given both yes and no answers, depending on the particular circumstances. Even the lowliest prepositions or conjunctions can be tricky. The United States Supreme Court itself has had to rule on the meaning of "and" (11 times), "from" (four times), and "but" (twice).

The lesson should be obvious. Not everyone who speaks English is able to use it with precision. Making any important legal agreement is definitely a job for an expert.

# Lone Star Gas Co. Is Seeking Rate Increases

Lone Star Gas Company has announced that it would apply for residential and commercial rate increases from the cities and towns it serves on its distribution system. Lone Star stated that any residential and commercial rate increase would be limited to ten per cent. The company serves 328 towns and cities in Texas, with over one million residential and commercial customers.

The application for rate increases, when presented to each city, will list increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money, and higher gross receipts, franchise and ad valorem taxes as primary reasons for Lone Star's income deficiency. According to the company, increases are needed in a substantial number of cities to enable it to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public.

It is estimated that when all rate requests are fully approved by the cities, Lone Star Gas Company will realize \$3.2 million in additional revenue, based on volumes sold to residential and commercial customers in 1971 but adjusted to normal weather conditions.

Lone Star is also requesting the cities to pass ordinances permitting automatic adjustment for the cost of gas.

A company spokesman added that "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies."

The Texas Railroad Commission in March, 1972, authorized Lone Star Gas to adjust its intracompany "city rates" charge for gas sold to residential and commercial customers, based on the cost of gas purchased by the company. This rate adjustment permits Lone Star to receive 50 per cent of the increase or decrease of the company's cost of gas from the cities it serves on a semiannual basis.

Company officials stated that they would ask all cities to grant the gas cost adjustment provision. A Lone Star spokesman stressed that "the need to continue adding new reserves and the spiraling cost which we must pay for gas create a problem recognized by the Railroad Commission. This gas cost adjustment will be a step forward in stimulating additional exploration and development of new natural gas reserves in Texas."

(Executive Director National Coordinating Council on Drug Education) Announcing primary goals is only the first function of effective drug abuse prevention programs. The second step is examining continuity of messages and programs.

Are programs conceptually building on each other? Is the message appropriate to the age group and level of experimentation or use? Is the message consistent with what the group is learning about other subjects, like sex? Is it consistent with human behavior?

For example, we tell four year olds, "Don't cross the street." When they are six they learn about red lights, green lights, and walk signs. When they get a little older they learn to ignore signs and judge speed and distance of on-coming cars before crossing. And when they are teenagers they learn to jay walk (usually by watching adult examples).

Drug education should be like that.

We shouldn't overdose children with more information than they need and, on the other hand, we shouldn't expect children to change behavior when useless or non-relevant information is presented. Now is the time to begin conceptualizing and outlining goals and procedures for reaching those goals. Until this is done, we will continue to flounder probably causing more harm than good.

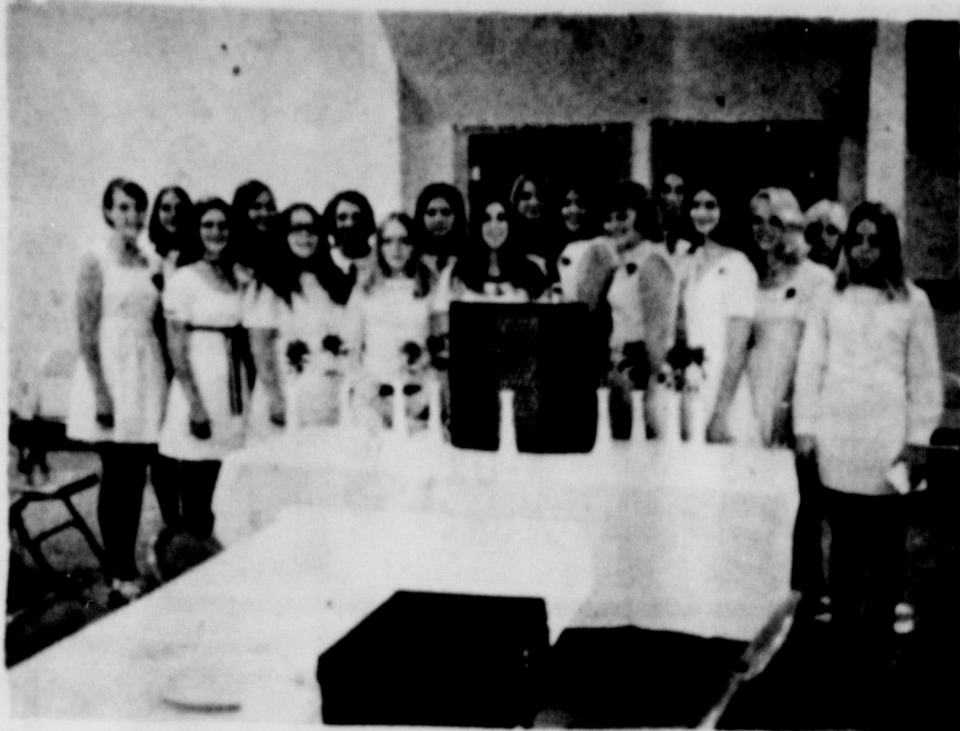

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## To Spray Or Not To Spray Is Question

CHILDRESS (Special)--Whether or not to use insecticide on the boll weevil in July racks the nerves annually of the Rolling Plains cotton grower.

Because using insecticide on the weevil at such a time, says Emory L. Boring III, is almost certain to bring on a costly fight with another mean cotton pest, the bollworm.

Boring is entomologist at Vernon for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University. He was a speaker here, at Stamford and at Sweetwater, sites of recent production conferences sponsored by the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Inc. and the Rolling Plains Economic Program (R-PEP).

"And with the 1/2 to 3/4 bale of cotton per acre from out dryland production," says

he, "a fight with the bollworm eats deeply into our profit because such a fight, lasting much of the growing season as it usually does, may require from 10 to 14 applications of insecticide."

Boring says the bollworm would not be the dreaded pest that it is if insecticide did not have to be used first to control the weevil, because the same insecticide kills the beneficial insects preying on the eggs and the larvae of the bollworm.

"If the need to control the weevil can somehow be postponed until mid-August or even later," he says, "the beneficial insects could then help prevent outbreaks of the bollworm."

There is a method, proved by demonstration, that helps postpone the control of the weevil until mid-August or even later: Diapause Boll Weevil Control, or DBWC.

And Boring says DBWC, if carried out in the fall of the year, helps prevent damaging infestations of weevils until late in the growing season of the next year's cotton crop.

DBWC has worked in the St. Lawrence area of Glasscock county to the extent that growers, to their delight, did not have to use any insecticide, early or late, in their 1971 cotton, because the weevils were not there in damaging numbers.

The St. Lawrence weevils had been reduced below damaging numbers because the growers source.

On the weevil in '72, Boring

suggests that the R-PEP grower should use insecticide only when he finds, by careful inspection, damaging infestations in his field. Where insecticidal control is begun, the field should be inspected every three or four days to determine the need for further control of either the weevil or the bollworm, had:

1. Organized themselves for 100 percent participation beginning in 1968 in a DBWC program proposed by Extension Entomologist Charles W. Neeb and County Agricultural Agent Oliver F. Werst.
2. Planted on or near as possible to the same date in 1968, 1969, and 1970.
3. Used insecticide three times in Septembers to kill as many weevils as possible.
4. Mixed the insecticides Guthion or methyl parathion (to kill yet more weevils) with their harvest-aid chemicals in the three years, and harvested as early as possible to destroy the food supply of weevils yet remaining and trying to get fat for the winter.
5. Shredded the stalks and plowed them under to prevent regrowth of the cotton and to eliminate the weevil's food

## IN LOVE WITH LIFE

OR HOW IT WOULD BE IF I WERE KILLED IN AN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Editor's Note: The following article was taken from a recent issue of The Hamlin Herald. Because of the many tragic accidents that are happening each week, if this will influence one person to be more careful, then it has served a good purpose.)

Agony claws my mind. I am a statistic. When I first got here I felt very much alone. I was overwhelmed with grief and I expected to find sympathy.

I found no sympathy. I saw only thousands of others whose bodies were as badly mangled as mine. I was given a number and placed in a category. The category was called "Traffic Fatalities."

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheeled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded. "All the kids drive." When the 2:50 bell rang I threw my books in the locker. I was free until 8:40 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot — excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss. Free!

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off — going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing I remembered was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard a deafening crash and felt a terrific jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly, I awakened. It was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything. Hey. Don't pull that sheet over my head. I can't be dead. I'm only 17. I've got a date tonight. I'm supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't lived yet. I can't be dead.

Later I was placed in a drawer. My folks had to identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes when she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes — he is our son."

The funeral was a weird experience. I saw all my relatives and friends walk toward the casket. They passed by, one by one, and looked at me with the saddest eyes I've ever seen. Some of my buddies were crying. A few of the girls touched my hand and sobbed as they walked away.

Please — somebody — wake me up! Get me out of here. I can't bear to see my mom and dad so broke up. My grandparents are so racked with grief they can barely walk. My brother and sister are like zombies. They move like robots. In a daze. Everybody. No one can believe this. And I can't believe it either.

Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. I want to sing and dance. Please don't put me in the ground. I promise if you give me just one more chance, God, I'll be the most careful driver in the whole world. All I want is one more chance. Please, God, I'm only 17.

to do with used pesticide containers is still around, but the industry has come up with a way to greatly reduce the potential hazard from material remaining in metal or glass containers once they have been emptied. It's a simple rinse and drain procedure employed at the time the pesticide is placed in the spray tank, thus reducing the potential for contamination of soil and water.

The National Agricultural Chemicals Association suggests a procedure based on the technique used by laboratories to reduce the concentration of material in a container.

After normal emptying the container should be allowed to drain in a vertical position for 40 seconds. For best results the container should be rinsed 3 times, allowing 30 seconds for draining after each rinse.

Rinse materials should be easily measurable. Water or other diluting material being used in the spray program should be used to rinse the container. Use one quart for each rinse of a 1-gallon can of jug; a gallon for each 5-

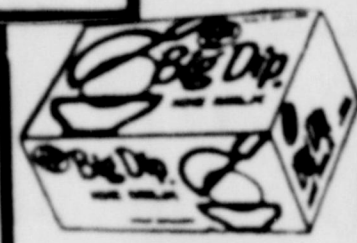

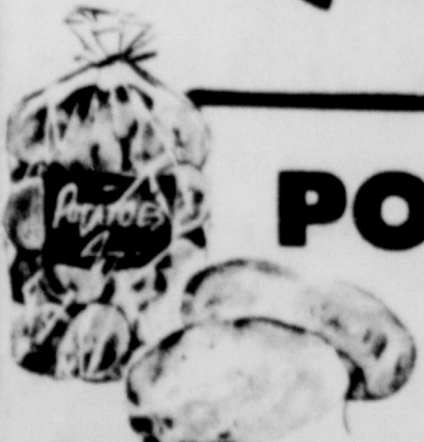

to do with used pesticide containers is still around, but the industry has come up with a way to greatly reduce the potential hazard from material remaining in metal or glass containers once they have been emptied. It's a simple rinse and drain procedure employed at the time the pesticide is placed in the spray tank, thus reducing the potential for contamination of soil and water. The National Agricultural Chemicals Association suggests a procedure based on the technique used by laboratories to reduce the concentration of material in a container. After normal emptying the container should be allowed to drain in a vertical position for 40 seconds. For best results the container should be rinsed 3 times, allowing 30 seconds for draining after each rinse. Rinse materials should be easily measurable. Water or other diluting material being used in the spray program should be used to rinse the container. Use one quart for each rinse of a 1-gallon can or jug; a gallon for each 5-

gallon can; and 5 gallons for either 30 or 55 gallon drums. Drain each rinse into the spray tank before filling it to the desired level. Pesticide containers should not be reused.

Whatever the disposition to be made of used pesticide containers they pose less potential for a hazard if they have been properly rinsed and drained at the time they are emptied.

IN LOVE WITH LIFE OR HOW IT WOULD BE IF I WERE KILLED IN AN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Editor's Note: The following article was taken from a recent issue of The Hamlin Herald. Because of the many tragic accidents that are happening each week, if this will influence one person to be more careful, then it has served a good purpose.)

Agony claws my mind. I am a statistic. When I first got here I felt very much alone. I was overwhelmed with grief and I expected to find sympathy.

I found no sympathy. I saw only thousands of others whose bodies were as badly mangled as mine. I was given a number and placed in a category. The category was called "Traffic Fatalities."

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheeled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded. "All the kids drive." When the 2:50 bell rang I threw my books in the locker. I was free until 8:40 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot — excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss. Free!

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off — going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing I remembered was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard a deafening crash and felt a terrific jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly, I awakened. It was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything. Hey, Don't pull that sheet over my head. I can't be dead. I'm only 17. I've got a date tonight. I'm supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't lived yet. I can't be dead.

Later I was placed in a drawer. My folks had to identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes when she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes — he is our son."

The funeral was a weird experience. I saw all my relatives and friends walk toward the casket. They passed by, one by one, and looked at me with the saddest eyes I've ever seen. Some of my buddies were crying. A few of the girls touched my hand and sobbed as they walked away.

Please — somebody — wake me up! Get me out of here. I can't bear to see my mom and dad so broke up. My grandparents are so racked with grief they can barely walk. My brother and sister are like zombies. They move like robots. In a daze. Everybody. No one can believe this. And I can't believe it either.

Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. I want to sing and dance. Please don't put me in the ground. I promise if you give me just one more chance, God, I'll be the most careful driver in the whole world. All I want is one more chance. Please, God, I'm only 17.

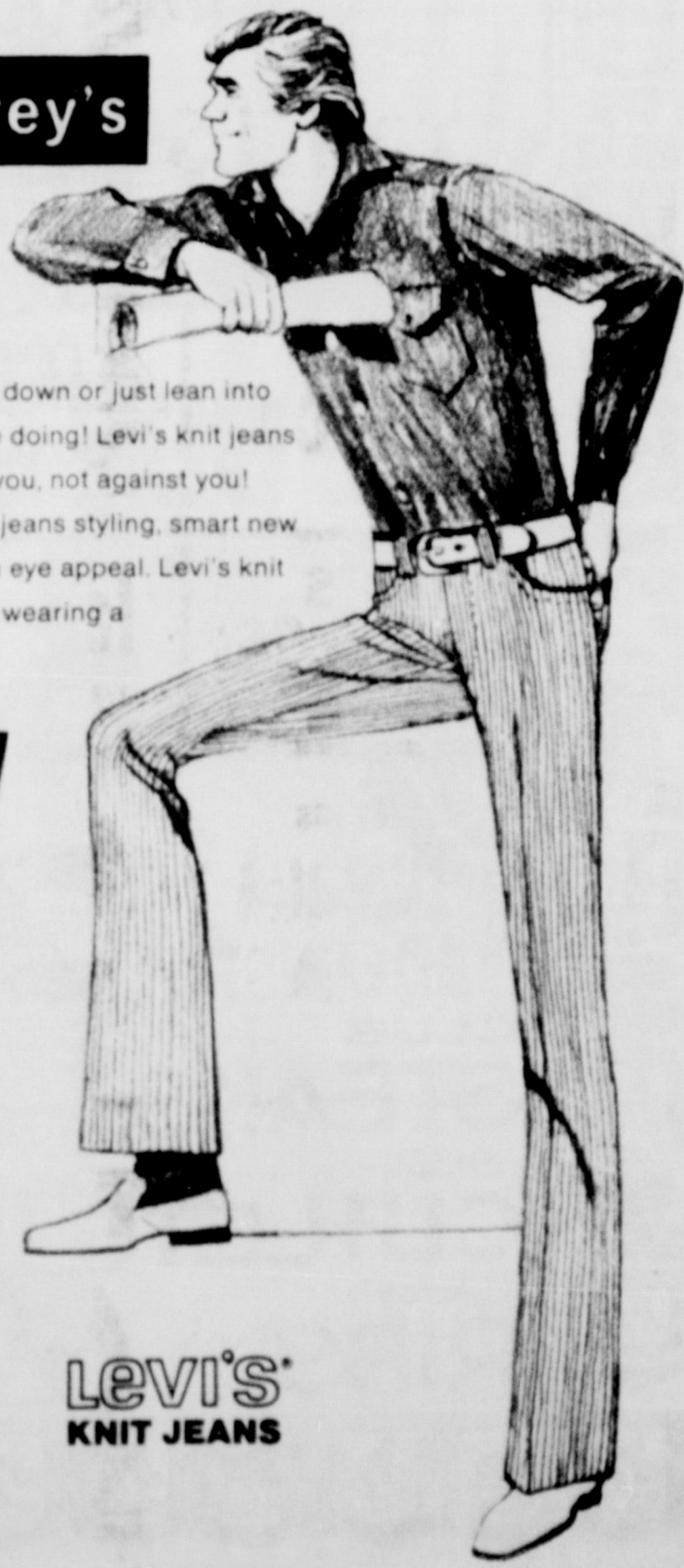

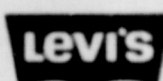
