Parade Saturday to Launch Vacation Bible Schools

A parade of youngsters enrolling in vacation Bible schools will be held downtown Saturday at 3 p. m., Mrs. Jim Ross, chairman, said Wednesday.

The parade will be sponsored jointly by the First Baptist Church, the First Methodist Church and the First Christian Church. All local churches were invited to participate.

Featured will be the school's

junior band, directed by W. J. Morris. The band has held practice sessions this week in preparation for the parade.

Mrs. Ross asked those who plan to participate to be at the First Baptist Church at 2:45. The parade will assemble there.

Children will carry posters advertising the Bible schools and a number of small floats and decorated bicycles are being planned.

Vacation Bible schools will begin Monday, June 4, at the Baptist Church, the Methodist Church and the Church of Christ. The school of the First Christian Church will be held in conjunction with the Methodists.

Farm Road Contract Let

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm to Market Roads 2279 and 143 in Knox County was awarded in Austin last week, Palmer Massey, district highway engineer at Childress, has announced.

The firm of Harry Campbell submitted the low bid of \$74,513.61 on the project, which includes paving FM 2279 from the Haskell County line to FM 143, and a new bridge on Union Creek west of Knox City.

Resident Engineer H. T. Cunningham of Munday will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 110 days to complete.

Furniture Totalling \$11,250 Purchased By School Board

Furniture for the elementary schools and the high school was purchased at a meeting of the Knox City School Board Monday night.

Bulk of the order went to the American Desk Manufacturing Co. of Temple, Supt. Chas. E. Silk said Wednesday. The library furniture, including charging desks, card catalog, atlas case, two dictionary stands, 12 tables and 48 chairs, was ordered from Remington Rand. Shipment date is August 15.

Also ordered for high school were 12 tables, 48 chairs, 135 chair-type desks and 11 teachers' desks and chairs.

Ordered for McGee-Ward School were 15 two-pupil airplane-type desks, as are now used in the primary grades, and 30 regular angular type chairs.

Other elementary furniture included seven round tables to seat 10, to be used as reading tables by the first, second and third grades; 70 chairs to be used with the tables; 270 chair-desks for the fifth through eighth grades; six teachers' desks and 8 teachers' chairs; and 11 legal-size 4-drawer filing cabinets with locks. Shipment date is August 1 to August 15.

The furniture cost approximately \$11,250, Supt. Silk said.

A furniture showing and bidding was held at the school Tuesday, May 22. Seven companies were represented and had furniture on display.

Furniture to be purchased later is for the homemaking department, the science room, typing room, offices of the superintendent and principal, and the conference room.

Regular meeting of the school board will be Tuesday night, June 5.

Hopping Tornadoes Keep Knox Citizens Hopping

Several tornadoes were spotted in the Knox City area Sunday, and storm clouds sent many local residents scurrying to their cellars.

City Marshal Alvin Roberts, who with other Knox County officers kept watchful eyes on the clouds all afternoon and evening, said "four or five" tornadoes were actually sighted by observers, but none struck populated areas or did any damage.

The first twister hit the ground southwest of the B. B. Hendrix ranch in King County about 5 p.

m., and was observed by many Knox Citizens. Others occurred after dark and were seen by officers stationed at vantage points.

Most severe threat to Knox City came about 9:30 p. m., when the fire alarm was sounded as a warning. The twister was first observed by Deputy Sheriff H. C. Stone and a highway patrolman, from two points on Highway 82 west of Benjamin. The officers notified Roberts, who with Bob Edwards was observing the clouds west of Knox City. The two moved to another spot and, seeing the twister headed toward Knox City, raced to town and sounded the alarm.

A report was circulated that a tornado had struck at Jud and that there had been one or more casualties, but Knox and Haskell county officers investigated and concluded the report was false. Melton said a tornado did strike the ground two or three miles from Jud, but a search of the area showed no damage or casualties.

The clouds also brought about a half inch of rain in Knox City, with much heavier rain and some hail in areas to the south. The farm road between Rochester and Weinert was closed because of high water for some time.

Three men were injured at Goree Friday night when a rim blew off a truck wheel.

Critically injured was Leland Harold Burgess, 34, of Hale Center, driver of the truck. Burgess suffered extensive head injuries and was rushed to Baylor Hospital in Dallas after receiving emergency treatment at the Knox County Hospital. Surgery was performed at Baylor, but no late report on the injured man's condition has been received here.

Less seriously injured were Dan Doneho and his son, Doug, 16, of Goree. Both were carried to the Baylor County Hospital in Seymour.

According to reports, the men had just repaired a tire on Burgess' truck, which was loaded with wheat, and noticed that the rim was not fitting properly. Burgess struck the rim with a hammer and it flew off the wheel, striking all three men.

Cotton Congress Opens at Lubbock

Some of the nation's top cotton experts will speak at the 17th annual American Cotton Congress to begin in Lubbock today (Thursday). The Congress will last until June 2.

In addition to the speakers, there will be a field trip and irrigation demonstration plus a tour of the facilities at Texas Technological College.

The Congress was to open at 2 p. m. today in the Caprock Hotel. Highlighting the program will be the keynote address by Burriss Jackson, Hillsboro, chairman of the Congress. He will be followed by Lamar Fleming Jr., chairman of the board of directors of Anderson, Clayton & Co., who will discuss the world cotton situation.

Friday's sessions will be held in the Lubbock Hotel beginning at 9 a. m. That night at the Caprock Hotel, Marvin L. McLain, assistant secretary of agriculture, will speak on "The Challenge Facing Cotton."

Saturday the group will meet at Texas Technological College.

All Congress sessions are open to anyone interested in the cotton industry.

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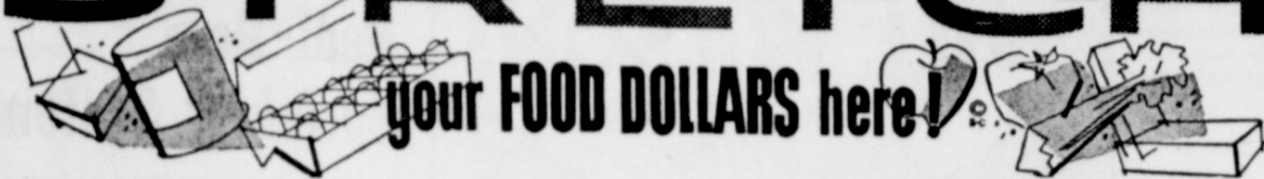
