## Judge Williams Back On Job In District Court

Judge Lewis Williams, "feeling fine" after recuperating from injuries received in an automobile accident several weeks ago, returned to the bench in 50th Judicial District court Tuesday and is busy clearing a heavy court docket.

The judge, who is a candidate for re-election, was injured June 5 when his car was involved in a collision with a truck on the Knox City-Benjamin highway. His full recovery has been faster than anticipated, and he has been at work at his Knox City office the past week.

Judge Williams said Tuesday, however, that his forced inactivity caused court work to pile up, and he will be busy the next two weeks trying several criminal cases and civil suits over the district, which includes Knox, King, Baylor and Cottle counties.

"I hope to find time between court sessions," he added, "to do some active campaigning, and as soon as the court docket is cleared I will get over the district as much as possible before the primary July 29th."

## Two Arrested for Theft of Batteries At O'Brien, Rule

Several thefts in the O'Brien and Rule areas Tuesday night of last week were cleared up with the arrest of two men in Stamford.

Arrested and charged with theft over \$50 were George Loftis, 23, of Rochester and Richard Goble, 19, of Levelland, former resident of Rochester.

The thefts included batteries taken from tractors and irrigation water pumps. Also stolen were two heavy duty batteries taken from two road maintainers belonging to Haskell County Precinct 1, while the batteries on two maintainers owned by Precinct 4 were damaged or ruined when the culprits attempted to remove them.

In addition to those taken from the county road machines, batteries were stolen from Slover Bledsoe, Jess Place, Jack Gaunt and Truitt Alvis.

Some of the stolen batteries were sold in Stamford and Abilene the following day, officers said.

Sheriff Bill Pennington of Haskell County said the two men will be held in custody pending grand jury investigation of the thefts.

## FORMER RESIDENT PROMOTED BY FORT WORTH BANK

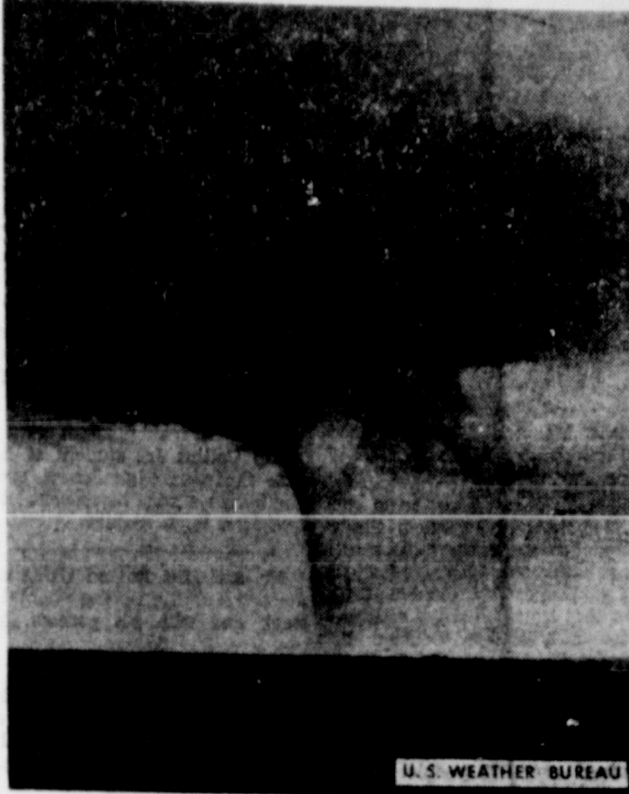
D. T. Averitt of Ft. Worth last week was named a first vice-president of the First National Bank in Ft. Worth. The promotion was effective this week.

## Pilot Reports Sighting Tornado Here; Officers Believe Report Erroneous

An airplane pilot reported seeing a tornado "near Knox City" late Wednesday afternoon, but a check of the area by City Marshal Alvin Roberts—plus the fact that the skies in the immediate vicinity

of Knox City were almost cloudless when the storm was reported—lead to the belief that the pilot was mistaken.

Heavy clouds were hanging well to the west and south. Guthrie reported heavy rain during the afternoon, and a twister was sighted as it struck the ground seven miles north of Anson.

The weather bureau at Abilene issued a severe weather warning for an area extending to 20 miles northwest of Benjamin, to Brownfield, to Midland and back to Abilene. The warning was lifted at 6 p. m., however, before skies over Knox City had become very cloudy.

## Farmers to Decide Vital Questions in Wheat Referendum

Friday, July 20, is the date when growers will determine how they want to market their 1957 wheat crop. H. H. Partridge, chairman of the Knox County ASC committee, reminded farmers today.

Farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat as grain on a farm in 1957 are eligible to cast ballots in the wheat quota referendum. Polling places will be set up in convenient locations in the county, and wheat growers will be notified where they may vote.

A two-thirds favorable vote will mean that marketing quotas and penalties on excess wheat will be in effect for the 1957 wheat crop. Under quotas, too, price support to growers in the commercial area who comply with their wheat acreage allotments will be at the full level available—between 75 and 90 percent of parity.

If more than one-third of the growers voting disapprove quotas, the quotas will not be in effect, and the available price support on the 1957 wheat crop to growers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments will be at the full level available—between 75 and 90 percent of parity.

When a marketing quota program is in effect, the excess wheat of a grower who does not comply with his farm wheat acreage allotment and who has more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain on the farm will be subject to a marketing quota penalty. This penalty will be equal to 45 percent of the May 1, 1957, parity price for wheat.

Chairman Partridge emphasized that the vote is on marketing quotas and not wheat allotments. Whether or not the vote is favorable on the quotas, acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1957 wheat crop.

Marketing quotas have been approved by growers voting in referendums for the past three wheat crops. Last year, 77.3 percent of the growers voting favored quotas for the 1956 Crop.

## 60 Knox County Farmers Put Cotton Acreage in Reserve Program

J. T. Gilpin, manager of the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office, said Tuesday that approximately 60 Knox County farmers have put cotton acreage into the Soil Bank Program, which is being administered by the ASC.

Most of the participating farmers, Gilpin indicated, did not plant their acreage because of the drought, while some have cotton up but will plow up a portion of it.

If a farmer did not plant the acreage, Gilpin said, the payment

will be the normal yield multiplied by 15 cents. For cotton that was up but destroyed by the drought or other natural causes payment is the normal or appraised yield, whichever is smaller, multiplied by 15 cents; but not less than \$6.00 per acre.

According to these figures the farmer who did not plant his acreage may receive more than the farmer who planted but who failed to get his cotton up to a stand.

Normal yield in the county varies from 100 pounds per acre to

300 pounds per acre, the ASC manager said, with the average normal yield over the county a whole about 191 pounds.

Highest average normal yield is 227 pounds in the Munday area. In the north part of the county the yield is about 144 pounds, and in the Knox City area, due to the wide variety of soils, it varies from 100 pounds to 225 pounds.

About 50 farmers have participated in the wheat division of the Soil Bank program. Again, in most instances, the wheat was not harvested due to the drought.

Payment for wheat is \$4 per acre if not planted, or \$6 per acre if planted but not harvested.

The largest cotton acreage that can be placed in the acreage reserve is 50 percent of a farmer's allotment of 10 acres, whichever is larger. The smallest amount is 10 percent of the allotment or two acres, whichever is larger.

Among the requirements for participation in the acreage reserve are: (1) Must not be grazed after June 22; (2) Must not harvest any crop from the reserve during 1956; (3) Must control noxious weeds; (4) Must comply with acreage allotments.

The division of payment between a landlord and tenant must be fair and equitable. Generally, the division will be approved by county ASC committees if it is based on the contribution the landlord and tenant each would have made in producing the crop and on the basis they would have shared the crop.

Worth.

Rev. Billy Frazier, pastor of the Knox City Baptist Church, was moderator for the service Friday night. Rev. Bob Benson, pastor of the Rochester Baptist Church, gave the charge to Rev. Johnston and Rev. W. D. Malone of Brownwood gave the charge to the church. Rev. Malone is a former pastor of the O'Brien church.

Rev. C. A. Powell of Crowell, also a former pastor, preached the evening sermon. Others taking part on the program were the O'Brien pastor, Rev. Mart Hardin, Rev. C. T. Ely, pastor of the Crowell Baptist Church, and Mrs. W. D. Malone, who gave special music.

**Livestock Pests  
 Can Be Controlled  
 With Chemicals**

COLLEGE STATION. — Meat  
 and milk production can be cut  
 by insect pests which attack live-  
 stock during this time of year,  
 says C. F. Garner, assistant exten-  
 sion entomologist. The worst in-  
 sect offenders are hornflies, spin-  
 ose ear ticks, and stable flies. Un-  
 less controlled, they will rob Tex-  
 as meat and milk producers of  
 several million dollars, Garner  
 warns.

These pests can be controlled  
 by pesticides applied as smears,  
 dips or sprays. But, points out the  
 entomologist, chemicals alone are  
 not enough. Breeding centers,  
 such as manure piles, strawstack  
 bottoms and the like should be  
 eliminated. All water outlets and  
 pools of accumulated water should  
 be drained and low places in the  
 lots filled with soil.

Garner says DDT should not be  
 used for lice, tick or fly control  
 on cows producing milk for hu-  
 man consumption. Neither should  
 this material be used for spraying  
 the inside of dairy barns and  
 buildings. He advises using only  
 recommended insecticides for  
 treating livestock and barns and  
 urges care in mixing and applying  
 the materials.

A good livestock pest control  
 program depends on correct diag-  
 nosis and medication. For com-  
 plete details on the amount of  
 pesticides to use, Garner suggests  
 a visit with the county agent. Ask  
 him for a copy of L-256.

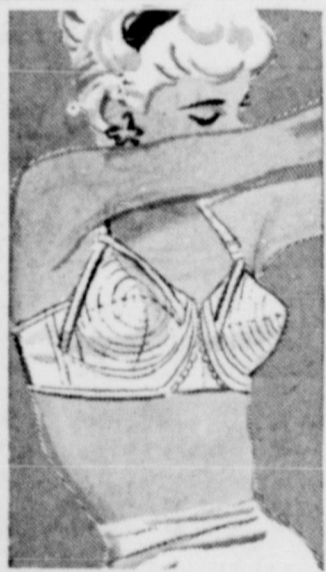

**Soil Conservation District Releases Monthly Report**

In a monthly newsletter distributed to cooperators in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District by the district's board of supervisors, the supervisors point out that there is still time to plant soil-improving summer legumes crops this season.

Many different summer legumes are adapted to the various soils in the district, the report continues. Guar is an excellent summer legume, adapted to all cultivated soil in the district, and is very drought resistant. The seeds are now being rolled and used as a protein supplement in livestock feeding.

Six to eight pounds of guar seed per acre should be planted when seeded in rows. Row seeding can be done with planters used for combine sorghums. The seed should be covered from one to two inches deep on land prepared in the same manner as for cotton or grain sorghum.

Cow peas is another annual legume recommended for most cultivated soils in the district. They develop a fair cover and are good in conditioning the soil. Cow peas should be seeded at the rate of 10 to 12 pounds per acre when planted in rows. When planted in mixtures with grain sorghums 5 to 10 pounds should be planted.

In order to obtain the best results, legumes planted should be inoculated with the proper inoculate.
