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HEALTH LETTER

"Environmental sanitation is the public health term for clean, safe housekeeping whether it applies to a private home and its surroundings or to towns and cities. Among other things, it insures safe drinking water, garbage and sewage disposal, the safe service of wholesome food including milk, rat and insect control, and general cleanliness of the premises. However, for environmental sanitation to be effective, it is essential that not only public health officials but the citizens living in their respective homes or operating establishments serving the public cooperate wholeheartedly with the local sanitation policies," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Consider, for example, the seasonal housefly hazard. It has been determined that 120 eggs are laid by a single female at one time and that a generation is produced every ten days at summer temperature. Thus, the possibility of reproduction during the warm months of a single fly runs into many millions. While the housefly does not bite, it is dangerous because it breeds and feeds upon both filth and food.

"Again, rats are the source of several diseases of man including plague, typhus fever, infectious jaundice, and trichinosis, to mention some of the more important ones. Homes can be made comparatively ratproof by removing rubbish and garbage accumulations, and by closing all avenues of access. Approved poisons and traps should be employed when a real problem presents itself.

"Removal of containers of stagnant water such as tin cans and barrels will do much to eliminate the mosquito for householders. The householder needs to devote more seasonal attention to mosquito eradication than he is today if this is to be properly controlled.

"In general, good and thorough housekeeping, inside and out, is the personal and civic duty of every home dweller. It not only adds to the pleasure of living and removes disease hazards, but increases the appearance of one's surroundings."

Under Texas Skies

July the 4th, 1945, is doubly significant to Texans. It was on that date 100 years ago that the convention officially authorized to act on the subject of annexation to the Union and to write a constitution for the state convened for its important deliberations at Austin.

Austin had been chosen to be the capital of the Republic of Texas in the year 1839. A rude statehouse had then been constructed. About three years later, sometime during 1842, following the election of Sam Houston as President, he abandoned the capital, which was by then a village of some 700 souls, and ordered the government to accompany him to Houston and finally to Washington-on-the-Brazos. The latter place thereby was where the last Congress met, and was the home of President Jones who had succeeded Gen. Houston.

When the Congress and the President authorized that Austin should be the convention city, the population by then reduced to less than 300 joyfully went to work to prepare for the reception of the 61 deputies. The statehouse, then only six years old was in no condition for such an important body. Austin's lone hotel, its market place, rude frontier business houses and log cabin homes were hastily readied for the delegation, and a meeting place for the convention was secured in a business house on Congress Avenue.

They came, these 67 deputies, from every county of the Texas of their day. They came, not by train, bus, motor car or plane, but by stagecoach, carriage, prairie-schooner, on horse back and pack animal. They came, unescorted through regions infested by savage Indians and wild animals, with trusty rifles, Bowie knives and perhaps a few recently invented Colt pistols at their sides. They came, garbed in homespun garments of the pioneers, these frontiersmen of liberty. No band music or cannon salute heralded their arrival in the capital of their country. No telegrams, phone messages, radio broadcasts, or a daily press announced their presence at the convention. No pictures were taken of the delegation, nor was there a flashlight photograph made of the meeting place and of their gathering there. They came from many walks of life, of every adult age and circumstance; Anglo-American and Latin-Americans, too; without reference to religious dogma or secular creed, but firm in their conviction that the All-Seeing-Eye that does not overlook the sparrow's fall would surely watch over them as they deliberated over the destiny of the Lone Star State of Texas. They came with their Bibles and law books, with copies of the constitution of both of the nations concerned, with the resolution of annexation already approved by the Congress of the United States, and with such other material as was then available to assist them in the discharge of their solemn responsibilities.

Among their numbers were heroes of San Jacinto and Indian wars as well as statesmen whose immortal names will forever adorn the pages of Texas history. The peerless Thomas J. Rusk, seer of the assembly, was chosen to serve as chairman, they wrought well. They approved annexation and wrote a constitution proclaimed by Daniel Webster to be one of the finest documents of its kind in all human history. Their decisions were adopted by the people who went to the polls, uninstructed, unregimented and unafraid. Once again they proved that true democracy meets the highest test of a citizenship who stand ever ready to preserve freedom pure and undefiled.

Room and Board Figured As Wages In Security Tax

It has been found through developing information pertaining to claims for old age and survivors insurance that some employers do not understand that wages may include other items than cash. R. L. Surles, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Board office said today.

In cases where an employer hires an individual and agrees to pay him a certain wage per day, week or month, plus his board and lodging, these last two items are also considered wages under the law.

The worker's wages, as reported by his employer when he makes his tax report, are credited to the individual "social security account" maintained for each worker according to his social security account number by the Social Security Board. These credits, it was explained, are used to compute the amount of benefits that may be due when a claimant files for benefits.

about two steps behind. I turned to my job of watching the ridge opposite. About a minute later, Pete yelled for help. He had turned to see if Sam was coming and saw him lying just outside my hole, on the other side of a mound of rocks. A sniper had shot him through the back just as he cleared that mound. He had fallen without a sound. I heard neither his fall nor the scream of the bullet which must have passed within inches of my head.

"Pete, the corpman, who had arrived almost immediately, my radioman and one of the wiremen, lifted Sam on to a stretcher and started for the company command post, a hundred yards or so to the rear.

"That was the last I saw of Sam, but I've thought a thousand times of those last few minutes with him in that hell-hole on Iwo Jima. I liked Sam, as everyone did. I had worked with him, taught him mathematics and the tricks of his job, since our outfit was first formed back at Pendleton, in California. I'm so sorry it had to end this way, but that is one of the horrors of war, and I'll probably be with him before this is over.

"But if he could tell you—I rather think he'd not have done it differently. I know what a shock it has been to you and please accept my heartfelt sympathies."

Other letters, from Sam Ed's buddies, Pfc. Carl F. Becker and Pfc. Sam Precopio, relate about the same details as Lt. Allen's letter, only telling more about their companionship and casual events prior to his death.

First Lieutenant J. W. Thurlow, Jr. wrote of Sam Ed's final resting place in the Fifth Marine cemetery, and added a few missing details. Lt. Thurlow also served as censor for the battery.

Sgt. H. L. Bunch, Pfc. R. J. Joachim, and Cpl. Jennings W. Carter, are others in the battery that have written Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter letters of condolence.

Captain Ralph A. Welser and Chaplain John H. Galbreath added their messages of sympathy in recent letters to the Carpenters.

By putting all the remnants together, Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter have been able to see the thing pretty clearly now, and time has helped to heal the wound.

Some day, when it's all over, Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter have a pilgrimage to make—a pilgrimage to a lonely island in the Pacific that now holds something dear to them.

Treated Fence Posts Last Twenty Years

New Method Cost Now Reduced to Six Cents

THE chlorinated phenol dunking method of treating fence posts, a comparatively new wood preservative, can be used at a cost of from 5 to 6 cents per post. Tests conducted at the University of Idaho experiment station show that the life of soft wood posts, properly treated by this method, will be from 15 to 20 years. They found that the



bottom of the post will last the life of the top.

Not only is it possible to treat fence posts, but fence rails, gates, barn silos, bridge timbers, irrigation gates, and similar pieces can be treated.

Chlorinated phenol is a liquid concentrate, and can be obtained full strength or diluted with various amounts of oil. Buying in concentrate form saves shipping and storage; it can then be diluted in proportions of one part of concentrate to 14 parts of diesel oil, stove oil or old crank case drainings. Not only for this purpose but for spraying purposes, it is usually possible to secure crank case drainings at service stations at little cost.

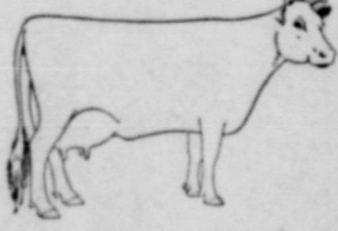
White Ash.
The white ash is not only America's leading hardwood but its most important ash. It grows from Nova Scotia westward to Minnesota and southward almost to the Gulf of Mexico. It is a stately tree 75 to 125 feet high.

The wood of the white ash is heavy, hard, strong and stiff, seasons well, takes a good polish and is free from taste or odor. Its principal uses are for handles, cooperage, furniture, motor vehicle parts, sporting and athletic goods, as well as railroad ties, veneer and fuel.

Select Dairy Cows On Standard Basis

In selecting dairy cows certain definite points must be looked for. Among the most important are:

1. Ample digestive capacity, which means good length, width and depth of body.
2. A good constitution as shown by great chest capacity.
3. A large udder of soft quality.

4. The rump should be long, wide and level and the hip bones should be wide apart.
5. The hide should be thin, loose and pliable, and the bones of medium size, with the head showing general refinement.
6. Must have dairy temperament, or tendency and ability to produce milk.
7. Generally the larger the dairy cow the better. Size and quality, however, must be properly correlated.
