Target Date For Cotton Planting in Rolling Plains Area Is May 22 or Later; Each Community To Set Own Deadline

The target date for starting cotton planting this year is May 22 or after, according to Charles Stenholm, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers. He added, however, that every community should base its planting date on local moisture conditions, five-day forecasts, long range weather predictions and what the majority of the farmers in the community want.

It appears at this time that the majority of the farmers in the Rolling Plains will make a big attempt to abide by the May 22 date. The selection of the date is one of the most important managerial decisions a farmer makes each year. The advantages of following the May 22 date are many. Land is left bedded and in excellent condition to soak up and store early May rains for later use of making pounds of lint. When planting is done earlier, heavy May rains fall on flattened ground, then run off eroding the soil. Planting early encourages more weed growth and increases costs of making a crop, while late planting cuts down overall expenses greatly. Planting late allows

the cotton plant to grow with nature instead of against it.

Community and county-wide cooperation in planting is also recognized as being essential for economical control of the boll weevil. Normally a cotton plant begins squaring about 40 days after planting and squares reach the one-third grown stage 10 days later. Overwintered weevils do not destroy squares or lay eggs until the squares are one-third grown. Growers agreeing on the May 22 planting period allow overwintered weevils to be out of hibernation before squares are one-third grown. Weevils can then be more easily controlled by a community wide early season spray program in which two applications of low volume insecticide are applied before the overwintered weevils have an opportunity to lay eggs.

Uniform planting dates are just one of the many ways farmers in the Rolling Plains can work together to increase production of higher quality cotton, said Stenholm. "Weather data is available for all areas of the Rolling Plains to assist farmers in making their decisions. Contact RPCG for any needed information."

Son Of Locals Seriously Ill In Vietnam

Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Beauchamp of Knox City received a telegram Tuesday morning from the office of the Secretary of the U. S. Army informing them of the illness of their son, Glenn, in Vietnam.

The telegram said that Chief Warrant Officer Beauchamp was placed on the seriously ill list in Viet Nam on April 9 as the result of bleeding duodenal ulcer and that in the judgment of the attending physician, Beauchamp's condition is of such severity that there is cause for concern.

The telegram went on to say that although the Beauchamp's son was serious there was no imminent danger to life. It also assured the Beauchamps that their son was being given the best medical attention available and that every measure is being taken to aid him.

At the time the telegram was sent Beauchamp was in the 3rd Field Hospital in Vietnam.

CWO Beauchamp is a career army man and had an overseas assignment earlier in Japan. His wife, Lavaughn and their children, Steve and twins, Debra and David reside at Killeen.

4 1/2 Inches Of Rain Recorded In Area

That wonderful rain most of us have been looking for since last September or October fell during the early morning hours Wednesday.

The rain clouds built up in the South Plains during the late afternoon Tuesday, and moved slowly this way. This area was in the heavier fall, as Childress to the north did not report any rain.

Haskell and Rule to the south of Knox City were reported to have had very little moisture.

From farmers in our area, Earl Watson reported from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 inches on his farm four miles north of Knox City. Ansel Waldrip, who lives two and one-half miles south of town reported 3.81. Lee Smith, whose place is approximately six miles west of Knox City said he received 2.95.

Sammy B. White received from 4 to 5 inches at his place south of town, and approximately 2 1/2 inches on the place west of town. Southeast of Knox City at the M. S. Lowrey farm, 4.6 inches was recorded. At the J. M. Bradberry farm east of K. C., Mrs. Bradberry reported "almost 5 inches" of rain.

Some light hail was heard on the roofs during the rain, but no report of any damage from the hail had been heard of. The rain fell for about three hours and there was some wind from the south in some of the thundershowers, but generally speaking, everyone received some benefit.

Patrick C. Leroux, Knox City Crop Duster Escapes Plane Crash Injuries

Patrick C. Leroux luckily escaped serious injury Monday evening when his crop-dusting plane had a motor failure on take-off and crashed and burned near Newkirk, Oklahoma. According to a highway patrolman, the plane was burned so badly no identification number was legible.

A fellow employee took Leroux from the crash scene to a Newkirk clinic where he was given sedation and sent back to his motel to rest.

He was treated for burns on the right arm and "a few bruises here and there", according to the doctor. The doctor said he was told that the plane caught fire immediately, and that if Leroux had

been dazed or knocked out he could not have gotten out in time. He continued by saying, "He got out of there real quick. I think he had one foot on the ground before the plane hit."

Reportedly taken to the Ponca City Hospital, an hour-long search for Leroux among hospitals and clinics in Newkirk, Blackwell, Ponca City, Arkansas City, Kansas, and other area towns was made before discovering that he had gone back to his motel.

Leroux, his wife, Aurelia, and children, Yvette and Bouvier, live on East 7th Street in Knox City. His family was here at the time of the crash.

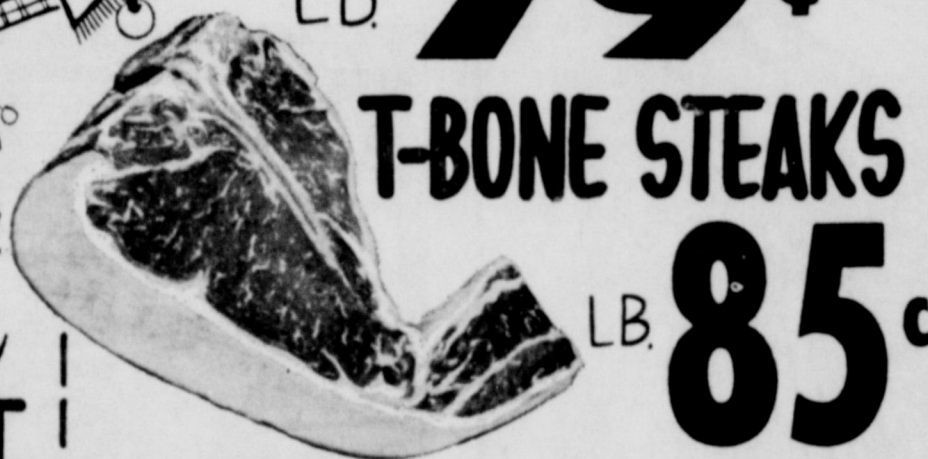

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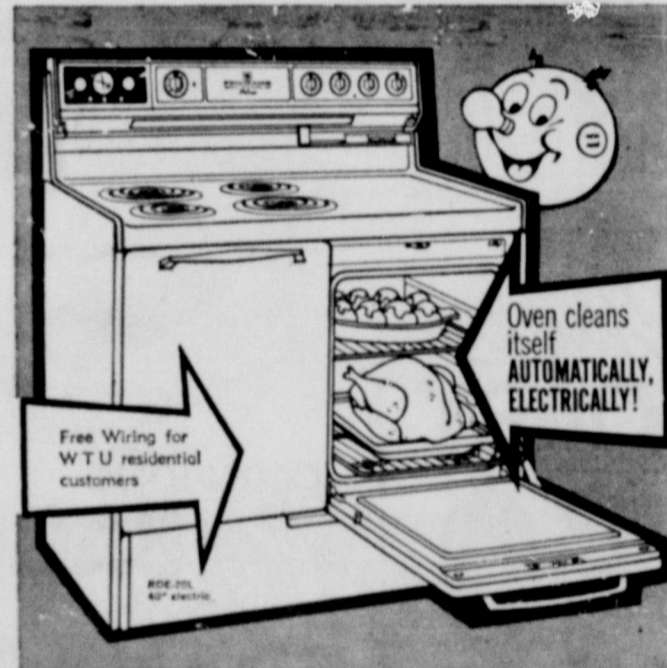

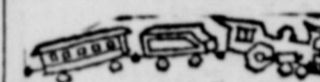

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF KNOX CITY, KNOX COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY.

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1 day of May, 1967, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the City limits of Knox City by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 800 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.760 gross; \$1.584 net

Next 1,200 cu. ft. @ \$1.482 per MCF gross; \$1.334 per MCF net.

Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ .927 per MCF gross; .834 per MCF net.

Next 20,000 cu. ft. @ .649 per MCF gross; .584 per MCF net.

Over 25,000 cu. ft. @ .593 per MCF gross; .534 per MCF net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately.

Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such

bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.

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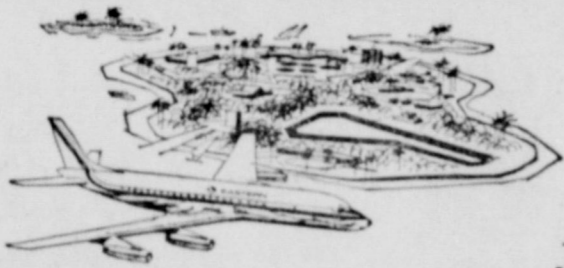
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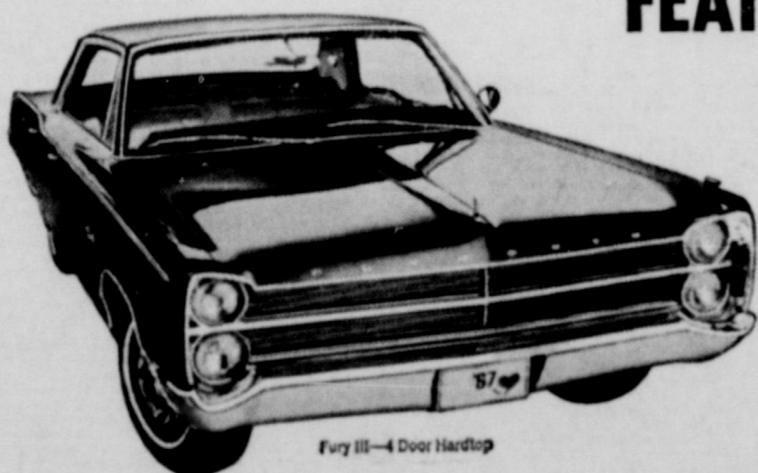
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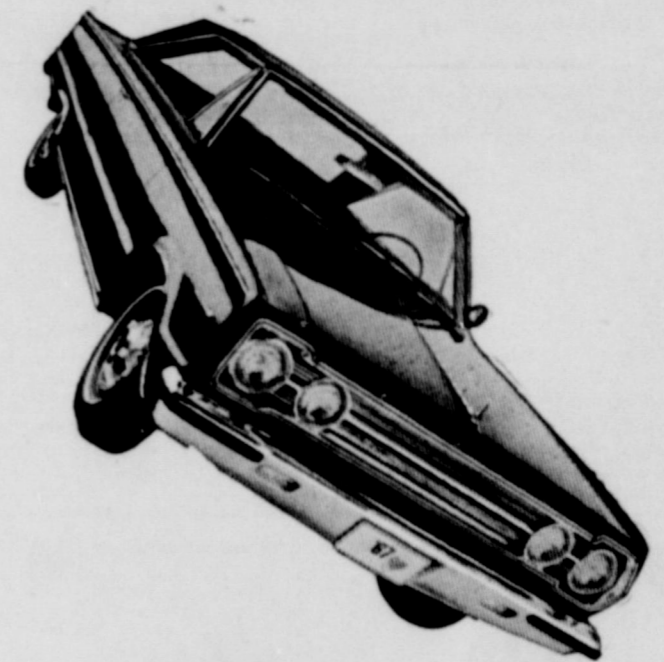
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
