Free Lunches Available To Certain Students

The Knox City School is now serving nutritious meals to students every school day for 45 cents (grades K-4) or 50 cents (grades 5-12), breakfast for 20 cents and extra milk for 10 cents, according to Bill Holcomb, principal.

However, children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the scale below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for breakfast is 5 cents and for lunch 10 cents. If a family's income is greater than those shown, but the family has unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of its income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, their children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

Applications have been furnished the students and families may apply at any time during the year for the free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals by completing the application and returning it to the school. Within ten days after receiving the completed application, the school will let the families know whether or not their children are eligible. If there are those who do not agree with the school's decision they have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing W.R. Baker, superintendent at Knox City School, telephone 658-3521.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. For those who have foster children living with them and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, they are asked to notify the school or indicate such on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

If we can be of any further assistance or if a family size or income changes during the year please contact the school.

King County History To Be Available Mar. 13

GUTHRIE—The voluminous bicentennial edition of "King County—Windmills and Barbed Wire" will be made public for the first time Saturday, March 13, with an announcement party at the King County Courthouse in Guthrie.

The 476-page history book, one of the largest county histories published in recent years, has been compiled and edited by the King County Historical Society and published by Nortex Press of Quanah, one of the Southwest's most prolific publishers of Texas County Histories.

The announcement party will be from 10 a.m. until noon under the direction of the Historical Society. Mrs. Peggy Walker, president of the group, said that books will be available for those who have reserved copies while orders for additional books will be taken.

The book is published in a hardback edition, eight by ten and a half inches and contains the most complete history of King County, its ranches and pioneer families ever published.

King County was officially established in 1891 and today remains much the same as it was in the late 19th century with most pioneer ranches still occupying the rolling plains and brakes. Large ranches such as the 6666, Pitchfork, Master-son, Swenson, Ross and others still compose much of the county with farming, mainly in the northern part, adding to King County's economy.

The history opens with a chapter on the organization of King County, including early day census and other courthouse records along with stories of hangings and gunfights in the county seat of Guthrie.

Other chapters include the historic ranches, a complete and authoritative history of education in King County, the county's churches and communities, many of them no longer in existence, and a collection of legends, yarns and stories about King County.

Well over 200 pioneer family histories are included with individual histories provided by the families themselves and adding considerably to the early day history of the county. More than 800 photographs are included in the history, the vast majority of them never before published and many having unusual historic significance.

Members of the King County Historical Society include Mrs. Walker, president; Mrs. Mildred Dillard, Mrs. Sybil Hensley, Mrs. Darlene Gibson, Mrs. Annel Smith, Mrs. Bernice Woods and Mrs. Floyce Master-son. Mrs. Viola Morris provided a large number of sketches for the book while Lottie Frances Gibson, a long-time King-Cottle County school teacher, gave the publisher permission to include her unpublished thesis, "History of Education in King County" as a chapter in the book.

Mrs. Walker expressed her appreciation and that of the committee for the help and cooperation of all the people of King County and former residents of the county in gathering material for the book.

"King County—Windmills and Barbed Wire" is number 20 in a series of Texas County Histories published by Nortex Press. Among other county histories carrying the Nortex imprint are Hardeman, Foard, Baylor, Childress, Haskell, Donley, Collin, LaSalle, Wise, Farmer, Lee, Dickens, Potter, Stephens, Motley, Washington, and Wilbarger.
