## Sales Tax Checks Go To Cities

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that his office mailed checks totaling \$13.2 million Monday to 640 Texas cities as their November rebate of the one-cent city sales tax.

Bullock said this raises to \$252.2 million the amount that the cities have received in rebates this calendar year, an increase of \$28.5 million -- or nearly 13 percent -- over the same period a year ago.

"This increase in consumer spending is a good sign that the Texas economy is on the right track," Bullock said.

The rebate checks ranged from \$2,532,776 for the City of Houston to \$501.38 to Springtown.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by retailers. The Comptroller's Office rebates to the cities their share on a monthly basis.

Knox City's net amount was \$2,056.99. Other area towns and the amounts received included Munday, \$1175.43; Haskell, \$3754.33; Stamford, \$3131.61; and Seymour, \$2,020.81.

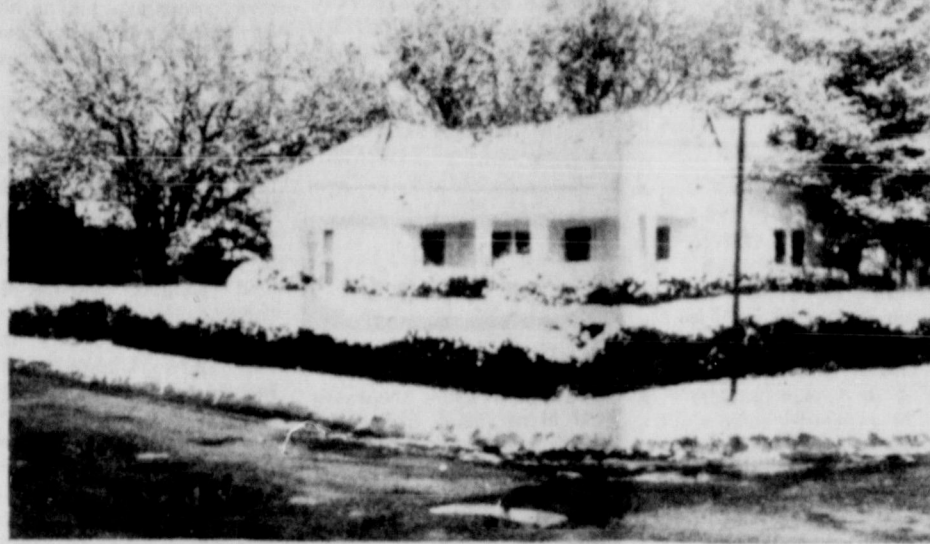

## Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of October, 1976, according to Sergeant Frank Jiricik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1976 shows a total of 43 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 23 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1976, shows a total of 608 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 324 injured, as compared to October 1975, with 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured. This was 65 more accidents, one less killed, and 41 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The 17 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1976, occurred in the following counties: Three each in Parker, Young; Two each in Sherman, Wise; One each in Archer, Lamb, Montague, Palo Pinto, Wichita, Deaf Smith, and Roberts.

WHEREAS, the family is the basic human community through which persons are nurtured and sustained in mutual love, responsibility, respect, and fidelity,

THEREFORE, I, R. Kenneth Crownover, Mayor of the City of Knox City, Texas, do hereby proclaim the week of November 21 as Family Week in Knox City, Texas. I hereby call upon citizens of Knox City to deserve and participate in social, economic, and religious efforts to maintain and strengthen families.

periodical exclusively written for women. For twenty years she continued her campaign for a national Thanksgiving Day in her editorial pages and through correspondence to governors and other leaders in the nation. In the midst of the Civil War, while some members of families were brutally killing one another, she finally persuaded President Abraham Lincoln that a national day of Thanksgiving would bring the American Family together again.

Lincoln issued the long-sought proclamation on October 3, 1863, just one week after his famous Gettysburg address. Since that proclamation, presidents have continued the custom of proclaiming a national day of Thanksgiving, which in 1941 became clearly established as the fourth Thursday in November.

Over the years, Thanksgiving time has come to mean family time more than any other American holiday. Writing for the Saturday Evening Post in November 1948, Rober Butterfield noted the remarkable influence that a now famous Courier and Ives lithographic print, "Home to Thanksgiving," had in building Thanksgiving as a traditional time for families together.

Stimulated by this picture of several generations of family gathering at a snow-covered New England farmhouse, and by similar pictures, some 50,000 New York City residents journeyed home each year to

## Cotton Prices Remain Steady

Cotton prices remained steady with grade 4231 bringing between 68½ and 70 cents per pound, according to Sidney Ferrell in charge of the Munday Clasing Office.

Trading was light as harvesting took first priority. Grade 42 was the predominant quality last week accounting for 40 percent of the classing total. Grade 41 was second with 26 percent and grade 51 with 15 percent. Grade 32 and 52 had six and seven percent.

Reduction in grade because of bark or grass accounted for 11 percent of the total. Staple 31 was the predominant staple with 59 percent. Staple 32 was 23 percent and staple 30 was 12 percent. Mike readings in the 3.5 to 4.9 range accounted for 76 percent of the total, while 18 percent miked five point zero or higher and six percent miked below three point five.

About 4,000 samples were classed by the Munday Clasing Office during the week ending Friday, November 12, bringing the season total to 5,500.

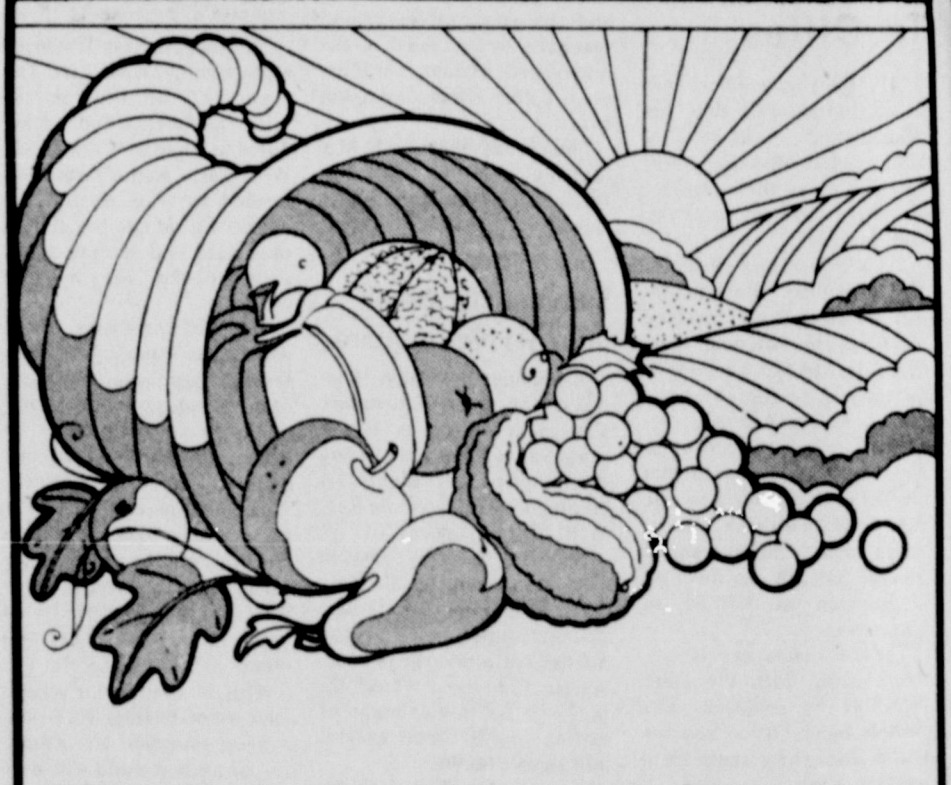

## SAUCE IS NAUTICAL — NICELY SPICED

Proper name for this herb-sparked sauce is "Marinara," suggesting the sea and sailors and all things nautical. But you don't have to be a sailor to love it—especially with shrimp. It's an easy sauce to make from scratch and worth it.

- SHRIMP MARINARA**
- 1 can (4 1/2 ounces) shrimp
  - 1 cup chopped onion
  - 1/3 cup olive oil
  - 1 cup chopped celery
  - 2 garlic cloves, chopped
  - 2 cans (16 ounces each) tomatoes
  - 2 teaspoons sugar
  - 1 teaspoon sweet basil
  - 1 teaspoon oregano
  - 1 bay leaf
  - 1 can (2 ounces) anchovy filets, chopped
  - Grated Romano or Parmesan cheese

Drain shrimp, reserving liquid. Add water to liquid to make 1 cup. In a saucepan saute onion in oil 5 minutes; add celery and garlic and saute another 5 minutes. Add tomatoes (solid pieces chopped), seasonings, shrimp water. Simmer *uncovered* 35 minutes or until sauce is thick. Add shrimp and anchovies; heat. Serve over spaghetti generously sprinkled with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

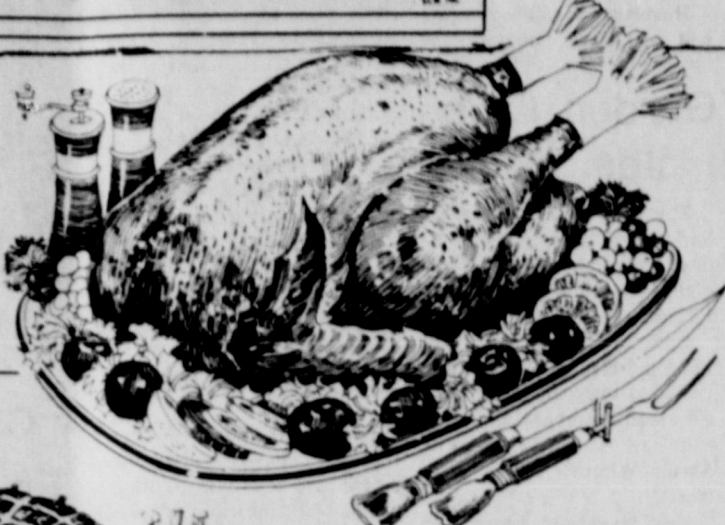

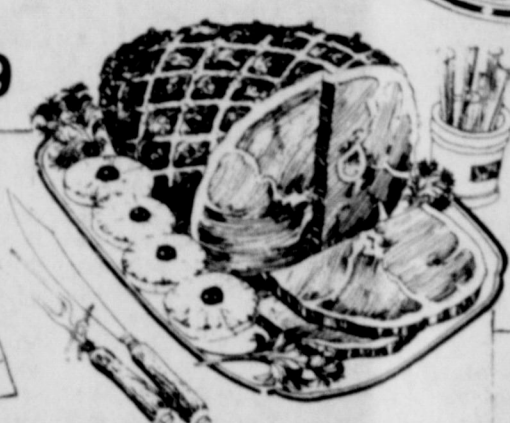
