Preceding the parade and grand entry of the rodeo, the club sponsored its annual trail ride, which was to the Seymour Rodeo this year. Some 35 riders made the 25-mile trail ride, which began at the Rhineland Gym Wednesday at 2 p.m. Knox, Baylor, and Haskell County riders were joined by several riders from the Fort Worth area, according to trail ride co-chairmen Bob Cude of Goree and Larry Thompson of Munday.

Cude and Thompson expressed appreciation on behalf of the club to Weibert Farr for the use of his corral for the overnight camp on the ride and for the work done on the right-of-way and at the overnight campsite. The chairmen also expressed thanks to trail ride cooks Tom Brooke Hudson and Bobby Roberson, both of Benjamin, for the excellent chuckwagon meal served Wednesday night and Thursday after the parade and to the women who served the meals.

A large turnout of riders and non-riders for the chuckwagon dinner and dance at the trail ride camp was reported.

## Gillispie To Head 1977 CF Campaign

"Little more than a decade ago the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was working to keep C/F youngsters alive long enough to start school. Now we are trying to help some of these same patients, who have grown to young adulthood, enter college or find jobs."

These encouraging words came from our former chairman, Rev. John Gillispie of Knox City, as he accepted the chairmanship of the 1977 Breath of Life Campaign. "Longevity has increased every year because of earlier diagnosis and progress on research and cure", said our chairman. "It is efforts such as these that we support by volunteering for and contributing to the Breath of Life Campaign." This year's campaign begins with a Door-to-Door march in September. When a C/F marcher knocks on your door, give as generously as you are able," she said. "Remember that even today, with improvements in research and care have brought, there is no cure for this inherited, genetic disease.

Among the programs of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation are support for over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the nation. "These Centers provide diagnosis, treatment and referral to children who have these lung-damaging diseases as well as those who suffer from gastrointestinal disorders related to cystic fibrosis," the campaign chairman said. "In Texas there are clinics at San Antonio, Houston and Dallas."

The Foundation also funds research to find a cure and control for cystic fibrosis, the most serious of these lung-damaging diseases, and to develop better treatments for children suffering from all lung disorders.

"The treatments that prolong the lives of children with cystic fibrosis also alleviate, and often cure, children with other lung-damaging diseases," he added.

Cystic Fibrosis, the number one genetic killer of children affects one out of every 1,500 babies born each year and occurs when a child inherits two genes for the disease, one from each parent.

"The parents don't have cystic fibrosis, but they are among the 10 million carriers of the gene in the United States," he added "that one goal of Foundation-supported research is a test to detect these carriers."

"We don't need more reasons than these to actively support the Breath of Life Campaign."



### SS REDETERMINATION

The Social Security Administration reports that each person who draws a gold-colored check under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program will be asked to have his eligibility for the check redetermination each year. The reason for this "redetermination" is to make sure the person is being paid the right amount. For the most part, this redetermination of eligibility shows that the check amount is correct, but sometimes the payment must be raised or lowered because of a change in the individual's circumstances.

If someone is asked to contact the social security office for a redetermination, it is important that the contact be made as soon as possible. Payments cannot be continued if the redetermination is not completed within a certain length of time.

Also, if a person goes into the social security office for a redetermination, it would be helpful and would save time to bring a copy of his most recent bank statement and saving's account statement.

Finally, even if no redetermination of eligibility is due, but a person receiving SSI checks has a change in circumstances such as a change in income, an increase in resources (like money in the bank) which causes the person to have over \$1,500.00 (\$2,250.00 for a couple), or a change in residence, the change should be reported immediately to the social security office.

The Social Security Administration is a branch of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The Vernon Social Security Office is at 1701 Cumberland, and the phone number is 217 552-9346.

### HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUBS OFFER 'INFO,' SKILLS, SOCIAL TIES FOR NEW RESIDENTS--AND 'OLD'

New residents in Knox County are finding that home demonstration clubs offer one good solution for meeting other community residents with similar interests--and learning at the same time.

Approximately 90 women in Knox County are members of home demonstration clubs which meet each month to learn the latest home economics information, develop leadership skills and expand social ties.

Throughout the county, community clubs design and carry out a number of projects each year-- and serve as county service clubs, sponsoring projects to benefit all residents, including 4-H and other youth.

For members, home demonstration clubs mean money saving information--with many members reporting individual savings from \$600-\$1,000 last year.

Much of the savings stemmed from information and "know how" they gained in home repairs, furniture refinishing, food preservation, homesewing or improving their family-finance plan.

Better family relationships were also reported as items that do not have a price tag.

Home demonstration club membership is open to everyone, regardless of sex, race, color or creed--and the time it takes amounts to about two or four hours a month.



# Farm and Ranch News

## CONTROL WHITE GRUBS IN LAWNS

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. The females are laying eggs and the white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Knox County will need to treat between July 15 and August 1. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to

wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

# GSPA Sides With Senate Target Prices

LUBBOCK -- Even with the threat of a Presidential veto, Grain Sorghum Producers Association directors will ask Congress to pass a farm bill with price support levels equal to a minimum of the Senate version. Grain sorghum farmers feel that unless a farm program is passed, which would give them some real price protection as they cut back on production, only a few farmers will be able to survive. With the high cost of production and a farm program geared to "fence to fence" planting, farmers throughout the U.S. are actually facing bankruptcy because of over production and low prices.

In a series of June meetings held in Abilene, Waco, Corpus Christi, and the high Plains of Texas, almost all GSPA directors agreed that the Senate's price support levels were the minimum in order to give grain sorghum producers any real relief. GSPA directors instructed their staff to continue working for the Senate's price support levels or better. They felt the target prices, as proposed by the House Agricultural Committee were far below the cost of production and would give grain farmers very little help from low




