

Emergency? Be Prepared!

A child suddenly has a convulsion, a person falls over with a heat stroke, or a stroke or heart attack strikes without warning. How many of us would know what to do, when to do, or how to do -and especially those who live any distance from a doctor or hospital. Would you panic or would you be qualified to administer the proper aid?

Due to the limited emergency medical situation in the Knox County area, the Knox County Family Living Subcommittee of Texas Agricultural Extension Service is exploring the possibility of sponsoring an Emergency Care Attendant training program for communities in Knox County later this fall.

A representative from Vernon Regional Junior College will meet with the public and committee to discuss the particulars of the training program on July 19 at 10:00 a.m. in the Assembly Room of the Knox County Courthouse at Benjamin

Gillispie To Head 1977 CF Campaign

ago the Cyctic Fibrosis Foundation was working to keep C/F youngsters alive long enough to start school. Now we are trying to help some of these same patients, who have grown to young adulthood, enter college or find jobs.

These encouraging words came from our former chairman, Rev. John Gillispie of Knox City, as he accepted the chairmanship of the 1977 Breath of Life Campaign.

'Longevity has increased every year because of earlier diagnosis and progress on research and cure", said our chairman. "It is efforts such as these that we support by volunteering for and contributing to the Breath of Life Campaign." This year's campaign begins with a Door-to-Door march in September. When a C/F marcher knocks on your door, give as generously as you are able," she said. "Remember that even today, with improvements research and care have brought, there is no cure for this inherited, genetic dis-

Among the programs of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation are support for over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the nation. "These Centers provide diagnosis, treatment and referral to children who have these lungdamaging diseases as well as those who suffer from gastrointestinal disorders related to cystic fibrosis," the campaign chairman said. "In Texas there are clinics at San Antonio, Houston and Dal-

The Foundation also funds research to find a cure and control for cystic fibrosis, the most serious of these lungdamaging diseases, and to develop better treatments for children suffering from all lung disorders.

The treatments that prolong the lives of children with cystic fibrosis also alleviate, and often cure, children with other lung-damaging diseases," he added.

Cystic Fibrosis, the number one genetic killer of children affects one out of every 1,500 babies born each year and occurs when a child inherits two genes for the disease, one from each pa-

SS REDETERMINATION

The Social Security Administration reports that each person who draws a goldcolored check under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program will be asked to have his eligibility for the check redetermination each year. The reason for this sure the person is being paid the right amount. For the most part, this redetermination of eligibility shows that the check amount is correct. but sometimes the payment must be raised or lowered because of a change in the individual's curcumstances.

If someone is asked to contact the social security office for a redetermination, it is important that the contact be made as soon as possible. Payments cannot be continued if the redetermination is not completed within a certain length of time.

Also, if a person goes into the social security office for a redetermination, it would be heipful and would save time to bring a copy of his most recent bank statment and saving's account statement.

Finally, even if no redeter mination of eligibility is due. checks has a change in circumstances such as a change in income, an increase in resources (like money in the bank) which causes the person to have over \$1,500.00 (\$2,250.00 for a couple), or a change in residentce, the change should be reported immediately to the social security office.





Farm and Ranch News

CONTROL WHITE GRUBS

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. The females are laying eggs and the white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Knox County will need to treat between July 15 and August 1. Timing of application is critical for aduquate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1.000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to




