Baird Bear's Become Champs Of District 8-AA

The Baird High School boys varsity basketball team became District 8-AA Hawley 00-00. The Bears played tough all year to earn this well deserved title. With Tuesday's win over Hawley, the Bears' record increases to 22-5 while their district record advances to 13-1. The last time Baird won district was in 1977-78

after a half-time break, Baird's team was really playing to "win". Ronnie Champions Tuesday night by defeating Casey netted another 6 points, while Rory Burks, Sid Grant, Wayne Fox and Scott Norman each added another 2 points. These scores brought Baird up to 37 points.

Man Killed In Train Mishap **East Of Baird**

The body of a 37 year old Houston man, Ted J. Thompson, was discovered by the Callahan County Sheriff's Office early Sunday morning after being spotted by a railroad crew.

Sheriff Bill Skinner reported receiving a call from the Missouri-Pacific Railroad Company Sunday morning that led to the discovery.

An investigation showed he had fallen from an east bound train and had landed on the rail causing his body to be badly dismenbered.

The body was turned over to Parker Funeral Home and his next of kin notified.

On Saturday night, Clyde Police Patrolman Waggoner received a radio message concerning car stolen from Colorado City. Officer Waggoner was observing passing traffic on I-20 when he spotted the vehicle in question.

After calling for assistance, the officer persued the vehicle, aided by the Department of Public Safety and the Callhan County Sheriff's Office. The car was finally stopped on I-20 just east of Baird.

Two juviniles, believed to be runaways from a half-way house in El Paso were taken into custody. They are now being held in the juvinile detention center in Taylor County.

In other action, the sheriff's office is investigating the burglary of the Robert Wearden home in Clyde. Taken in the burglary were six guns and one tool box, valued at \$800 Fatry was made by breaking out a window in the house. It is believed the burglar cut himself on the broken glass, due to the amount of blood found at the scene.

There are no suspects and the investigation is continuing.

Three County Towns Record Increase In Sales Tax Rebates

The city sales tax rebates for the period ending February 7 has been released by the state comptrollers office. A record \$106.4 million was returned to 954 Texas cities who levy the onepercent local tax. This represents a 16% jump over last February's check.

For the most part, Callahan County rebates reflects the increase. Only one county town showed a decrease from the same period last year.

The Texas Department of Public Safety will conduct an additional recruit training school next year to help fill state trooper vacancies, according to DPS Director Jim Adams.

"The department usually schedules two of these schools at the academy in Austin each year," Adams said. "Three schools will be necessary in 1982 to bring the DPS up to its authorized strength."

The DPS director said the agency hopes to recruit 268 new troopers during 1982.

"We are intensifying our statewide effort to attract qualified men and women who would like to serve in one of the finest law enforecment organizations in the country," Adams said. "DPS troopers are held in high esteem by their counterparts in other states."

Adams pointed out that the 67th State Legisla-

ture allocated the DPS a completes a year with the total of 20 additional Highway Patrol positions, 10 more License and Weight troopers and 20 additional narcotics investigators over the next two years.

"We offer recruits the finest training available today," Adams said. "Preparing a person to confidently face the many law enforcement responsibilities requires a lot of effort, time, support and money."

In addition to the basic traffic safety responsibilities, DPS troopers regulary provide assistance in criminal investigations and disaster-emergency situations.

Trainees live and eat in the academy during the 18-week course.

Recruits earn a starting monthly salary of \$1,233. Upon graduation the officers are paid \$1,347 monthly plus allowances for uniforms and equipment. When a trooper



Surplus Cheese To Be Distributed In County


Callahan County has contracted to distribute USDA surplus cheese to the county's needy residents.

allowing West Texas Utilities Company to increase its rates to retail customers has been approved by the Texas Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The new rates, which will average about 8.3% above the old rates, were placed in effect on Friday, February 12. This action is in accordance with

A settlement agreement a stipulated agreement Energy Regulatory Comwith all intervenors, including cities represented by the Texas Municipal League, WTU and the PUC staff.

The increase is designed to increase the Company's annual retail revenues by \$11.8 million. A wholesale rate increase of \$5.5 million, also settled by agreement and expected to be approved by the Federal mission in Washington, would bring WTU's total annual revenue increase to \$17.3 million. The Company had applied for a total increase of \$32.2 million.

The effect on a residential bill for 600 kilowatt-hours of electricity per month would be slightly over 10%. This would include the fuel cost adjustment. For 600 kilowatts at a residence, the bill would be \$37.89 under the new rates and \$34.39 under the old rates.




