



# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEXAS — A fresh task force is being organized by Gov. Price Daniel to attack the state's monetary problems.

With oil production still hovering at a historic low and a prime source of state revenue partially throttled, Texas government is, for the time being, at least, "living beyond its means."

Governor Daniel named a six-man committee of executive department officials to study ways of bridging the gap between income and outgo. Members are Sec'y of State Zollie Steakley, Treasurer Jesse James, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Auditor C. H. Cavness, Budget Officer Jess Irwin and Col. J. T. Ellis Jr. of the governor's administrative staff.

They are expected to work cooperatively with the State Tax Study Commission, a group of legislators and outside experts who have been surveying the state's fiscal position for some months.

Under the present spending pattern, it is estimated the next legislature would have to scratch up upwards of \$1,000,000,000 in new revenue to balance the books.

As in a family that comes up short at the end of the month, the state's advisors, both official and unofficial, are divided between those advocating getting more money and those favoring less spending.

Governor Daniel urged his executives to try both angles. Specifically, he suggested ex-

- ploring:
1. Every possible economy in use of state funds.
  2. Possible elimination or combination of duplicating services among state agencies.
  3. Compilation of a list of non-recurring expenses in the present appropriation.
  4. Every possible source of additional state revenues which may be available without the levy of additional taxes.

**OPEN SEASON** — Most major candidates have held their opening rallies and will be campaigning with little let-up between now and July 26 primary.

But in many areas of the state an even more intensive struggle is going on at the grass roots for control of the precinct conventions. They'll be held right after the primary, on the evening of July 26.

It's a small-time battle with big-time stakes. Whichever group of the Democratic party gets out the "mostest" to the precinct conventions will control the state convention in the fall. This means taking over the official machinery of the party for the next two years—leading up to 1960 and presidential nominating time.

Governor Daniel has said he will personally lead "conservatives, moderates and all other Texas Democrats who believe in majority decisions." He's been assured of vigorous opposition from the liberal Democrats of Texas led by Mrs. Frankie Randolph of Houston, Texas, national committeewoman.

For the average citizen the precinct convention poses a more ticklish problem than primary voting. It may mean voting, publicly, against a neighbor who's running for precinct chairman.

## 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF 4-H TO BE CELEBRATED IN JUNE

**COLLEGE STATION.** — Fifty years ago an event took place in Jack county which established the youth phase of Agriculture Extension Service work in Texas. The occasion was the organization of the first boys' corn club in the State by a county agent and resulted from the failure of an adult corn show held in 1907.

The late Tom Marks was the county agent and the remark, "You can't teach old dogs new tricks," prompted Marks to come up with the statement—"Then I'll start with the pups"—and that is exactly what happened. He enrolled 25 boys and by demonstration taught them the latest practices then known in corn production. The corn show held in Jackboro in the fall of 1908 in the caboose of a train proved Marks' point that farm youth could put into practice the better known methods of production.

This method of teaching among the rural youth of Texas is now in its 50th year and is known over the world as 4-H club work. The first of many special observances, honoring the pioneer workers, members and leaders of the early day clubs, will come during the annual 4-H Club Roundup scheduled for June 10-12 at Texas A & M College.

While the major emphasis and activities of the 1958 Roundup will be devoted to determining state winners in 22 different judging and team demonstration contests, plans are being perfected to initiate a series of observances to carry recognition and attention to the importance of 4-H club work. The theme of the Roundup and for the activities to follow in the counties will be, "Learn Today—Lead Tomorrow."

Total attendance at Roundup, Dr. C. J. Ruilmann, now commissioner of mental health for Tennessee, will become director of Texas mental hospitals in June.

**Farm and Ranch Notes**

Outworms have caused minor damage to the grain crop in scattered areas over the county, but drying weather and maturing grain has about ended this threat.

August 6 or 7 has been tentatively set as the date for a county wide meeting on cotton production, with special emphasis on defoliation and mechanical harvesting practices. Mr. Fred Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Extension Service will be on hand to conduct the discussion. Time and place will be announced later.

Soybeans, a relatively new crop in the Southwest, are rapidly becoming popular both as a cash crop and as a soil improving crop. The Soybean is of the Legume family of plants and has the ability to add nitrogen to the soil with the aid of soil bacteria.

Soybeans appear to be well adapted to the Southwestern area, and on land that is badly depleted of organic matter, will provide an excellent residue crop for conditioning the soil and adding organic matter. Planting seed are presently available locally at the Brazos Valley Gin in Knox City.

## ELECTION NOTICE AN ORDER

FOR AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE CONFIRMATION OF NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF WATER ENGINEERS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

1. In accordance with House Bill No. 494 passed by the 55th Legislature of the State of Texas, Regular Session, separate elections shall be held in the cities of Seymour, Knox City, Munday, Goree, Haskell, Rule and Rochester, on the 17th day of June, 1958, at which elections the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Whether or not the establishment of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority by House Bill 494 passed at the Fifty-Fifth Legislature shall be confirmed to include each city in which the majority vote favors confirmation."

2. The form of ballot for said elections shall be substantially as follows:

### OFFICIAL BALLOT

FOR CONFIRMATION OF NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY

AGAINST CONFIRMATION OF NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY

3. Each voter shall draw a line through one of the expressions on the ballot, thus leaving the other expression as his vote.

4. Only qualified voters who reside in North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority as established by said House Bill 494 shall be qualified to vote at said elections. Each voter shall vote in the city in which he resides.

5. Said election shall be held at the following places and the following persons are appointed presiding judges at said places:

City: Seymour; Place, County Treasurer's Office, Courthouse; Presiding Judge, T. C. Lankford.  
City: Knox City; Place, American Legion Hall; Presiding Judge, P. C. Lowrey.  
City: Munday; Place, City Hall; Presiding Judge, H. P. Hill.  
City: Goree; Place, City Hall; Presiding Judge, T. D. Harlan.  
City: Haskell; Place, City Hall; Presiding Judge, Virgil Brown.

City: Rule; Place, City Hall; Presiding Judge, R. O. Carothers.  
City: Rochester; Place, City Hall; Presiding Judge, Rev. Davis Edens.

6. Each of the presiding judges thus appointed shall appoint at least one judge and two clerks to assist him in holding the election.

7. A copy of this order with the heading 'ELECTION NOTICE' shall constitute a sufficient notice of said election. Said notice shall be published in the following newspapers:

"The Baylor County Banner"—Seymour, Texas.  
"The Knox County Herald"—Knox City, Texas.  
"The Munday Times" Munday, Texas.  
"The Haskell Free Press", Haskell, Texas.  
"The Rule Review", Rule Texas.  
"The Rochester Reporter", Rochester, Texas.

It is found that no newspaper is published within the City of Goree, Knox County, Texas, but that 'The Baylor County Banner', is published in Seymour, Baylor County, Texas, and has a general circulation in Goree, Texas, and that publication of the notice in said newspaper will give sufficient notice to the voters in Goree. Publication shall be had in each of said newspapers on the same day of each of two consecutive weeks, the first of which shall be published at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date herein set for said elections.

8. Immediately after said elections have been held, the officers holding the same, shall make return of the result thereof to this Board.

9. The manner of holding said elections shall be governed by the General Election Laws of this State except as otherwise provided in the act creating this authority.

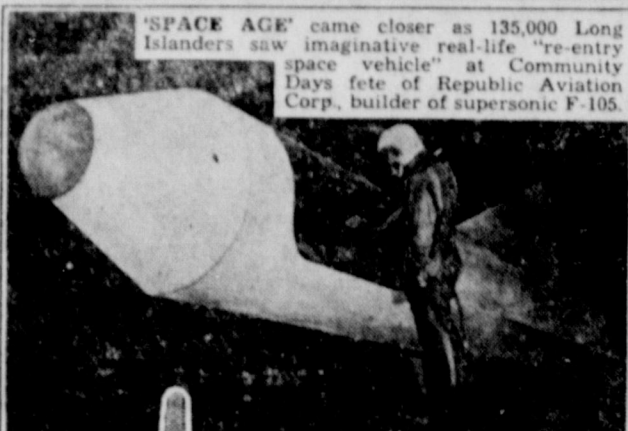

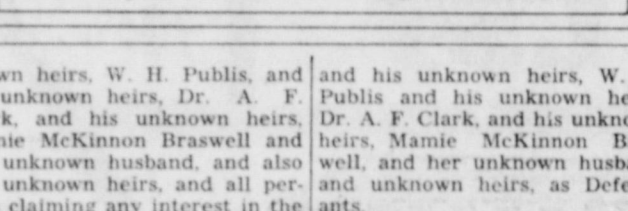

TO PEOPLE OF THIS AREA:

We have had continuous complaints for three years about the way oil companies have disposed of salt water. The Farm Bureau has contacted the Railroad Commission twice in the past three weeks about the unlawful practices being used to dispose of salt water. We have the information that pumping salt water into open pits comes under the Railroad Commission and is unlawful. The Commission does not have sufficient funds, according to our information, to hire an enforcing officer so it is up to local people to see that this is enforced.

Dumping it in barrow ditches, ravines and roads comes under the Fish and Wildlife Commission, and any officer can make the arrest and file charges against the violator, including the sheriff, highway patrolman, game warden, or constable. The penalty for first offense is \$100, and \$200 for second offense.

Anyone seeing or knowing of such practices should notify their local officer. Maybe we can get something done about correcting this unlawful abuse.

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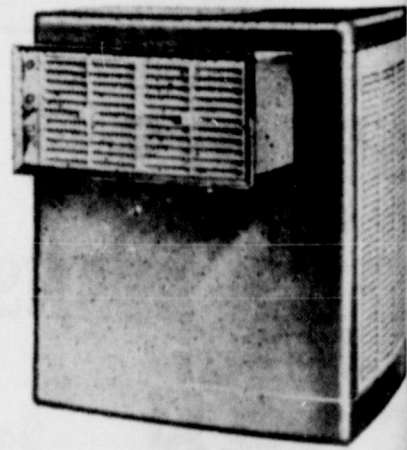

**'Separated' Wives May Be Missing Social Security**

Some aged wives and widows who are separated but not divorced from their husbands could be receiving monthly social security benefits on the basis of their husband's work if they would come in and file application, Erton F. Tate, district social security manager, said today.

A 1957 change in the law did away with the requirement that a wife must be living with, or supported by her husband when she files application, and that a widow must have been living with, or supported by her husband at the time of his death. Now, a 62 year old wife or widow may be eligible for a monthly benefit merely on the basis of a legal marriage that is still in existence—even though they may have been separated for many years and are at opposite end of the country. There has been no change in the law with respect to the provision that a wife can receive monthly benefits only if her husband is also receiving his benefit.

"Aged wives and widows who believe they can qualify for benefits as a result of this change in the law should contact us promptly to determine what their rights are, Tate concluded.

**EXPANDED FHA PROGRAM TO IMPROVE FARM HOMES**

More farm construction—with better homes for farm families, better shelter for livestock and improved storage facilities for machinery and grain. That's the prospect in coming years says Wilburn A. Satterwhite, County Supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration.

Recently, as an anti-recession measure, his agency expanded its farm housing loan program to the fullest extent possible under existing laws set up by Congress. And Satterwhite reports that he already has received several inquiries from interested people in the area. To be eligible now, an applicant must own a farm that is in agricultural production and must plan to produce at least \$400 worth of commodities for sale and home use, based on 1944 prices. Many part-time farmers who previously were ineligible can qualify for loans under the expanded program.

Burcuss E. Smith, Cleveland C. Hutchinson, and Earl A. Burgess, FHA committeemen in Knox County review and act on all applications. The construction work can start after the loan is closed. The loan bears 4 percent interest on the unpaid balance and may be repaid over a period up to 33 years.

In addition to financing major construction, the loan funds can help a farm owner repair and up-date buildings. For example, he may wish to add a bathroom including a waste disposal system, modernize the kitchen, add an extra bedroom, improve the heating, insulation and electric wiring, put a basement under the house, and cement floors in service buildings, or paint the house and service buildings.

Satterwhite reports that the agency has \$400 million available nationally which can be used over the next three years for farm housing loans. He said there is no specified limitation on the amount which can be loaned in any one state or community. Satterwhite said that Walter T. McKay, State Direct-

or, for Texas estimated that if present farm housing loan activity continues as it has in the past two months, that more than \$2,000,000 will be channeled into this state by the end of the calendar year 1958. Practically all of the money will be spent locally to purchase supplies at lumber yards and business places, and to hire skilled labor.
