APPROVE NEW AGREEMENTS

The Board of Supervisors of the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District met Friday, September 28, at Knox City. Twenty-seven Initial Conservation Agreements were approved by the board.

The board also purchased two 3-row legume seeders to plant soil improving crops in cotton. These seeders plant two rows of soil improving crops in each middle of the cotton. They are designed to push the cotton stalks back so that the cotton is not damaged. If a tractor can go through the cotton without damaging the crop, so can this seeder.

The seeders are in operation now, and it is expected that they will be kept busy until the cotton harvest is over.

One of the seeders has fertilizer boxes on it to apply phosphate at the same time it plants the cover crop, and the other one will probably be equipped with these attachments in the near future.

The supervisors made arrangements for the FFA chapters in Rochester, Knox City and Munday will handle the drills. Farmers wanting to rent the drills may contact Kenneth Roberts at Rochester, Earl Pon-

der at Munday or L. E. Groves at Knox City.

Cover crops used in a rotation and with other practices have paid off for the farmer in years past, the supervisors believe, and are especially paying off this year. Farmers report that their cotton will make a third to nearly twice as much cotton following good conservation practices.

LLOYD GREGORY TO HEAD TEXAS MARCH OF DIMES

AUSTIN. — Lloyd Gregory of Houston, prominent sports writer and news man, has been appointed Texas State Chairman for the 1952 March of Dimes. Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infan-



te Paralysis, announced this week.

A partner in the advertising firm of Gregory-Glezendanner Co., the Texas March of Dimes chairman will serve voluntarily in coordinating the work of campaign directors in cities and counties throughout the Lone Star State. He takes the place of Ed Stewart, prominent Abilene business man, who has directed three statewide March of Dimes campaigns.

Gregory was born at Beeville, graduated from the University of Texas where he taught journalism, and for two years headed the Associated Press Bureau in Austin. During World War I he was a member of the Marine Corps. It was through Gregory's influence and leadership that the battleship Texas was permanently berthed at the San Jacinto Battlegrounds.

In announcing the appointment, O'Connor said that Mr. Gregory was assuming his post at one of the most critical moments in the National Foundation's history. "The March of Dimes," he declared, "has not kept pace with the march of polio."

"During the last three years

that polio has been on the upsurge," O'Connor said. "The National Foundation has ended each year in debt. That is why we must launch the 1952 March of Dimes on January 2 instead of January 15, doubling

the usual two-week period. "The costs of patient care are still tremendously high, and many a boy and girl will require hospitalization for a long period of time. I know that Mr. Gregory will provide the kind
