These are IBM cards which indicate the amount of purchase and the cost of the coupons These cards also give the buyer the choice of purchasing his allotment in full, or 3/4, 1/2, or 1/4. And third, the customer must have the correct cash for the transaction. No checks will be accepted under any circumstances.

Books of coupons come in four denominations' \$2.00 Book -50c coupons); \$3.00 Book - (6-50c coupons); \$10.00 Book, (5-\$2.00 coupons; and \$30.00 Book,



In 1953 he moved to Odessa, returning to Breckenridge after retiring in 1969. He was a member of the First Baptist Church and Breckenridge Bass Club.


