Cotton Grades Slightly Lower After Rains

Grade of cotton was damaged somewhat, but local ginner believe if farmers would avoid pulling in the early morning, when the cotton is wet, damage would amount to less than \$5 a bale.

Cotton ginned so far this season by Knox City and O'Brien gins was reported this morning as follows: Brazos Valley Gin 1,375; Paymaster Gin 926; Cotton Growers Co-op 993; O'Brien Co-op Gins 7,460.

Rev. Joseph Wesley Vann, 31, former pastor of the Knox City Catholic Church, was injured fatally Thursday morning of last week in an auto collision near Plano.

Father Vann was chaplain of the Veterans Hospital and St. Michael's Church at McKinney. He resided at the rectory of the Sacred Heart Cathedral, Dallas.

The young priest's car bounced off a truck and collided head-on with an automobile, the occupants of which were seriously injured.

Father Vann was involved in another accident in December of 1947. His car struck a 64 year old man on a Ft. Worth street, and the injured man died enroute to a hospital.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Dorothy Vann of Evansville, Ind., and a sister, Mrs. Charles Cole of Dallas.

Former Knox City Barber Forms Own Record Company

Johnny Cox, former Knox City barber whose ambition to become an entertainer led to the founding of his own record company, has attained encouraging success in his venture, according to a recent story in a Lubbock newspaper.

Johnny, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Cox of Old Glory, formerly owned and operated City Barber Shop here.

About four months ago he organized the Plains Recording Co. which released its first record August 21. The infant company recorded its first songs July 20. Twelve-year-old Hope Griffith of Idalou was the vocalist, accompanied by the Texas Hotshots.

The record was submitted to the first disc jockey on August 15, and was placed on sale Aug. 21. It has been distributed in the South Plains area, the Panhandle, El Paso and Eastern New Mexico sections. The tune attained instant popularity and was number 10 on the All Request Hit Parade on Radio Station KSEL during the last week of August.

Cox has plans for several more records in the near future, including another by Hope Griffith. He has big plans for his company. He readily admits the recordings now lack perfection, but he feels that time and work can correct imperfections. And if record fans response matches the enthusiasm of the young West Texan, success of his venture is assured.

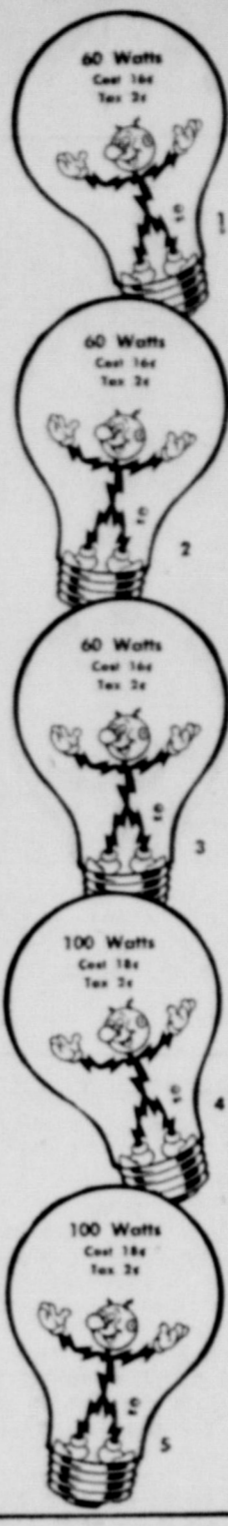

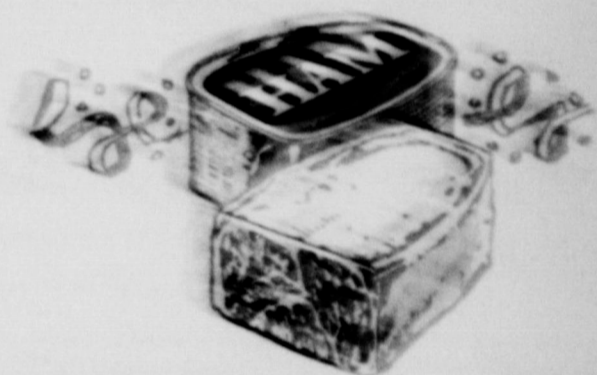

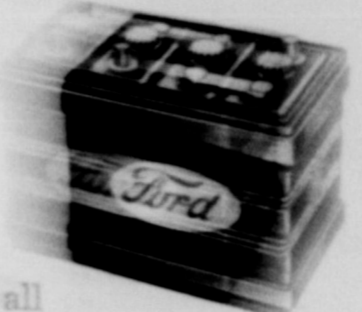
