

City Council Has Varied Agenda At Meet

The Knox City Council in a regular meeting session on Monday night, June 5 saw a varied agenda with discussions and action running all the way from a routine visit by a service company representative to outdoor toilets in one particular neighborhood.

On the first item before the council A. G. Parker of General Telephone Co. was here to meet city councilmen and to discuss any service problems which may exist or come up. No action necessary on council's part.

A local woman came to the meeting to discuss sanitation problems existing from outdoor toilets in her neighborhood. The council advised that it would ask for an investigation from a health officer.

Three local men presented a discussion on the city's possibility of furnishing a location for a Little League Ball Park. Minutes noted that no action was taken at this time.

Another local citizen appeared in regard to setting speed limits in front of his residence in a specified area on the O'Brien highway.

The council authorized City Manager Charles Lankford to make an attempt to sell a city sprayer, not now in use, for a minimum of \$400.

Other matters were routine. Members of the council present included Mayor Buddy Angle and Councilmen Sammy White, Carl Shelton and Clyde Voss.

Rev. Ken Moore Injured Friday

According to reports, he suffered scalp wounds, requiring 60 stitches and a mild concussion. He was taken to the Graham Hospital in Cisco where his condition was described as good Saturday. He was brought to the Knox Co. Hospital on Monday, and hospital attendants said he was progressing nicely.

Rev. Moore was with a group visiting at Lake Cisco Park and they had gone swimming. He was reportedly in the operating room for more than an hour while a scalp wound was being treated.

Jack Land, City Water Superintendent this week reminds citizens to take precautions against disease carrying mosquitos.

Land reminds that with recent rains here there is likely to be stagnant water and stagnant water is a favored breeding place for mosquitos.

"Turn over any receptacle, cans jars and such that may be holding water," said Land.

He also suggests that evaporative water coolers left untreated may also be a breeding place for the mosquito. A little pine oil poured into the water trays will keep the mosquito away.

Lions Annual Banquet To Take Place Tonight At School Cafeteria

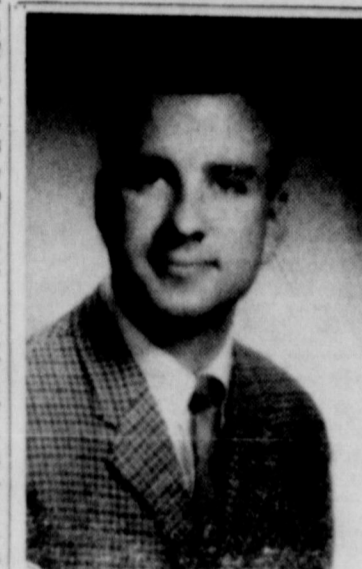
The annual ladies night and installation banquet for the Knox City Lions will be held Thursday, June 15 (tonight) at the school cafeteria at 8 p. m.

FM Road Project Slated For Knox

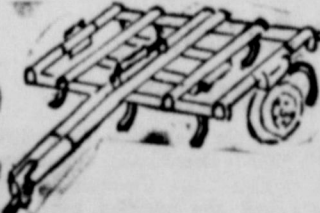
District Engineer V. J. McGee of the Texas Highway Dept. said Friday that a total of \$550,000 will be spent on a project extending from the end of FM 2570, 6.1 miles east of States 283, north and east of FM 267 at Rhineland. The project is 4.5 miles long.

In Ford County \$120,000 will be spent on a project that extends from State 283, 5.0 miles north of U.S. 70, east to FM 98 at Margaret. The distance is 4.8 miles.

Other projects are in Cottle, Hall, Hardeman, and Wheeler Counties.

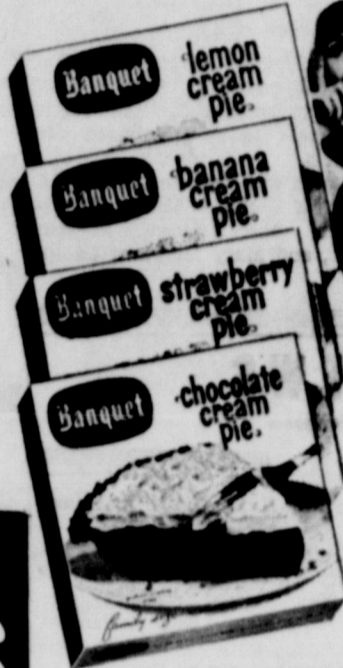

Changes Now Being Made In Diverted Acreage Rules Announced

R. T. Price, State Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced that rules covering the designation of diverted acres have been made, he has been informed by the ASCS in Washington.

Because of bad weather some producers have planted and replanted cotton and feed grains without getting a satisfactory stand. The failure of the crop is due to abnormal weather conditions.

Apparently, some growers have used chemicals for weed control that have left a residue which makes it impractical to devote the land to other crops such as soybeans for harvest this year. Because of this problem some producers now want to designate as diverted acreage the land planted to cotton or feed grains which have failed. This would then permit the land initially intended as diverted acreage which is free of chemical residue to be used for production of other crops.

The procedure is being changed to provide that land on which cotton or feed grains were planted but failed and which is classified as cotton or feed grain land for purposes of price-support payments may be designated as diverted acreage.

This will be subject to county of the producer and a finding that the chemical residue prevents the committee approval at the request use of the land for another crop this year, Mr. Price said.

If Its Only One-Tenth Of An Acre Plant It, Says Charles Stenholm

"With drouth conditions prevailing over much of the Rolling Plains and cotton planting time fast getting away from us, all decisions on whether to dry plant or not to plant at all should be based on a thorough understanding of the rules that govern each particular situation," said Charles Stenholm, executive vice president of Rolling Plains Cotton Growers. "Every Rolling Plains farmer should check with his local county ASCS office to be certain that he is meeting all requirements and has all the necessary information.

"There is one particular requirement especially important to farms with proven yields" continued Stenholm, all farms with proven yields and or who intend to have proven yields in the future should pay particular attention to the rule that says you must have production in each of the preceding 3 base period years in order to qualify for a proven yield for your farm. If you do not have any production in 1967, you will lose your proven yield in '69, '70 and 1971. Even if it is too dry to plant your cotton, it will pay you to plant.

1 (one-tenth) of an acre or more

in a workmanlike manner and irrigate it in any manner that you can in order to secure some production (one-tenth pound or more) in 1967. As ridiculous as this may sound, this one act may put hundreds of dollars into a lot of farmers' pockets in future years" continued Stenholm. So even if it is too dry to plant like you want to, figure out some way to make a little cotton somehow. Then when 1969 rolls around and you are not satisfied with your county yield, you can bring in your production records and secure a proven yield based on what you have actually made.

Individual county situations are sometimes different so every farmer should check with his local ASCS office for complete requirements.

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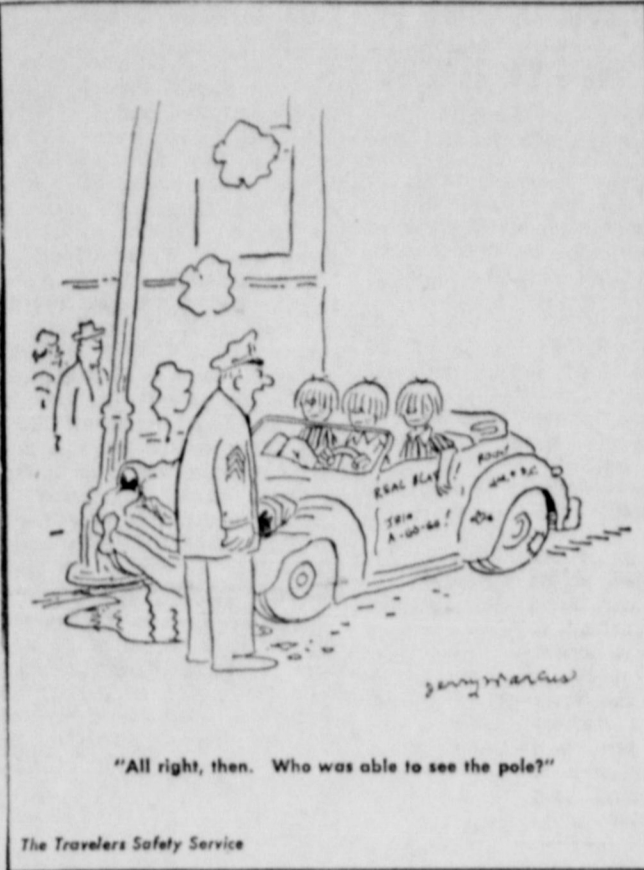
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Rehearsal Dinner For Waldrip And Welch
