FM Road Project Slated For Knox

District Engineer V. J. McGee of the Texas Highway Dept. said Friday that a total of \$550,000 will be spent on 24.5 miles of construction in the Farm to Market road program in District 25, which

Of interest in this area is the proposed work for Knox and Foard Counties. Both projects are for grading, structures, and surfacing. In Knox County, \$90,000 will be spent on a project extending from the end of FM 2570, 6.1 miles east of States 283, north and east of FM 267 at Rhineland.

The project is 4.5 miles long. In Ford County \$120,000 will be spent on a project that extends from State 283, 5.0 miles north of U.S. 70, east to FM 98 at Margaret. The distance is 4.8

Other projects are in Cottle, Hall, Hardeman, and Wheeler Counties.
