Students to Register Friday; Classes Will Begin Monday

Knox City boys and girls will register tomorrow (Friday) and troop back to school Monday morning to begin another nine months of "learning."

All elementary students will report to the school at 9:00 o'clock tomorrow morning. Following their registration and assignment by teachers they will be dismissed at 11 a. m. School buses will make their routes in the early morning and again at 11:30, returning the students home.

High school freshmen will register from 9 until 10:30; sophomores from 10:30 to 12 noon; juniors from 1 p. m. to 2:30 and seniors from 2:30 to 3:30.

Birth Records Necessary

Supt. Chas. E. Silk reminded parents that all beginning students must have birth certificates showing they were six years of age on or before Sept. 1. "We are terribly sorry we cannot admit children who will be of school age a few days after Sept. 1," Mr. Silk said. "Regulations of the Texas Education Agency and a definite policy of the local school board requires that each child be six years old on or before Sept. 1, and we can make no exceptions to that rule." Birth certificates will be returned to the parents.

County Included in Roughage Program

Walter T. McKay, state director of the Farmers Home Administration, has advised Wilburn A. Satterwhite, F.H.A. county supervisor, of the designation of Knox County under the Hay and Roughage Program for Texas.

Applications to participate in the Hay and Roughage program will be received by the county F.H.A. committee, John H. Atterbury, B. E. Smith and Earl A. Burgess, at the ASC office in Knox City immediately.

The Hay and Roughage program was worked out between the governor and the secretary of agriculture to provide emergency assistance to farmers and ranchers in the State's designated disaster counties. Under the program the local county F.H.A. committee will determine each applicant's eligibility and will issue a certificate good for \$7.50 per ton on roughage actually purchased. The applicant will then apply the certificate on the purchase of roughage from any dealer he chooses. The dealer endorses the certificate and draws a draft on the Emergency Drought Committee's account.

Applications may be filed until December 3, 1956, for a supply of roughage needed to last through December 31, 1956. Roughage under the program includes hay either baled or loose, cotton seed hulls, peanut hulls, corncobs, sorghum bundles or ensilage.

Yarborough Carries County; Eubank New Commissioner

Ralph W. Yarborough carried nine of Knox County's 12 voting boxes Saturday to lead Price Daniel by 150 votes in the governor's race.

Only 1,607 Knox County voters turned out for the second Democratic primary, compared to about

2,050 in the first primary July 28. The light vote was attributed to the fact that there were no run-off races for district, county or precinct offices except in Precinct 3.

In that precinct, former county judge J. B. Eubank Jr. defeated long-time county commissioner C.

A. Bullion, who was seeking reelection. The race brought out a heavy vote in Gilliland and Truscott with Eubank receiving 162 to Bullion's 145. The two men tied with 112 votes each in the first primary, while a third candidate received 72.

Over the state as a whole Daniel is the apparent winner in the governor's race, with 698,125 votes to Yarborough's 694,578. However, Yarborough has not conceded and says he will contest the vote in several counties. The official canvass of the vote by the State Democratic Committee may also change the totals.

In Knox County, Daniel carried only Truscott, South Munday and Rhineland. In most instances precincts carried by W. Lee O'Daniel in the first primary went to Yarborough in the run-off.

In the race for attorney general Will Wilson received 874 votes to 598 for his opponent, Tom Moore. Wilson, who was also winner over the state, carried all Knox County boxes except North Knox City, where the vote was tied at 70-70, and Brock.

Car Leaves Highway; Stops in Plowed Field

Mr. and Mrs. W. V. Bell narrowly escaped serious injury late Sunday when Bell lost control of his late-model De-Soto on the outskirts of De-Soto.

The car left the pavement and went through a fence into a field, broke the guy cable on a utility pole, crossed a side road and came to a stop in a plowed field, about 320 feet from where it left the pavement.

Mrs. Bell suffered a broken foot and was hospitalized several days. She is now recuperating at the home of relatives in Brownwood.

The Bells are from Brownwood but have lived in Knox City several months. He is employed on a road construction job west of town.

Emergency Grain Program Extended

The Emergency Feed Grain program in Knox County has been extended, it was announced this week by officials of the Farmers Home Administration.

The F.H.A. county committee, John H. Atterbury, B. E. Smith and Earl A. Burgess, may now take applications from farmers and ranchers through Oct. 1 to provide feed for basic livestock herds through October 31, 1956. The previous deadline for applications was August 31.

Applications for Emergency Feed Grain may be made at the ASC office in Knox City.

The Emergency Feed Grain program is now authorized in 184 counties in Texas, according to Walter L. McKay, state F.H.A. director.

Walton Dunlap Fatally Shot At Marine Base

Marine Pvt. Walton N. Dunlap, 21, was fatally shot in his barracks at Camp Pendleton, Calif., Monday. Investigating officers have not notified the family of the full circumstances of the self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Shallow Test Near Town Looms as Tannehill Strike

Hopes for shallow oil production in the Knox City area were boosted this week by tests at the R. Clay Underwood No. 1 Myrtle White, a mile northwest of Knox City.

Operators recovered a substantial amount of free oil in a drillstem test of the Tannehill sand. The hole was bottomed at 2313 feet and pipe was set at that depth. The plug was drilled Wednesday and the pay zone was perforated, and attempts at completion were to be made this morning. The Herald had no report of this morning's results at press time.

Elementary School Gets New Furniture

New furniture for the elementary rooms of the Knox City school arrived last week, and the old type desks were removed and discarded.

Pupils in grades four through eight will have new Crusader plastic top chair-desks, and teachers have new matching desks and chairs.

The first three grades have new plastic top round 48" reading tables with matching chairs. Each teacher in the first three grades has a new filing cabinet to organize and file her teaching materials. In the past, teachers have had no place in the room to keep materials, and have had to carry them back and forth from home to school.

Bookcases have been reworked throughout the elementary school. They are in 4x8 foot sections, uniform in size, to fit under the windows. The cases were made from the old ones, plus some new materials, and painted to blend with the colors of the rooms or varnished to match new furniture.

McGee Ward School also has new reading tables and chairs for primary grades and new desks for students and teachers, new book shelves and new textbooks and filing cabinets.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to read: "The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed by the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be equal to the percentage amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State and/or school districts, and shall in no year exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for any such person; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of money paid into the fund."

"The Legislature may authorize all moneys coming into such fund to be invested in bonds or other securities of the State, or in any other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement funds shall not be eligible for any other State pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other State pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; provided, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas as adopted November 1934, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

Each voter shall indicate his vote by marking his ballot with the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and shall be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall cause to be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 48-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to read: "The total amount of bonds or obligations of the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000); provided for the issuance of said bonds or obligations on the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; provided for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 48-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 48-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint two members to serve for a term of four years, with the initial appointments to the Board under this section to be for terms of two and four years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. One such appointive member shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and the other such appointive member shall be well versed in finance. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of the Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as may be now or hereafter provided by law. The compensation for said appointive members shall be as fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as may be prescribed by the Legislature. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a Fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be secured by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as are now provided by law or as may hereafter be provided by law; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrator of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds, such bonds to be issued as needed in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in the State, owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation. Provided, however, that the portion of the Veterans' Land Fund not immediately available for the purchase of lands may be invested in short term United States bonds or obligations until such funds are needed for the purchase of lands. The interest accruing thereon shall become a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable and be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas or cases of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative Act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and on such conditions as may be now or hereafter provided by law, or as may be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received under the Constitutional Amendment as adopted by the people of Texas at the election held on November 12, 1951, and which have not been used for the purchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II, and in Texas veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative Act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sale of the bonds provided herein, for a period ending December 1, 1955; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest thereon, or to pay such moneys as are due on such bonds, shall be set aside for the retirement of said additional bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not be held until the maturity date of the last maturing bond be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

"This amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1957."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 48-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 48-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and shall be effective from the date set forth in said amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Facts On Wheat Situation Listed

COLLEGE STATION. — Wheat producers in Texas must soon make a decision on whether or not they will reduce their allotments further under the Soil Bank program. Weather conditions, especially from the moisture standpoint, haven't been too favorable for the past several years for most Texas producers, and this, according to John G. McHaney, extension economist, could be a big factor in the final decision.

But regardless of the weather, wheat surpluses continue to build up and stocks of wheat in the nation were estimated at 1,300,000,000 bushels on last July 1. McHaney points out that wheat carryovers have increased from 307 million bushels in 1949 to more than a billion bushels on July 1, 1956 . . . an increase of 236 percent.

The nation's first billion-bushel wheat crop was produced in 1915-16 and the next one didn't come until 1944-45 but for the next nine years, except 1951-52, the annual harvest exceeded the one billion bushel mark. Since the 1953-54 season, production has declined but continued to exceed 900 million bushels annually.

Since 1951 harvested acreage has declined 23 percent in the nation but production by only 4 percent. In Texas, during the same period, harvested acreage has dropped 25 percent with a similar drop in production. Drouth has been the big factor here. Texas normally produces only 7 percent of the nation's wheat crop and hence has only a slight effect upon the total production of the nation.

Production per acre in the nation has climbed steadily and coupled with falling exports, surpluses have climbed. Foreign wheat production is on the increase and this has cut exports, McHaney says. The decline in domestic per capita consumption has about offset the increase in population, therefore total consumption has remained fairly stable.

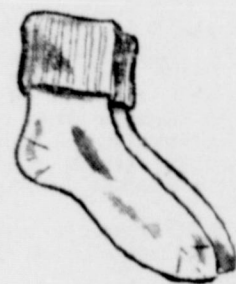

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be Voted on at an Election to be Held on Nov. 6, 1935

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows:
"Section 51-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1935, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Texas Farmers are Heavy Participants in Oil Bank Program

Texas farmers will receive more than 23.8 million dollars as payments for land placed in the oil bank acreage reserve program. Bob Cherry, Texas Extension Service economist, says a total of 63,672 agreements were signed in Texas before the July 27 deadline.

Under the acreage reserve program, farmers are paid for each acre of land retired from the production of basic crops up to a specified percentage of their allotments. The program is designed to aid soil improvement and reduce surplus production.

Farmers of the nation have signed agreements covering approximately 10.7 million acres while the 63,672 agreements signed in Texas cover 1,970,235 acres. Texas participation was considerably heavier because of the drought than it would have been in a normal year.

A total of 14,708 wheat agreements covering 1,066,390 acres and with payments expected to reach \$6,193,574 have been signed in Texas. Texas cotton farmers signed 49,322 agreements, put 865,654 acres of cotton allotments into the acreage reserve and if they comply with all program requirements, can expect to receive \$17,020,420 in government payments. Peanut producers of the state signed 3,195 agreements covering 33,905 acres for which they will receive \$396,415. Only 74 acreage reserve agreements were signed by rice growers in Texas on 4,286 acres on which they will receive \$219,487. A single tobacco grower reduced his allotment by three-tenths of an acre and will receive \$102.

The economist said the largest number of acres put under acreage reserve agreements was in the Panhandle district and the districts immediately to the south and east of the Panhandle. Extension district 8 in central Texas and district 10, in south central, were other areas of heavy sign-up.

SECTION 13-a. NO PERSON SHALL BE COMMITTED AS A PERSON OF UNSOUND MIND EXCEPT ON COMPETENT MEDICAL OR PSYCHIATRIC TESTIMONY. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney at law appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury.

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney at law."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney at law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said classes on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. SEC. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not incur any outstanding bonds or other obligations providing for the necessary election and form of ballot, and providing for the necessary proclamations and publications.

SECTION 1. That Section 9, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes, provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court proposes to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the fund for constitutional purposes, namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the total of the foregoing tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year, and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected

PROGRESS REPORTED BY FHA FOR PAST FISCAL YEAR

Farmers and ranchers in Texas obtained loans totaling \$51,416,000 through the Farmers Home Administration during the year ending June 30. Walter T. McKay, the agency's state director, announced last week. A total of 18,348 families were served by the agency during this period.
 164 families in Baylor, Knox and Throckmorton counties obtained loans totaling \$363,430. Wilburn A. Satterwhite, FHA county supervisor at Seymour, reports.
 Credit was advanced to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, equipment, livestock and other farm operating items needed to place farms on an efficient operating basis and to buy and improve family-type farms. Funds were advanced also for soil and water conservation purposes and to meet emergency needs.
 County Farmers Home Administration committeemen must approve each loan application before funds can be advanced. The committee determines all loan applicants' eligibility and certifies the value of farms to be purchased or improved. It also makes recommendations on loan approvals and servicing actions. B. E. Smith, J. H. Atterbury and Earl A. Burgess are Knox County committeemen.

Applicants are approved as eligible only if other lenders cannot adequately supply their credit needs and only if prospects are favorable for their being able to improve their farming and repay their loans. Families are expected to refinance their loans with other lenders as soon as they are in a position to do so.
