## KC Student Named National Semifinalist

Smith, president of National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). "The approximately 15,000 Semifinalists of the nation's most academically talented young people, and they bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers, and communities."

"From this group will come many future leaders in business, industry, and the professions," he said. "The future success of these young people will, however, depend upon their ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels that they are capable of attaining."

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in each state on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) administered last October to over one million students in about 17,000 schools nationwide. These students, who constitute about one-half of one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States, will complete high school and enter college in 1974.

NMSC identifies the Semifinalists to all regionally accredited U.S. colleges and universities. Many Semifinalists find this recognition useful in seeking financial aid from sources other than the Merit Program and in the process of gaining admission to college.

This is the first time a KC student has qualified for this honor since Patrick Shannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fuller Shannon, was recognized for his outstanding performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in 1965. Patrick, a 1966 honor graduate of Knox City High School, holds a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Texas in 1970, where he also graduated with honors. Patrick received a doctor of jurisprudence degree May 26 of this year from the University of Texas Law School and is now employed in San Francisco, California.

Since the tests were first given in Knox City High School, others receiving the honor have been Melanie Verhalen Whitely, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M.L. Verhalen, who was the first in 1961 and James Hopkins in 1963.

Melanie is now employed by the Knox City Schools and the last word on Hopkins was that he was residing in Fort Worth.

The O'Brien Bulldogs hosted the Patton Springs Rangers last Friday and defeated the visitors 64-12. Rayland Hayes opened scoring with a 5 yard plunge. The Bulldogs tacked on eight more points as Louis Conn scampered 17 yards and Hayes booted the P.A.T. The score was boosted to 28-0 as Louis Conn found Eulalio Garcia open on two different occasions for 20 and 23 yard scoring pass plays. Hayes again made good one of the P.A.T.s. Before the first quarter gun sounded O'Brien scored twice as Louis Conn rambled 16 yards and Sammy Jackson 6 yards with Hayes picking up the P.A.T. on both occasions. Patton Springs also

found paydirt as Willie Ray carried 40 yards for the Rangers to bring the first quarter score to 44 for the Bulldogs and 6 for the Rangers.

In the second quarter Patton Springs picked up 6 more points on an interception by Willie Ray who returned the ball 71 yards to bring the score 44-12. Sammy Jackson then scampered 13 yards for a Bulldog touchdown and Rayland Hayes booted the P.A.T. to raise the score to 52-12. Hayes then picked up 15 yard field goal to make it 56-12. 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## Some Subscriptions To Increase Oct. 15

Many have taken advantage of the advance notice on the increase in subscription rates, either coming by the News office or mailing in their renewals.

Current rates will be honored through Monday, October 15. After that date, local rates, including those within a 50-mile radius, will be \$4.50 (no tax) per year, elsewhere in Texas will be \$6.30 including tax, and out-of-state subscriptions will be \$6.50 and are not subject to state tax.

## Highway Construction Is Planned for Area

A project in Knox County is included in a \$40.7 million program to increase safety and improve section of non-Interstate highways in Texas.

District Engineer V.J. McGee of District 25, Childress, said work to be performed under the annual program includes such things as widening of pave-

ments and structures, reconditioning, resurfacing, providing additional surfacing, sodding and improvement of shoulders, and other miscellaneous work.

Statewide, the 1974 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Improvement Program includes work on 5,095.2 miles of U.S. and State-numbered highways and Farm to Market roads. The program includes 810 individual projects in 209 counties of the State.

Fifty-seven per cent of the work statewide will be on U.S. and State-numbered highways, and 41 per cent on Farm to Market roads with two per cent reserved for later assignment.

Projects in Knox County included in this program provide for the relocation of F.M. 143, extending from State Highway 283 at its intersection with State Highway 222, West and Northwest a distance of 0.4 miles, to a point on F.M. 143 in Knox City, at an estimated cost of \$80,000.00.

Upon completion of this segment of F.M. 143, F.M. Road 143 will be re-numbered as State Highway 222 to its junction with U.S. 82, West of Guthrie, in King County.

Work on this project will be under the supervision of Alvin D. Alexander, Assoc. Resident Engineer, Munday, Texas.



Semifinalists must qualify as Finalists to advance in the competition for Merit Scholarships. To become Finalists, the Semifinalists must fulfill requirements that include receiving the endorsement of their schools, confirming their high PSAT/NMSQT scores on a second examination, and by providing evidence of their academic and other accomplishments. Ninety percent or more of the Semifinalists are expected to become Finalists, and each Finalist will receive a Certificate of Merit in recognition of distinguished performance in the competition. Every Finalist will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1000 Scholarships that are allocated on a state basis, according to each state's percentage of the total U.S. high school graduating class. A selection committee made up of experienced college admissions officers and secondary school guidance counselors judges all information about each Finalist in combination--his high school academic record, accomplishments, leadership qualities, extracurricular activities, as well as test scores. The winners of these one-time awards of \$1000 that are financed by sponsors and NMSC will receive a single payment next fall, after they enroll as full-time college undergraduates.

Many of the Finalists will also be considered for renewable four-year Merit Scholarships supported by some 450 corporations, foundations, professional associations, colleges, unions, trusts, and individuals. Winners of renewable Merit Scholarships receive up to \$1,500 per year which can amount to \$6,000 over the four college years. NMSC will release the names of the Merit Scholarship winners in 1974 through the news media in three public announcements: winners of standard four-year Merit Scholarships financed primarily by corporations and businesses will be announced on April 11; the winners of one-time National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships will be named on April 25; and the announcement of college-sponsored four-year Merit Scholarship winners will occur on May 2.

## Large Walnuts Results of Grafting

A tree with two very different sized, colored, and shaped leaves? A tree that produces a black shelled nut the size of a dime in diameter and a light brown shelled nut almost as large as a golf ball?

That description fits the tree which stands at the southwest corner of the garage at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F.A. Johnston, located at the northern edge of Knox City on the Benjamin highway.

Two native black walnut trees from the yard where Mrs. "Top" White now lives, were transplanted to their present location in the Johnston yard about eight years ago. At that time, the trees were about five feet tall. The trees grew well and were prolific producers of black walnuts.

Several years ago, Mr. Johnston became interested in tree-grafting after having heard of some of the results obtained with nut-bearing trees. He discussed the grafting with Jake

Garrison, manager of the Plant Materials Center located north west of Knox City. Mr. Garrison made the first grafts two years ago in the tree by the garage.

Two kinds of walnut grafts were used. Only the Carpathian English Walnut graft took. It has produced a heavy spreading growth up to six feet in height in its first two years.

More grafting was done by Mr. Garrison early this year. The tree now contains three grafts and two buds of the Carpathian walnut. This year's grafts and buds have attained growth to heights of four feet.

A graft was also made in the tree at the corner of the yard, but has not grown as well as the grafts in the tree by the garage.

According to Mr. Garrison, the Carpathian walnut was introduced into this country by a missionary, the Reverend Crath who had been stationed in the Carpathian Mountains of Poland, where he first saw the trees. Rev. Crath was impressed by the fact that these walnut trees withstood temperatures of -30 degrees.

The nuts produced from these trees are large and thin shelled. They can be broken by crushing two nuts together in one's hand, Mr. Garrison said.

The trees bloom late, thus missing frost danger, with harvest beginning by September 15.

According to Mr. Garrison, who plans more grafts on the Johnston's walnut tree next year, the graft wood was purchased from Womac Nurseries in DeLeon. The graft and

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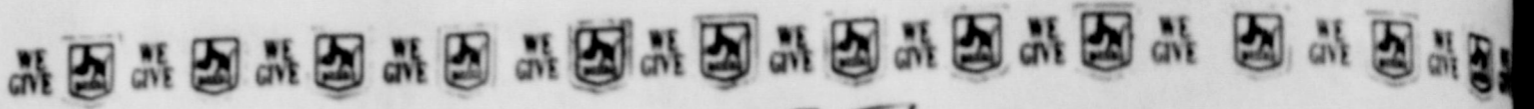

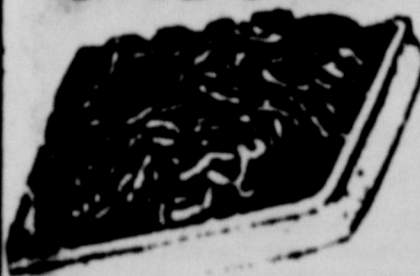

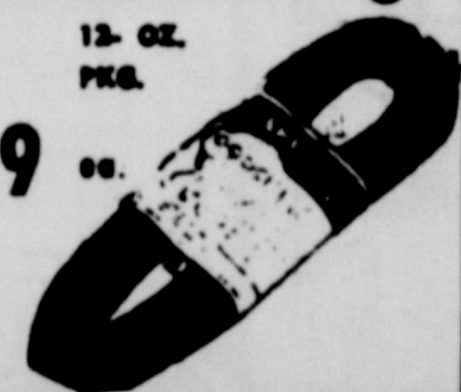
