

Large Walnuts Results of Grafting

A tree with two very different sized, colored, and shaped leaves? A tree that produces a black shelled nut the size of a dime in diameter and a light brown shelled nut almost as large as a golf ball?

That description fits the tree which stands at the southwest corner of the garage at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F.A.Johnston, located at the northern edge of Knox City on the Benjamin

Two native black walnut trees from the yard where Mrs. "Top" White now lives, were transplanted to their present location in the Johnston yard about eight years ago. At that time, the trees were about five feet tall. The trees grew well and were prolific producers of black walnuts.

Several years ago, Mr. Johnston became interested in tree grafting after having heard of some of the results obtained with nut-bearing trees. He discussed the grafting with Jake

Garrison, manager of the Plant Materials Center located north west of Knox City. Mr. Garrison made the first grafts two years ago in the tree by the

Two kinds of walnut grafts were used. Only the Carpathian English Walnut graft took. It has produced a heavy spreading growth up to six feet in height in its first two years.

More grafting was done by Mr. Garrison early this year. The tree now contains three grafts and two buds of the Carpathian walnut. This year's grafts and buds have attained growth to heights of four feet.

A graft was also made in the tree at the corner of the yard. but has not grown as well as the grafts in the tree by the garage.

According to Mr. Garrison, the Carpathian walnut was introduced into this country by a missionary, the Reverend Crath who had been stationed in the Carpathian Mountains of Poland, where he first saw the trees. Rev. Crath was impressed by the fact that these walnut trees withstood temperatures of -30 degrees.

The nuts produced from these trees are large and thin shelled. They can be broken by crushing two nuts together in one's hand. Mr. Garrison said.

The trees bloom late, thus missing frost danger, with harvest beginning by September

According to Mr. Garrison, who plans more grafts on the Johnston's walnut tree next visited her sister and her year, the graft wood was purchased from Womac Nurseries in DeLeon. The graft and



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
