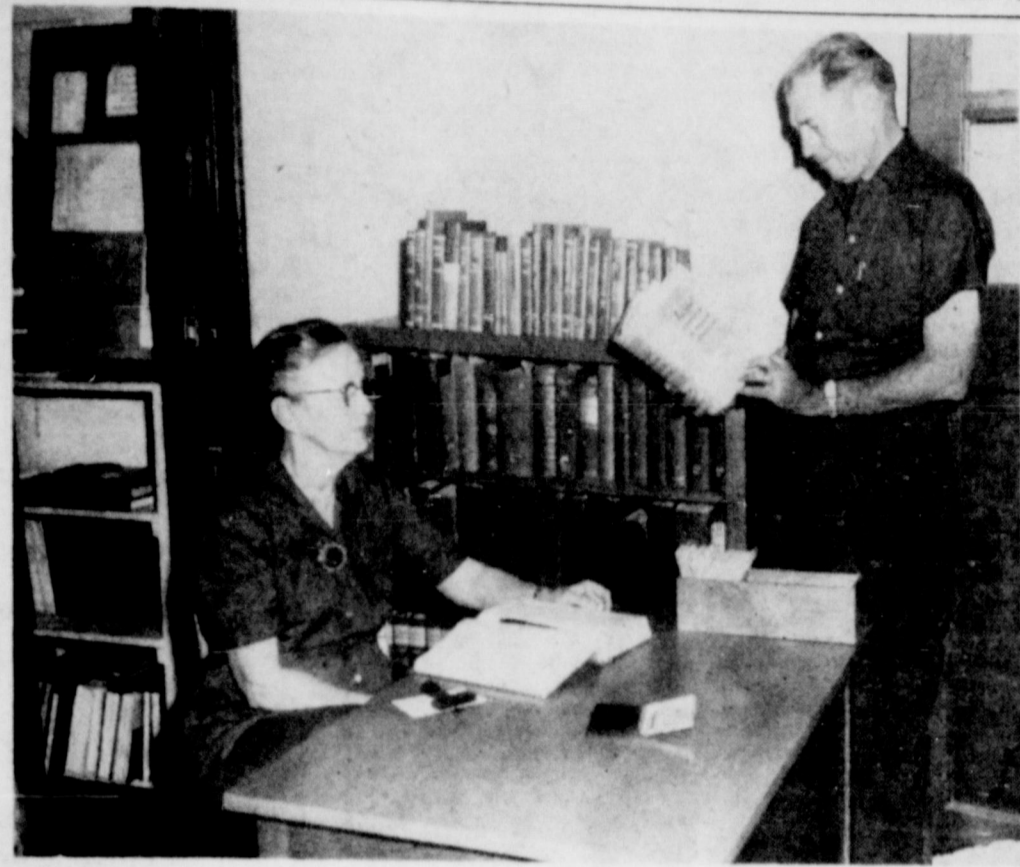

## Knox City High School Library Now Up to Proper Standard

"The Oxford Companion to English Literature" was put on the shelves of the Knox City High School Library late last month, making 5,000 books added to the library.

The volume made a total of 2,064 books added since the school became "library conscious" in September, 1953.

Mrs. Phil Colehour, Knox County school librarian for the past two years, says the local library now compares favorably with those in schools of similar size.

Found in the library are both unabridged dictionaries, Funk & Wagnall and Webster; the Encyclopedia Britannica; a new set of World Books published last year; Americana Encyclopedia; entire set of Britannica Junior; one volume of The Columbia Encyclopedia; Emily Post; the Encyclopedia of Sports; Scott's Postage Stamp catalogue; and Handbook of Texas.

"In the past three years," Mrs. Colehour said, "we have tried to build up a good reference library, lighter type literature, and attractive copies of the classics."

## Oil Drilling Activity In Area on Increase

Exploratory activity in the Knox City area is gaining momentum, with several new shallow tests announced this week.

Eight miles northwest of Knox City R. Clay Underwood staked the No. 1 Charlie Hamilton as a 2600-ft. semi-wildcat 330 feet from northwest and northeast lines of section 17, block 13, H&TC survey.

Ted A. Norwood of Wichita Falls spotted the No. 1 J. H. Hackfield et al three miles north of town. The 2450 foot wildcat is 330 feet from south and west lines of a 20 acre lease in section 84, block 2, D&W survey.

Norwood's No. 1 John Michels is 4 1/2 miles north of Knox City and is a 2450 foot wildcat 330 feet from north and west lines of a 140 acre lease in D. G. Burnett subdivision 5.

Five miles northwest of town, Norwood's No. 1 P. O. Large is staked as a 2600 ft. wildcat 330 feet from northwest and northwest lines of a 160 acre lease in J. Mitchell survey A-561.

Fletcher Oil & Gas Corporation of Dallas will drill the No. 1 H. G. Egenbacher three miles northeast of town, 330 feet from north and 530 from east lines of block 6, D. G. Burnett survey.

E. B. Clark Drilling Co. of Wichita Falls has spotted the No. 1 J. C. Saunders, three miles northeast of Knox City, 330 feet from east and 1020 feet from south lines of block 4, D. G. Burnett subdivision 7A-15. It is a 2600 foot venture.

Gorman Drilling Co. was drilling below 2214 this morning at the No. 1 J. M. Bradberry, about three miles southeast of Knox City, and expected to reach the Tannehill sand today.

### Lions Club Speaker Discusses Church and World Situation

Rev. L. C. Reece, national evangelist who is conducting a revival meeting at the First Christian Church, spoke to members of the Knox City Lions Club Wednesday on "The Church As It is Related to the World Situation."

The speaker pointed out that man now has the know-how to destroy civilization, and said the only hope is for the peoples of the world to live together in religious brotherhood.

"This brings to the church a tremendous responsibility," he said, "because no other organization is dedicated to making the world Christ-conscious."

Rev. Reece said about one-third of the people in the world are members of some church—

either Protestant, Catholic or Orthodox. The other two-thirds are either non-religious or pagan.

The world looks to America for religious leadership, he continued. Sixty-one percent of all Americans are members of some church, he added, but 14 percent of those are "just on the church books" 37 percent are "nominal Christians," while only 15 percent are faithful in church work.

"No one protestant communion has as much as one percent of the world population," the speaker said, "so the task is too great for any one communion. We must all work together."

"The only solution," he concluded, "is to do as Christ said, 'Go, make disciples of all the world.'"

### Progressive Farmer Discusses Vegetable Growing in County

Vegetable growing and marketing in Knox County is described in the December issue of The Progressive Farmer magazine. The article, "Marketing Ain't Easy," tells how farmers in the Munday area have turned from cotton to vegetables.

Don Combs, a farmer, has spark-plugged the Munday vegetable growing deal from its beginning.

First you have to prove you can grow high-quality stuff, says Combs. Then you have to establish a market for your goods.

Farmers in the area contracted with a packer to grow 315 acres of potatoes. They netted \$260 an acre on the crop.

Growing cantaloupes the past year has been their biggest vegetable project. Many weeks of extremely hot, dry weather burned many cantaloupes, lowering both yield and quality. Growers received about \$75 per acre gross and cost of growing was about \$25 an acre. Growers expect to get around \$200 an acre in a normal year.

Watermelons around Munday did better than cantaloupes this year. These two crops may be marketed well together.

They're building a vegetable market at Munday. And growers are striving to build up a reputation for quality.

Deadline Set on Overseas Mail

Ordinary parcels containing Christmas gifts to overseas Armed Forces personnel must be mailed no later than Nov. 15 and air mail parcels no later than Dec. 1 if delivery is to be accurate by Christmas. The Department of Defense has advised all persons planning such mail to consult local post office representatives for complete mailing instructions since requirements vary according to the overseas area concerned. Cigarettes and other tobacco products are prohibited in parcels addressed to military post offices located in Denmark, England, Eritrea, France, Germany, Italy, Morocco, Scotland and Wales. Coffee is prohibited in parcels addressed to Denmark and Germany. Customs declarations must accompany parcels addressed to offices in the Canal Zone, England, France, Iran, Morocco, Netherlands, Saudi Arabia, Scotland and Wales. Generally, ordinary parcels are limited to 100 inches in length and girth combined and 70 pounds in weight. However, special size and weight limitations are in effect for parcels destined for delivery in England, Scotland, Turkey and Wales. Air parcels to all areas are limited to 30 inches in length and girth combined and two pounds in weight.

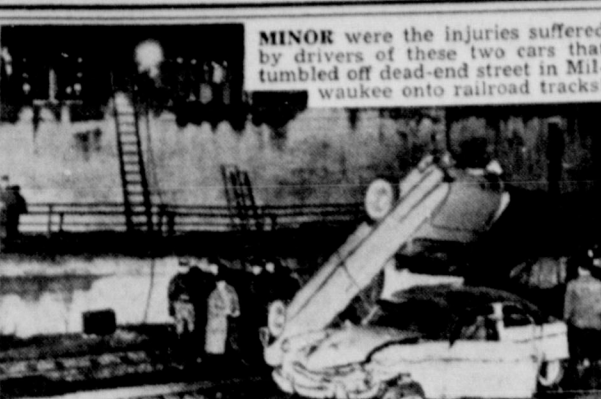

### Northern Star Leads Refugio Variety Test

CORPUS CHRISTI — Northern Star No. 11 was the highest yielding cotton variety planted in the Refugio County cotton variety test plot on the John Shaw farm at Austwell, according to D. F. Bredthauer, county agricultural agent.

Sixteen varieties were used in the test, which was carried out by Shaw and his son, John, a member of the Refugio County 4-H Club.

Northern Star No. 11 yielded 570 pounds of lint cotton to the acre to lead in the test. Second highest yielder was SPH-1, producing 568 pounds to the acre.

Stoneville 7 was in third place with a yield of 558 pounds of lint per acre.

Other yields in the test were: Deltapine TPSA, 553 pounds of lint to the acre; Dixie King, 562 pounds; Deltapine, 525; Watson Empire, 505; Lankart Selection 57-5, 802 pounds; Stoneville 3202, 496; Clletts Mebane CL25, 473; Lankart Selection 611W, 464; D&PL-Fox 0253, 441 pounds; Delfos 9169, 437; Acala C-504, 408; Bagley's B-17 Rowden, 354. **7-Point Program for Safer Texas Outlined**

C. H. Keek and Loyce Teague were in Wichita Falls last Thursday night to attend a meeting sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, Region 16.

The meeting was held at the YMCA beginning at 7:30. A dinner was served before the business session. Keek and Teague represented Knox City and the local Lions Club. They were appointed by Otis Harbert, Lions Club president, and carried to the meeting by George Garrett of Seymour, highway patrolman. Ivan Elmer of Wichita Falls, region vice-president of the TSA, was master of ceremonies. He introduced C. G. Conner, assistant chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, who gave statistics on highway accidents.

He told the group of 50 men that the principal trouble is "too many cars and not enough space on highways and city streets." Last year, according to Conner, 2547 Texans were killed, 108,000 injured, and property damage amounted to more than three hundred million, all from automobile accidents.

Ninety-five percent of all transportation is on the highways, he reported. Seventy-seven percent of all freight is shipped by truck

and 95 percent of all farm products are moved by highway.

He estimated that Texas needs from 1200 to 1600 highway patrolmen, but now has only 570.

J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, presented a 7-point program to help remedy the traffic problem. The meeting went on record as approving the program, and individuals and civic clubs were asked to write their state senators and representatives, informing them they want legislation for a safer Texas.

The 7-point program is as follows:

1. That the Legislature provide a monetary increase in salaries and benefits of the Texas Department of Public Safety and an increase in the number of patrolmen.
2. That the Legislature establish county-wide traffic courts.
3. That the Legislature amend the Gilmer-Aiken School Finance laws to provide for driver education teachers.
4. That the Legislature be requested to enact a law to prohibit the sale and use of fireworks in Texas.
5. That the Legislature enact a law providing for chemical testing to define intoxication.
6. That the Legislature pass a resolution directing the Legislative Council to make a study of all traffic laws, bring up to date those passed 30 years ago.
7. That the Legislature enact laws making juveniles amenable for their traffic violations.

**Masterson JY Brand And Papers Given To Texas Tech**

The famous old Texas "JY" brand and papers of the Masterson JY Ranch in Knox County have been given to Texas Technological College in the final chapter of a love story that started on the campus in Lubbock in the mid-1930's.

The collection was given by Mrs. Floyce Masterson, widow of Tom Masterson Jr. The couple met while attending the college in 1936.

Tom Jr. became the third generation Masterson to manage the ranch, which was founded by his grandfather, R. B. Masterson, in the 1880's.

It consisted of some 73,000 acres, 40,000 of which were leased through the years. The JY brand was perhaps best known for the Aberdeen-Angus stock raised on the ranch.

When Tom Masterson Jr. died in 1953, Mrs. Masterson was left alone to manage the sprawling ranch. Three years later, she decided to sell out to F. A. and Ed Lowrance. They bought the cattle, 40,000 acres of land, and leased the rest.

"They bought everything but the JY brand," Mrs. Masterson said. "I wouldn't sell that. I wanted it and the records of the ranch to go to Texas Tech, where I met and fell in love with the first boy I saw on the campus."

Among the collection, most of which is still stored in a bank vault at Truscott, are the papers, records and a JY branding iron. The collection also includes the personal saddle and rig which belonged to Tom Masterson Jr., a pair of chaps, dutch ovens and other articles typical of ranch life.
