It is a well known fact that no better man ever walked the streets of Knox City as a resident of the town and in any business, whether church or otherwise, than this man who served his church the past year with his whole body and soul.

Many words of appreciation of his return have been spoken on the streets of Knox City during this week.

Since the Methodist Preacher was in Sweetwater Sunday attending the

Annual Conference of that church, there were no preaching services at the local Methodist church Sunday. Most of the members attending service at one of the other churches of the town and we chose the Baptist.

After having comfortably seated ourselves in one of the Baptist nice chairs and listened to a few announcements and a song or two we felt ready to hear one of the pastor's good sermons but lo, he stated there was to be no sermon that morning, that he would report on the Conference which he, with two other church representatives, had attended during the week. Immediately we wished that we had stayed at home for surely it would not be exactly correct to leave just here. Well, we thought we would "sweat" it out, but before the report had hardly started we feel entirely different about the whole situation.

Brothr Stovall's report of the Conference was both interesting and inspiring. Only those who have attended conferences or other similar church meetings, can appreciate the meeting, the representatives present and the program given.

Brothr Stovall stated during his report that there were no sour faced people at this Baptist conference. He certainly is right here for that type of people does not attend church conferences. Those Baptist who failed to hear their pastor's report of the conference missed a good service.

A second follows the first. Sunday night Reverend Stovall gave another of his Song Sermons, the second given and our first to hear. This service included songs presented in solo, duet, quartet and choir form. The theme Redemption was well developed in the pastor's few words and the songs. This is another good service that many more than did, should have heard.

Tuberculosis is diminishing, but only because of the constant watchfulness and educational work of the devoted men and women who are giving their lives to that work. 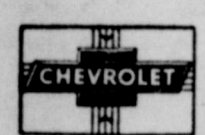
