

Deadline For All Cotton Appeals Set For 6 P.M., Tuesday, March 28

In a called meeting for all Knox County cotton farmers last Thursday night in the American Legion Hall here, the men met and made individual appeals for projected yields to the Deputy Administrator in Washington, D. C., after Sammy B. White, spokesman explained to the group that the State ASC committee's report was "very nice, very polite, and very negative."

In an all-out effort for this last appeal, a discussion was held in regard as to whether or not the Knox County farmers should seek the assistance of the Farmers' Union, one of the largest groups which might be better-known in the Washington area than some of the area groups.

Motion was made and seconded that a committee meet with Kenneth Moss, field man for the Farmers' Union, at Paducah, Kentucky, White and Eddie Shaver of Knox City and Herbert Partridge of Munday made a trip to meet with Mr. Moss Sunday afternoon. He assured the men that his group would assist the Knox County farmers in every way possible and would be in Washington the first week in April to further these appeals.

Knox and King Counties are both appealing for 13 pounds. It was emphasized that any Knox County farmer, regardless of whether or not he has ever farmed skip-row, has lost 18 lbs. of the projected yield. Therefore, it is urged that every Knox County farmer write an appeal, and the Knox City area farmers are asked to bring these appeals to John

Crowover at the B&C Chemical Company by the deadline 6 p.m., Tuesday, March 28. They may be left there to be mailed in order that a record may be kept of all those making appeals. In the Truscott and Gilliland area, appeals should be taken to the Gilliland gin; in Munday, Goree and Rhineland, appeals may be turned in to the gins where the farmers trade.

Sam E. Clonts and Sammy B. White were chosen as representatives for the area men and were asked to write the technical details of the inequity to Congressman Graham B. Purcell and also the deputy administrator, Ray Fitzgerald. Mr. White assured the group that Congressman Purcell is ready and anxious to help in any way possible in these appeals.

J. B. Cooper of Roscoe, president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., is in Washington this week meeting and talking with the deputy administrator in regard to these losses suffered by Knox County farmers.

The annual Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. meeting will be held Thursday, (today), March 23 at 2 p.m. in the school auditorium at Stamford. Mr. White invites those who could, to attend. This story appears elsewhere in this week's Herald.

All Knox County Farmers Interested In Future of Cotton, Are Urged to be Present In Stamford (Today) March 23

All Rolling Plains cotton farmers and others interested in the future of the cotton industry in the Rolling Plains are urged to attend the annual meeting of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers which will be held in Stamford at the High School Auditorium on Thursday, March 23, beginning at 2:00 p.m.

According to Charles Stenholm, executive vice-president of RPCG, this should be one of the most important meetings ever held in the Rolling Plains. Among subjects to be covered by experts in their fields are what mills are looking for in our type of cotton, what we as cotton farmers can do to meet mill requirements and what the future holds for the cotton industry. Also, the possibility of mechanical classing of cotton in the near future will be discussed and this is most important to the Rolling Plains.

The primary concern of many in the textile industry, as well as some other cotton producing areas, is the pending shortage of cotton stapling 1.2 inch and having the desired strength, micronaire and other qualities. However, it is also obvious to most people that there are markets, and good markets, for cotton in the shorter staples, assuming it is grown and handled in the proper manner.

"The successful cotton farmer of the past has been the one who has raised the most pounds of cotton per acre" said Mr. Stenholm, "but the successful cotton farmer in the future will be the one who grows the most pounds of quality cotton."

The Rolling Plains area of Texas can produce longer staple quality cotton that the mills will buy at a premium price. To do

this, however, we must change some of our time worn methods of production."
