LeRoy Phillips, Former Clerk, Dies at Munday

LeRoy Phillips, 64, died at his home in Munday at 9 a. m. Tuesday.

An invalid for 30 years, he had been seriously ill a month. Mr. Phillips, a native of Arkansas, had been a resident of Munday since 1900.

Funeral services were to be held at 2 p. m. today (Thursday) at the Munday Church of Christ, with minister Harold Paden officiating, assisted by Rev. Grady Allison, pastor of the Munday Baptist Church and Rev. Mart Hardin, pastor of the O'Brien Baptist Church.

Oil Notes . . .

Potential has been taken at a Haskell County wildcat completed five miles southeast of Rochester. It is Fletcher Oil & Gas Drilling Corp. No. 1 W. M. Reid, Red River CSL survey 74.

Daily potential was 240 barrels of 35 gravity oil flowing through 16-64 choke with packer set on the casing and 250 pounds tubing pressure. Production is from four perforations per foot at 4886-69 feet opposite a Strawn sand. Casing is set at 4875 feet.

Whitehall Oil Co., Dallas staked the No. 1 E. L. Hughes west of O'Brien. The wildcat is slated for 5200 feet. It spots 330 feet from the south and 2500 feet from the east lines of Lot 12, G. G. Alford survey 44. It is 200 feet east of the Stonewall and Haskell county line.

Oil and Gas Ventures of Wichita Falls No. 1 Ida Reese, wildcat two miles southeast of Knox City, was plugged at 6001 feet. Location was in section 47, block 2, D&W survey, near the Knox-Haskell county line.

H. A. Hackathorn staked the No. 1 Mrs. G. L. Howell as a 2300 foot wildcat. The venture is 330 feet from west and 990 from south lines of block 6, D. G. Burnett subdivision No. 9 A-23.

A wildcat failure was reported when Humble Oil & Refining Co. abandoned at 2104 feet No. 1 Mrs. Maggie Smith 1-2 miles west of Munday in section 36, block 2, D&W survey.

New Conservation Contracts to Be Effective April 15

New Conservation contracts now being signed by farmers in Knox County will in general become effective on April 15, 1959, according to Gaylon C. Scott, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All Conservation Reserve contracts require that the land included be devoted to grass, trees, or a water or wildlife conservation practice. If the conservation practice to be used on the designated land is performed before April 15, the contract becomes effective at the time the practice is started.

This means that 1958 crops on land put in the Conservation Reserve this fall can be harvested before the contract goes into effect. In addition, the land put in the Reserve for the first time this fall may be grazed until the contract goes into effect. After the contract goes into effect the farmer agrees not to graze the land or harvest a crop from it. He also agrees to refrain from harvesting Christmas trees and ornamentals from Conservation Reserve land on which forest trees have been planted.

kets will be delivered by the Legion on Christmas Eve day.

Those wishing to make a donation, whether in money, clothing or food, may do so by leaving it at Hoge's Pharmacy or with J. G. Robin, post commander, or Paul Fitzgerald, post adjutant.

"And if you know of a family who will have little at Christmas, leave the names, ages and other information with the post adjutant," Legion members said.

Lone Star Asks Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company has filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas an application for an upward adjustment of the Company's authorized intra-company city gate charge.

The present charge of 30 cents per thousand cubic feet for gas delivered at the city gates in Texas cities served by Lone Star for domestic and commercial usage and unaccounted-for gas would be adjusted upward to 40 cents.

Approval of the requested upward adjustment would serve to re-establish the charge that existed for a long period of years prior to the year 1942 when the charge was reduced from 40 to 30 cents.

The application states that the proposed increase is based primarily upon the drastic increase in the cost of gas at the well-head. This cost has risen approximately eight cents per thousand cubic feet since January 1, 1951. Additionally, there have been substantial increases in taxes, material costs, labor and other operating expenses.

Residential and commercial consumer rates would not be immediately affected by Railroad Commission authorization of an upward adjustment in the city gate charge. But a Company spokesman stated that the Company may be required at a later date to file applications for increases in residential and commercial rates.

Santa to Visit Knox City Friday

Latest news flash from the North Pole is that Santa Claus, despite a heavy schedule of activities as Christmas approaches, will be in Knox City for the Chamber of Commerce sponsored parade Friday afternoon.

The parade, led by the Knox City school band, will form near the elementary school at 2 p. m. The group will march down Central Avenue to the First Baptist Church, with Santa dropping off in the main business section to visit with the children and hand out small socks filled with candy.

C. of C. secretary George Houston said several merchants have indicated they will have decorated cars or other entries in the parade, and some high school classes may also have floats.

Everyone in the trade area was urged to bring their children and come early for the parade, as downtown parking space will be at a premium. Knox City merchants, their shelves loaded with gift merchandise, will be ready to serve Christmas shoppers both before and after Santa's visit.

Funeral Services Held Here Sunday For 'Pa' Garrison

Funeral services for Clold W. (Pa) Garrison were held at the First Baptist Church at 3 p. m. Sunday with Rev. Billy Frazier of Idalou, former pastor, officiating, assisted by Jerome Savage, minister of the local Church of Christ.

Mr. Garrison died Friday after being ill two weeks. He was returning to his home here from a visit in Kentucky when he suffered a stroke, and was returned to Knox City by ambulance plane after being hospitalized in Memphis, Tenn.

Garrison was a carpenter until he retired two years ago to care for his wife after she had suffered a stroke. Mrs. Garrison died October 29, about a month before he became ill. The couple would have been married 53 years Friday.

Born June 26, 1884 in Cave City, Ky., Garrison moved to the Grace Community near Knox City in 1924, and to Knox City in 1939.

Survivors include three sons, Harry E. of Tucumcari, N. M., Wesley of Knox City and Billy of Wenatchee, Wash.; three daughters, Mrs. Laura Faubion of Knox City, Mrs. Virgil P. Stephens and Mrs. Jim Stephens, both of Lubbock; 13 grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Jimmy Isenberg of Cave City, Ky., and Mrs. D. P. Fuller of Rule; and one brother, Ben of Fresno, Calif.

'HOUNDS LOSE TO WEINERT; BEAT MUNDAY AND O'BRIEN

The Knox City Greyhounds were knocked out of the Haskell Invitation basketball tournament last week end by Weinert, it being their second tournament loss to the Bulldogs in as many weeks.

In the first round of play the local lads beat Abilene B, 49-48, after the Abilene boys had led in the first three quarters, 16-15, 26-22 and 37-36. High scorer for the Greyhounds was Jim Anderson with 13 points.

Haskell, Weinert and O'Brien also won their opening games, the latter beating Hamlin B, 64-30. Danny Walsworth was high for O'Brien with 29.

Score in the Knox City-Weinert game was 35-28, with Anderson hitting 13 for the Greyhounds. Knox City had a 9-5 advantage at the need of the first period but scored only four points in the second quarter and five in the third.

O'Brien also bit the dust the second night of the tourney, bowing to tournament winner Haskell, 44-40. Danny Walsworth hit 21 for the losers.

Patrolman Urges Special Care in Holiday Driving

Traffic deaths in Texas have decreased ten per cent in the first ten months of 1958, and Sergeant F. P. Zircik of the Texas Highway Patrol, anticipating heavy travel during the Holiday period ahead has urged Knox County motorists to assist in pushing the decrease even lower.

Knox County has had one traffic fatality in the ten-month period according to Sergeant Zircik. This year's county death toll equals the same period of 1957 which also saw one traffic death in the county. Haskell County had six traffic deaths during the 10-month period of 1957, which compares with seven deaths for the same period this year.

The Sergeant pointed out that of the sixty counties in Region No. 5 of the Department of Public Safety, 25 counties show a total increase of 74 traffic deaths compared to the same period of last year, while 35 counties have had a total decrease of 103 fatalities.

Sergeant Zircik said 241 traffic deaths have been counted during the first ten months of 1958 in DPS Region 5, which is a reduction of 29 deaths from the total of 270 in the Region for the same period in 1957.

Pleading with motorists to continue the reduction of fatalities in the Region during the remainder of the year, the Sergeant cautioned drivers to be especially alert.

"Careful planning of trips during the Holiday period and co-operation with other users of the highway will pay off in lives saved," the Sergeant said. "Drive safely, sanely, defensively, and comply voluntarily with all traffic rules," he urged. "It will help insure a happy Holiday for everyone."

He cautioned motorists to drive at a speed that fits in smoothly with the speed of other vehicles. He pointed out that this is especially important in rural areas where speed gives the driver less time to think in an emergency situation and increases the severity of an accident.

"Remember, you're not alone on the streets and highways," Sergeant Zircik said. "Share the road if you expect to have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year."

Vera VA Building Damaged by Fire

The Vera Vocational Agriculture building caught fire last Thursday morning, but most of the damage was confined to items in the building, M. J. Kirby, superintendent, said.

A wood stove was blamed for the fire. There was considerable smoke damage to the building and to the band hall. The fire was extinguished by the agriculture students. The Knox City Volunteer Fire department was called but before they left town Vera school officials called that the fire was out.

After the toys were passed out and "demonstrated" by the Lions they were turned over to the American Legion for distribution with the Legion's Christmas baskets to less fortunate families in the community.

Club members also contributed \$25.00 to help the Legion buy food and other items, and club president Otto Lawson announced that Charley Hamilton of Wichita Falls, member-at-large, had left a check for \$25.00 to go to the project in the name of the club.

Workmen removed all scale from the tank's inside wall, painted the tank inside and out and repainted the tower. Cost of the job was \$1,045.00.
